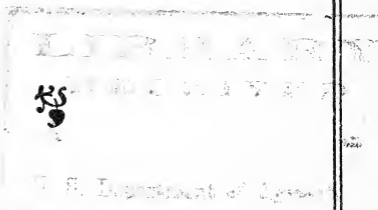

I do not give any warranty, express or implied, as to description, quality, productiveness or any other matter of any bulbs, plants, seeds or other goods offered in this catalogue, although every care is taken to supply everything correctly named and of good quality. Purchasers unwilling to accept goods on these terms will confer a favor by promptly returning them.

PRICES

Prices in this catalogue are as low as can be given consistent with quality. I carry no trees or shrubs in storage sheds during the winter, such stock as we have is in the open ground suitably protected and may naturally be expected to succeed better than when not exposed to the elements, and with roots too often badly dried. In virtually all cases prices here given are constant through the year but there are occasional exceptions, as in the case of certain Lilies and Herbaceous Perennials when moderate changes may be found necessary.

AUTUMN CATALOGUE

HARDY GARDEN ROSES

Garden roses may be successfully planted either in the fall or spring. To achieve success with them thorough preparation of the ground is essential. Well drained ground, free if possible from shade, deeply spaded and liberally manured is what roses love, they are more often starved than otherwise, I do not remember having seen any which have died from over-feeding; use cow manure if possible, but stable manure well rotted, sheep manure, and bone are all good, so is soot. Plant as early as possible in spring for the best results. Be sure roots are moist when planted, spread them out well, and firm thoroughly. Cover the swollen part from which the shoots spring at least 2 inches. Do not prune newly planted stock until it has started to grow, then do not be afraid to head the plants back severely. During the growing season keep the surface soil stirred lightly and always do this after a rain. When you water do it thoroughly. Spraying the plants each night is more harmful than helpful. Winter protection is best afforded by drawing soil up around the plants just before freezing up weather, when the ground is hard frozen this can be supplemented by a generous covering of straw or leaves, this must not be done while ground is soft or field mice may do much damage. Do not be in too great a hurry to remove winter protection as we frequently get almost Arctic weather as late as the beginning of April. The time for pruning will vary with the season, but for Boston and vicinity, the middle of April is a good date.

The roses offered in this list are all grafted or budded two years old field grown stock, and are not carried over winter in sheds or storehouses, packed in sand as are a large proportion of the roses sold in the Eastern states. Being well protected outdoors with roots always moist such plants cannot fail to give more satisfaction than the usual stock offered, over half of which dies the first season. Early

orders are solicited and these will be filled as soon as the ground is open. The subjoined list is not an extensive one, but the varieties listed embrace about every known color, and are very dependable. For the rambler roses the best winter form of protection is to simply cut them loose, lay on the ground and scatter a light covering of soil over them.

Fall planting of all types of hardy roses I would strongly recommend. In recent years I have had very much better success with fall than spring planting and I would strongly recommend anyone who has any doubts as regards its success to try a few plants this fall and compare results with spring plantings.

- Francis Scott Key.** Large light crimson buds and flowers, grows and flowers freely, has some fragrance but burns rather badly in hot weather.
- General McArthur.** This is the leading crimson scarlet bedding rose in Great Britain succeeding better there than in the United States.
- Golden Ophelia.** Similar to Ophelia but with a yellow suffusion, a free grower and good bloomer, especially fine in the fall.
- Gruss an Teplitz.** Very robust and a constant bloomer. Not suitable to use with other hybrid teas on account of its vigor and difference in habit. Used in a bed alone, as a hedge or in a shrubbery it is ideal. Color scarlet crimson and is very hardy.
- Independence Day.** Rich orange apricot, suffused with golden yellow. Very free flowering, excellent for bedding. A bed or border of this variety dotted with *Lilium regale* makes a fine combination.
- Irish Elegance.** A charming single variety. The varying shades of orange apricot changes to orange scarlet.
- Irish Fireflame.** Another lovely single Irish rose, the color is madder orange changing to old gold.

- Mme. Caroline Testout.** Satiny rose, flowers large and with a moderate fragrance. In cultivation nearly 40 years this Pernet-Ducher variety still holds its popularity. Grown by thousands along the streets of Portland, Oregon.

HYBRID PERPETUAL ROSES

Baroness Rothschild. Light pink flowers of perfect form, a stocky grower and carries handsome foliage right up to the flowers.

Captain Hayward. Crimson scarlet, fine form, fragrant and robust.

George Ahrends. Often referred to as the "Pink Druschki." Soft pink, fragrant and worthy a place in every rose garden.

Gloire de Chedane Guinnoiseau. The vermilion red flowers are extra large.

Fisher Holmes. Reddish scarlet beneath a black velvety sheen, a very delightful variety.

Frau Karl Druschki. The finest, purest and most popular of all white roses in America. A perpetual bloomer, very vigorous and hardy, should be pruned more lightly than other varieties.

General Jacqueminot. Crimson scarlet in color this grand old rose still holds a strong place in flower growers' hearts. Very fragrant and especially lovely in the bud stage.

Hugh Dickson. Dark red, velvety flowers, fragrant and very robust.

Mme. Albert Barbier. See Novelties.

Magna Charta. Bright pink, suffused carmine, sweet scented, hardy and robust.

Mrs. John Laing. Large, clear pink flowers which are very fragrant, a real perpetual bloomer and without thorns. In culture over 50 years it is still immensely popular.

Mrs. R. G. Sharman Crawford. Next to Mrs. John Laing this is the finest pink Hybrid Perpetual. Rosy pink in color but running lighter towards the centre, some fragrance.

Margaret Dickson. White with flesh centre, a lovely variety.

HARDY CLIMBING, RAMBLING OR PILLAR ROSES

Alida Lovett. Bright shell pink of large size, lightly shaded with soft yellow and has some perfume. One of Dr. Van Fleet's introductions.

American Pillar. Carries immense clusters of crimson pink flowers which last remarkably, has astonishing vigor, another Van Fleet variety.

Bess Lovett. Carries large clusters of sweet scented light crimson red flowers, which exceed in size any others of this shade.

- Climbing American Beauty.** Large rich carmine flowers, abundantly produced.
- Climbing Lady Ashtown.** See Novelties.
- Dr. Huey.** A striking variety, the color is crimson maroon, shaded black and the semi-double flowers are large with prominent golden stamens.

Succeeds very well in some parts of New England. The large creamy buff flowers are produced all summer. Give good winter protection.
- Heart of Gold.** A new hybrid raised by the late Dr. Van Fleet, color velvety crimson, the large single flowers have prominent stamens.
- Hiawatha.** One of the late Mr. M. H. Walsh's best hybrids, carries large clusters of single, brilliant red flowers.
- Jacotte.** The large semi-double flowers are of a remarkable color, being orange yellow, tinted coppery red. Protect well in winter.
- Mary Lovett.** Pure waxy white, resembles Dr. Van Fleet except in color.

Mary Wallace. Bright pink flowers of large size carried on strong stems, the flowers are illumined with gold and quite fragrant, plants are very viogrous, a lovely Van Fleet variety.

Pauls Scarlet Climber. The intensely brilliant flowers are of large size, and are borne on small clusters, color does not fade, a grand pillar rose.

Phyllis Bide. See Novelties.

Roserie. The frilled flowers are of good size and a little darker pink in color than Tausendschöen, does not fade out like that variety.

Silver Moon. Holds first place easily amongst climbing roses. The large flowers are pure white in color and the golden anthers show up very prominently above the pure, almost translucent petals, has splendid foliage.

Star of Persia. See Novelties.

Tausendschöen. Gradually being displaced by varieties which fade out less quickly, a good pillar rose and an extra early bloomer. Will remain popular however as a bright pink forcing rose.

White Dorothy. A late pure white variety, the counterpart of Dorothy Perkins except in color.

POLYANTHA ROSES

The Polyantha or "baby rambler" roses are very persistent bloomers, being of dwarf or moderate habit they are splendid for bedding and mass effects. They are sometimes used as edgings for beds of hybrid teas but are much better used alone.

Chatillon Rose. Bright pink semi-double flowers, shaded orange, carries large trusses.

Ellen Poulsen. Large trusses of bright rose pink flowers, very vigorous.

Else Poulsen. See Novelties.

Echo. Soft, tender rose pink, a lovely variety.

Cruss an Aachen. Different from all other Polyanthas, flowers are of remarkable size and are often mistaken for Hybrid Teas. The buds are orange red and yellow, when fully open the very double flowers are a charming combination of light pink and salmon yellow. Splendid fall bloomer, every rose grower needs this variety.

Kirsten Poulsen. See Novelties.

Lady Reading. Resembles Ellen Poulsen except in color which is bright red, flowers possess some fragrance.

Mme. Cecile Brunner. Better known as the "Sweetheart Rose." Small light pink flowers with yellow base, blooms freely but needs good winter protection.

Yvonne Rabier. Small well formed white flowers which are freely produced.

MISCELLANEOUS ROSES

Cabbage (*Rosa centifolia*). Probably the oldest rose in commerce, fragrant rosy pink flowers.

Austrian Copper. Single flowers of rich coppery red, reverse of petals golden yellow. In commerce for hundreds of years.

Blanche Moreau. Lovely pure white moss rose.

Conrad Ferdinand Meyer. A large double pink rugosa, flowers are fragrant.

Ecae. A fine Chinese species with scented foliage and sulphury yellow flowers, makes a bush 5-6 feet high and of equal width, more dependable than Hugonis.

F. J. Grootendörst. A persistent blooming red rugosa.

Harisons Yellow. Large semi-double golden yellow flowers, later than Hugonis.

Hugonis. Clear yellow single flowers are abundantly produced well in advance of other species. Makes a large shapely bush and is a perfect dream of golden glory when in flower, very hardy but has a bad knack of mysteriously dying out in summer. Worth planting if but for one or two crops.

Moyesii. Strikingly beautiful species growing rather taller than Hugonis. Carries brilliant, attractive deep blood red flowers in June. \$1.50 each.

Persian Yellow. Darker than Harison's Yellow but of similar habit and fragrant.

Salet. A pretty pink moss rose, fine companion for Blanche Moreau, perfumed.

Sir Thomas Lipton. The finest double pure white Rugosa.

Sweet Briars (Lord Penzance Briars).

Amy Robsart. Bright rose, flowers and foliage both fragrant.

Lady Penzance. Beautiful bright copper colored flowers.

Lord Penzance. Flowers are fawn colored. Foliage very fragrant.

Zanthina. Double yellow flowers, better foliage and more dependable than Hugonis, also flowers over a longer season.

HARDY LILIUMS

These are one of my leading specialties, and the greater porportion of those offered are home grown bulbs. The coming of Lilium regale paved the way for a tremendously increased interest in Lilies. Whereas formerly

but a limited number of varieties were listed or grown, the demand today is for a very much wider assortment, embracing practically all Lilies which will grow in North America. The bulb rooting varieties like *Candidum* and *Testaceum* should be planted quite shallow, 2½-3 inches suffices, while such stem rooters as *regale*, *speciosum auratum*, *Henryi*, *Sargentiae*, *Browni*, and others should be covered 8-12 inches. All Lilies should be planted where their feet will be dry in winter, fresh manure must never be used in the soil at planting time, if very old and well decayed it is all right, all lilies love leaf mold and they seem to root with avidity in peat moss, sand is good for all of them and at planting time a cushion should be placed for each bulb to rest on, scattering more above them.

Candidum can be planted from early August onwards, the majority of other lilies are ready in October but the imported bulbs of *speciosum* and *auratum* with one or two other varieties rarely arrive in America before December 1, sometimes much later, if places where these are to go are mulched to exclude frost they can be planted in either December or January, failing this bulbs should be either kept in dry soil over winter in a cold cellar or potted and planted out in early spring. Bulbs should never be left exposed to sun and air for more than a brief time, scales will soon lose their plumpness, and shrivelled bulbs will never give the same results as plump ones.
