

At the present time G: & R. peony plantings cover eighty acres in our nurseries—the largest plantings of their kind in the world devoted exclusively to root production.

Our Guarantee

We guarantee our Peonies true to name.

Should error occur, we will replace with true stock or refund amount paid. There is one fact about Peonies that should be brought forcibly to the attention of all purchasers of Peony roots. That is, it takes fully three years from the time the root is planted before the Peony becomes adequately established to enable it to produce normal flowers We do not pretend to come to final conclusions regarding them until they have bloomed the third year from planting.

Peonies to Bloom for Decoration Day

We are often asked for a list of varieties that will bloom for the 30th of May. In the latitude of Springfield, Ohio, the following are usually blooming at that date: Edulis Superba, Madame Calot, Festiva Maxima and Monsieur Jules Elie. For points located about 39th parallel all varieties marked Early Mid-season and Mid-season will bloom for Memorial Day.

Size of Roots

Divided Roots—This is a root divided until it has from three to five eyes. This is the size we always plant and recommend for general planting, both as to the desirability of its low cost and the results obtained.

Time of Delivery

The varieties in this list are offered for Fall 1929 and Spring 1930 delivery—commencing September 15th, In completing our new Peony Storage (which will hold roots in complete dormant condition until May 1st), we are enabled to offer this list of varieties for Spring 1929 delivery. Orders must reach us by November 10th, so that we may place the roots in storage for Spring shipment whenever customer desires. Early orders will, we believe, prove mutually advantageous.


