

NOTICE TO CUSTOMERS OUTSIDE OF THE UNITED STATES

In remitting for purchases at the time of ordering, or when paying accounts, by reason of the Exchange we ask that you please send P. O. Money order in U. S. Funds or a check or draft on a New York or Philadelphia Bank in par U. S. Funds.

BUSINESS TERMS

We especially invite Charge Accounts which is more con-venient than to remit for each order at the time it is sent us. When sending your first charge order, please send us the names and addresses of two or more business houses with whom you have had past or present credit relations.

REGARDS C. O. D. SHIPMENTS

Goods can be sent C. O. D. (with the exception of perishable items, which include plants and cold-storage bulbs; these can-not be sent C. O. D.). No C. O. D. shipments for any kind of goods can be made by express or freight out of town unless a partial remittance accompanies the order. No C. O. D. orders can be accepted where the amount is less than \$1.00.

SHIPPING INSTRUCTIONS

Always state by what method you want goods forwarded, otherwise we will ship according to our best judgment.

PACKING CHARGES

No charge is made for boxes, packing or bags, except for two-bushel seamless sacks, which are returnable for credit at the market price as charged. Any extra charges over actual postage on Parcel Post orders is for extra packing required.

FORWARDING SERVICE

We pay postage charges on all orders for vegetable and flower seeds, provided the order calls for packets, ounces, quarter-pounds and pounds (beans, corn, peas and mixed grass seeds, bulbs, plants and sundries are not included). If these are wanted by mail, remit for postage the amount named in connection with the item up to and including the third zone; for other zones add additional postage, or consult your Post Office for rates.

PARCEL POST RATES

On Seeds, Bulbs, Plants or Roots not exceeding eight (8) ounces in weight, the postage charge is 1c. for each two (2) ounces or fraction thereof; on Sundries or other Merchandise not exceeding eight (8) ounces in weight, the postage charge is $1\frac{1}{2}c$, for each two (2) ounces or fraction thereof. Seeds, Bulbs, Plants, Roots, Sundries, etc., weighing over eight (8) ounces are sent at zone rates.

Parcel Post weight limits are 70 lbs. in 1st, 2d and 3d zone; in all other zones 50 lbs.

All Plants, Roots and Bulbs are forwarded by Express (or parcel post when possible) purchaser paying charges, unless otherwise noted.

For those of our customers who prefer to receive such goods by Parcel Post, we will be pleased to forward in this manner such plants as can be sent in this way at the following additional cost, which must be added to the value of each order for Plants, Roots or Bulbs unless otherwise noted.

To all points east of the Mississippi River, 15 per cent. extra to cover postage and packing charges.

To all points west of the Mississippi River, 25 per cent. extra.

Poisons cannot be sent by parcel post

If Special Delivery is wanted an additional 10c, is required on packages weighing up to two (2) pounds—15c, on packages weighing more than two (2) pounds and up to ten (10) pounds—20c, on packages weighing more than ten (10) pounds.

If it is desired that a package be given the same dispatch as first class mail it quires an additional 25 cents to the amounts as stated above, which is called a "Special Handling" rate.

If remittance accompanies order, a sufficient amount should be included to cover the extra charges-if ordered to be sent by either of the methods as stated above.



SAFE ARRIVAL.—We guarantee the safe arrival of all goods sent to points within the United States except when shipped to points where there is no express or freight agent, to such points the purchaser must assume any claim for loss or damage.

LOCAL DELIVERY.—Our free delivery service covers Philadelphia and the following points: Fox Chase, Lawndale, City Line in the Old York Road district, Bala, Cynwyd, Wynnefield, Overbrook, Bywood, Drexel Hill, Stonehurst, High-land Park. Lansdowne, Falls of Schuylkill, Roxborough and Manayunk.

Also note that we do not guarantee to maintain a daily delivery to these points.

Please note the free delivery service does not include bulky quantities of fertilizers in over 1/4 ton quantities. Special arrangements can however be made for delivery of these.

Shipment of goods can also be made by package service from Market and Chest-nut St. Ferries, Broad St. Station, Reading Terminal and B. & O. R. R., at 24th and Chestnut Sts.

The tariff for shipments that can be made by this method on merchandise they will receive packed in one piece is as follows:

10 lbs. and under, 12c.	25 lbs.	to	40 lbs.,	24c.
10 lbs. to 25 lbs., 18c.	40 lbs.	to	50 lbs.,	30c.

Shipments weighing more cannot be sent via Package Service.

2 MICHELL'S POT-GROWN STRAWBERRY PLANTS

EXTRA SELECTED STOCK-STRONG AND WELL ROOTED. WILL YIELD A FULL CROP OF BERRIES NEXT SEASON. READY ABOUT JULY 1st.


The time of shipment is from July 1st to September 15th. The advantages in planting pot-grown strawberry plants are realized by a full crop of berries the following year. Our plants are carefully grown in clay pots and prior to shipment are taken out of the pots with the original ball of earth at their roots and well wrapped in paper in which they are forwarded, thus insuring the buyer getting them in first-class order and reducing the transportation charges about 25 per cent.

CULTURAL NOTE ON STRAWBERRIES

Strawberries delight in good rich soil that has had plenty of manure added to it. The plants should be set 12 to 15 inches apart in rows 2 feet apart. A row 100 feet long requires approxapart in rows 2 feet apart. A row 100 feet long requires approx-imately 75 to 100 plants or about 14,500 per acre. If the weather is dry when planting, water well at the time and for a few days thereafter, if it is possible. Press the soil well around the ball when planting, and keep the soil well cultivated, cutting off all runners that may form. At the approach of permanent winter it pays to cover the entire bed to a depth of 2 inches with clean straw or salt hay. This protects the plants during severe weather. Do not use because as they held the meisture and eause damage to the not use leaves, as they hold the moisture and cause damage to the plants in winter. At the approach of spring, rake the covering from the plants proper and leave it between the rows; this will serve as a mulch during the summer, protecting against drought, and also keeping the fruit more free from sand; at the same time to a large measure controls the growth of weeds.

This type, while producing its main crop of berries with the general sorts, continues uninterruptedly to mature its fruit, until checked by hard frosts; it has actually been known to bear strawberries until Christmas, when the weather is open and mild. In order to get the greatest crop of berries late, the blossoms should be kept cut off until August 1st, so as to conserve the energies of the plants for the fall crop.

- Mastodon Everbearing Wonder. This is unquestionably the most prolific of everbearing varieties. Bears continuously from June till frost; the late bearing fruits being as large as the early crop; berries are of excellent quality. EXTRA STRONG CELERY PLANTS (Ready about July 10th)

A WORD ON CELERY CULTURE.-Celery delights in a good, rich, moist soil. Locations where the soil may become dry should be avoided. Nothing is more beneficial or so little work as the watering of celery during periods of drought. After it has been transplanted and made some growth, the plants should be set in permanent rows 6 to 8 inches apart in the row. Many private gardeners prefer to use the two-row system of trenches, it will be found very advantageous to work. If the idea of the market gard-ener is carried out, the celery is planted in single rows about 2 feet apart, 6 or 8 inches apart in the row. By the former method the celery is usually banked up to blanch until almost entirely covered with soil; the top is then covered with leaves or other litter as winter approaches. In the single-row system the celery is banked up gradually to blanch, and after this process is over, at the approach of winter it is dug up and laid in shallow trenches after being cleaned. Storing for winter is done by covering it with waterproof celery paper and topping off with soil or leaves. Good cultivation is highly necessary during the growing period.

- French Golden Self Blanching. One of the earliest and most productive sorts. The heart is a rich golden-yellow; excellent flavor.
- Giant Pascal. One of the largest stalked kinds. It is in its prime for use during February and March.
- White Plume. The White Plume is unsurpassed for fall and early winter use, requiring very little earthing to blanch it; stalks pure white, crisp and brittle.
- Winter Queen. This variety grows a very thick, solid and heavy stalk, and has a large heart. It is a close, compact grower and, when blanched is a creamy-white color.



Place a handful of well-rotted cow manure in the bottom of the pot and place the bulb directly on top, covering it with soil. After watering, place in an outside pit and protect from the direct rays of the sun; cover well with soil, ashes or any other suitable litter.
