



FIELD-GROWN ROSES — WHICH?

ROSES, and other flowering plants and vines, are being planted by the millions here in America. This movement to beautify the home has grown to huge proportions in the last twenty years. Great publications have come into being devoted to the Home Beautiful Movement. Nearly every newspaper, both local and national, carries a department devoted to the same purpose. Everybody is planting "growing things" around the home. Many years ago the owner of this concern advanced the theory which has now been accepted as an unquestioned, practical fact, that roses and other flowering plants around the home were just as important, or more so, than the interior decorations—painting, papering and the like. The first is the kind of roses which this writer's family has grown for more than one-half century, successfully and continuously—**POT-GROWN, OWN-ROOT ROSES.** The other class of plants are roses grown on wild roots with tame tops, produced in various sections, anywhere from Arizona, Texas, California, to the Atlantic Coast, but you have no means of knowing where they are grown. Roses grown under irrigation are largely made up of water and are not the kind that bring successful results to the amateur planter. The plant grown on wild

roots is not successful for, unless pruned out, the wild roots throw out wild shoots, and unless they are cut out continuously, you have nothing but a wild bush. The average amateur hesitates about cutting a branch off a rose and does not know the wild shoot from the tame top, with the result that they soon have a wild plant of no value. A wild root rose that dies stays dead, but as long as any part of the root of our own-root rose is alive, though the top may be dead, it will start a strong growth again from the roots.

The Real Test. More than fifty years ago the present owner's people abandoned the growing and selling of wild-root, field-grown plants because they were not satisfactory to the amateur planter. At that time we instituted the plan of growing roses on their own roots, now an industry in America engaging millions and millions of dollars of capital. Evidently, our forebears were wise, or our business would not have grown to such vast proportions. We have in our files thousands of unsolicited testimonials from all over the world, telling how satisfactory our roses are. After all, that is the real test. Our whole life's energy and devotion has been to this one main point—what is the best plant for the amateur planter, that will perpetuate and increase the reputation and prestige of this business? The answer to that is unmistakable, that the best rose plants in the world are the kind of plants we grow—**POT-GROWN, OWN-ROOT ROSES,** produced under Nature's natural plan. They are the roses we recommend you to buy, whether you buy them from us or not.

An Emphatic Point. **RIGHT HERE WE WANT TO BRING OUT AS STRONGLY AS POSSIBLE THIS ONE POINT.** Through all our advertisements and literature we emphasize that our roses are on their own roots, and are pot grown. You know exactly what you are buying. That is the fair way of doing business. There are catalogues that do not tell you that you are buying wild-root roses, which is the unfair

way of doing business. When buying roses, whether you buy them from us or not, insist upon knowing the kind of plants you are buying, and buy own-root roses. **MAKE A NOTE OF THIS.**

Quick Action Plants. We develop the roots here at a great expense and under the most skillful care. A wild-root, field-grown plant comes to you in a dormant state—dried out, and you have to develop the root action. Such plants cost far less to produce, but without a single exception you are asked to pay more for them than the pot-grown, own-root plants we offer. Our plants are equipped with strong, active, growing roots, and as a rule each plant is shipped in the soil in which it is growing, and there is not the slightest chance for failure. They might be termed "quick action" plants as they are growing vigorously, both top and bottom, when you receive them.

Why Buy Wild-root Roses? We quote from a catalogue selling field-grown, dormant, wild-root, budded plants as follows, and this is what is said in recommending fall planting as particularly desirable:

"In the spring the situation is reversed, and newly planted plants may start top-growth before the roots have begun to function properly, with the probable result of loss, or at least weakness, and possible death from sheer exhaustion after a supreme attempt at blooming."

That being the case, why should any one buy plants of this character? Why not buy pot-grown, own-root rose plants, that have the root action in full swing when you receive them?

In the American Florist, of March 17th, 1927, Orton G. Rust of Springfield, Ohio, a commercial grower, makes the following statement, which confirms what we maintain, that pot-grown roses are infinitely superior, especially for the amateur:

"We began potting Hybrid Tea Roses for our spring sales some time ago. These have been moving well with us in the past three years, that is, if they are handled in pots. Handling roses dormant has proven to be a losing proposition with us."

A Guarantee That Means Something. Our roses are covered by a guarantee that means something. They must be satisfactory to you, or your order will be duplicated or

A guarantee that tells you the plant will bloom at the "first natural blooming period" means nothing. No human agency has been developed that can retard the ripening of the flowers and fruits of the fields as planned by the Divine Creator. Such an ambiguous "guar-



antee" is made a little clearer by what follows, and that is, that the "guarantee" "does not cover loss from admitted neglect on the part of the purchaser," whatever that may mean. Our guarantee has no opening for a controversy, and there will be none. You will get a dollar's worth of goods for every dollar you send us, and you must feel you have received your money's worth, and if you are not satisfied, simply tell us and your order will be duplicated or your money will be refunded and you keep the plants with our compliments.

Known the World Over. Our roses are known the world over as the "ROSES OF NEW CASTLE." They have made this charming little city known the world over as the "Rose City." As far off as Africa, in the Congo Free State, and in the palace of the King of Siam, our roses are known for their worth and beauty. We have no other trade mark or sign except the reputation of these famous, world-wide known roses. We are proud of them. We are proud of our business, and we are proud of our reputation, and we mean to maintain it, not only as it has been in the past generations, but in the future generations. The best trade mark in the world is one that is built upon honesty, integrity and fair dealing, and practicing the precepts of the Golden Rule. Sometimes we fail, but not intentionally, and when errors and mistakes occur, we are always glad to rectify them. We have sought in these pages to show from actual photographs the character of pot-grown roses, in the pot, out of it, and then again how it is wrapped, ready for shipment, and if the simple cultural instructions are followed, as given in this book, you will succeed. Of course, failures do occur and are bound to occur, but that is the exception to the rule.

The Best and Cheapest. The prices have no relation whatever to the quality of the stock and the cost of producing. In price they are the cheapest, and in quality they

are the best. Always on their own roots, pot-grown plants, backed by a lifetime reputation for honesty and integrity and handling by skilled experts, who have learned how to ship so they will travel safely, even for two months, as you will note in another part of this book. "Roses of New Castle" are unlike most of the rose plants now being sold. They are growing and in full foliage, just the same as they are in your gardens, and they can be planted any time you elect during the growing season, from early spring to late fall. There is no "Closed Season" for them.

Not Nurserymen. We are not nurserymen. Field-grown, wild-root roses may be planted only in March or April or late fall. Such plants are dormant, and can be produced at a very low price. Only the great equipment we have here and the proper accessories, requiring a large investment, enables us to produce these famous "Roses of New Castle," and to develop them here before you purchase them. They are the character of plants that the amateur can safely depend upon.

How to Grow the Roses of New Castle

OWN-ROOT ROSES BEST AND CHEAPEST

FIRST of all it must be borne in mind, that the "ROSES OF NEW CASTLE" are prepared for the amateur planter, and all risk of failure is removed before the plants are shipped. This is not true of most rose plants. Our plants are grown by skilled growers, and are now in full foliage, growing in large pots or crocks. The real test of a rose plant is in its roots. The root action is the heart of the plant. We develop the roots, instead of expecting you to do it after you buy the plants. Right there is the nub of what constitutes a good rose plant. Dormant plants, without foliage or active working roots, nursery grown, with wild roots, are less costly to produce than roses which are on their own roots, and always growing in large pots or crocks. Field-grown, wild-root plants must be planted in March or April in the Middle and Northern states. You must take the chance of starting them into active growth. You must watch for wild suckers from the roots, and cut them out constantly. Unless you are experienced, you won't be able to determine which is a wild shoot. If permitted to develop, soon these wild shoots will crowd out the less vigorous, tame part of the plant, and you have nothing but a wild rose, of no value whatever. To avoid all of this

loss and disappointment, insist on knowing before you buy, if the plants are on their own roots or whether they are budded or grafted on wild roots, such as Manetti, Multiflora, or other wild roses which are used for that purpose. The "FAMOUS ROSES OF NEW CASTLE" cost much

more to produce, but they COST YOU LESS to buy than wild-root plants. They are on their own roots, and as long as any part of the root is alive you still have the REAL rose. Here in New Castle, on the grounds of the Federal Building, we have seen them develop, in a single year, to a size not usually obtained in five years, enormous plants, magnificent in size and health. There is no comparison in price, because of the skilled treatment they receive before they are sent out. They are in a class by themselves, the last word in rose perfection, the best and cheapest rose plants in America.

Preparation of Soil.

Now as to their cultivation. There is so much misinformation printed in various publications, written by inexperienced rosarians, that nearly all such articles might safely and profitably remain unprinted. Elaborate instructions in preparing the soil, expensive plans of unnecessary drainage and a multitude of don'ts and do's to follow, lists of roses, many of which are foreign grown and unsuitable to the varying

ROSE-GROWING MADE EASY

Don't Bother with Budding or Grafting.
Briar is Always a Nuisance.

"The common belief that all modern roses must be budded or grafted to secure permanent trees is not accurate, says 'Answers' (England). Roses growing on their own roots will give results equal to any produced on briars.

"Growing budded roses is a source of endless trouble to many novices. The briar grows up and the grower, not knowing it from the real rose growth, allows it full scope. In a year or two the briar has asserted itself, taken full control, and nothing but dog-roses are produced.

"With roses on their own roots, there is never any of this trouble. Should the bush be cut down by frost at any time and the roots not harmed, real rosewood is again produced in the spring. On the other hand, many amateurs have set out to plant a rose bed and secured the best of budded stocks, but in a year or two have had only briars for their trouble.

"With a budded rose you may get more vigorous growth, and probably a more robust bloom, but give a rose, growing on its own roots, liberal treatment and it will come in first every time.

"The gardener who sets out to grow roses on their own roots simplifies his work."



climatic conditions of this country—all of this, and more, only confuses the mind of the average amateur, and has actually discouraged many folks who want a few rose bushes for the pleasure they will give, and not the burden involved, according to these complex instructions, which we so often read. Our roses will grow and bloom beautifully under the most ordinary conditions. Good garden soil, such as will grow corn, peas, beans, etc., is ideal. When it is possible, enrich the soil with well rotted manure. Cow manure is best. Horse manure, if thoroughly rotted, will do. Use chicken, pig, sheep and other animal manures sparingly, if at all. Bone meal, air slacked lime, Walker's Plant Food may be used lightly—very lightly. Spade deep—fifteen inches or more if you can, for reasonable drainage and to hold moisture in hot weather.

When to Plant. Plant after all danger of frost is past, and any time thereafter that suits you. There is no closed season for planting our roses; being pot grown, they may be set out in the Northern and Middle states any time during the growing season, spring, summer and fall. In the Southern and Pacific Coast states, plant whenever it suits best. Our plants are always ready to plant and with perfect safety.

How to Plant. Plant them as a rule, if in beds, 18 to 24 inches apart. Nothing iron-clad about this. Plant to suit yourself or your space. Put the plant down well into the soil—deeper than they have been grown in the soil here. Firm them thoroughly into the soil, leaving a slight depression around the plant to hold the moisture. After planting, pour the water around the roots until you are sure that the soil at the bottom of the roots is well dampened. Don't be afraid to water them at this period, and when this is done don't water too much afterwards. Roses are like corn; they like hot, dry spells and heavy rains. If the roots are kept wet all the time the young feeding roots will not develop, so if they dry out now and then it will be helpful, and if you must water—water them well after such drying periods. Roots are developed when the plants are on the dry side from time to time. If you have water under pressure, syringe the foliage frequently. It helps to maintain health, just as we all find a bath refreshing, as well as healthful. As the plants bloom, cut the

flowers as they appear, and have the pleasure they are intended to give. As you cut them it helps to develop more blooming shoots. When the plants are growing actively, feed them, say every ten days to two weeks, lightly, of course. Use Walker's Plant Food, Stim-U-Plant tablets, both are very effective. If insects should appear, and they are not likely to as long as the plants are healthy, use a spray of Sulpho-Tobacco Soap or Melrosine.

Winter Protection. This writer, after a lifetime of observation, has arrived at the conclusion that more rose plants are killed from too much, misdirected kindness than all other causes combined. In my own yard I have Tea Roses, Baby Ramblers, Hybrid Teas and Hybrid Perpetuals. I have never protected my plants at all, and have lost practically none. I don't say this is a rule to be followed, but I do say this. A large percentage of amateur planters, as soon as the first heavy frost comes, commence covering their rose plants. This is the wrong procedure. Don't commence protection until real freezing weather comes—then put a light covering around the plants, leaves, litter, straw or, if you wish, some coarse, well rotted stable manure, with plenty of straw in it, then add the lighter covering as the weather gets colder. This will allow for circulation of air around the plant. Don't smother it out. That's harmful. Now, here again, is the value of the ROSES OF NEW CASTLE. Because they are on their own roots, the tops may be completely winter killed, but they will start again from the roots the following spring. Not so with the nursery-grown, wild-root rose plants. If their tops are winter killed you have nothing left but a wild root. Our roses are therefore more enduring, far more valuable, and it is not unusual for them to last a lifetime. If you protect along the lines indicated, or you can follow the general suggestions, as these simple rules are laid down in a general way and you can change them to suit your circumstances. Uncover the plants in the early spring, gradually, just the same as you covered them, so when all danger of freezing is over you will have them practically uncovered, except the mulching of manure can remain and can be scratched in the soil later on. Now don't cover too early or too much, and don't let the covering stay on too long in the early spring.



Pruning. When plants fail to mature the buds which they bear, remove a large percentage of the undeveloped buds and imperfect blooms. If the bushes are more spreading than desired they can be pruned back without injury about one-third of their growth in early spring, before they foliage out.

Mildew. Mildew does not seriously damage, but makes the plant unsightly. The remedy is to dust the foliage in the morning while the dew is yet upon it, with sulphur flour, which may be had at almost any grocery or drug store.

General Information. After planting, if the leaves turn yellow and drop off, do not be alarmed. This is Nature's way of conserving the vitality of the plant. It will immediately throw out new and stronger shoots. If the yellow leaves do not drop off, pull them off. This will help the plant. If the plants during the growing season develop diseased foliage, that means the root action is poor and the plant needs nourishment, in the way of a good plant food or well rotted cow manure. We recommend the insecticides and fertilizers listed opposite, to promote health and vigor.

If these simple instructions are followed in a general way, you will have splendid success, provided you plant these famous "ROSES OF NEW CASTLE." There is no burden attached to growing them successfully. No mystery about it. Of course, you should not plant roses too close to trees or other plants. The more sunshine the better. Partial shade will not stand in the way, but roses like sunshine—plenty of it.

HINTS ON GROWING CHRYSANTHEMUMS

Chrysanthemums are of a very hardy nature, and may be set out from early spring clear up until cold weather. They are among the most useful and ornamental of all out-door plants.

Plant in good, rich garden soil and do not over water, but keep them moist to the bottom of the roots. Give good drainage by digging the soil deep. After the plants develop, enrich them with a good standard fertilizer, such as Walker's Plant Food, offered elsewhere in this book; also mulch around the plants with well rotted manure.

When flower buds appear, give them plenty of food. If you want extra large flowers, pinch off small buds, leaving the strength to go into the remaining ones.

For insects use Sulpho-Tobacco Soap, offered elsewhere in this book, spraying the plants with this solution.

Mulch heavily during the winter. In extremely cold climates the clumps may be brought in and stored over the winter in a cool, dark cellar, then plant them out again early in spring.
