HOW TO PLANT ROGES SUCCESSFULLY.

Roses can be trainsplained successfully if the following directions are observed. First. Cut back the tops severally, outting back each cane to three or four buds. Shorten the roots a little. Do not expose roots to sun or wind. Second. Dig a roomy hole at least 6 in hes whiler than spread of roots and deep set plant well down in hole. Fill hole two thirds full of rich soil, tamping the soil firmly around the roots as heary filled up. Third. Water the plant thoroughly and generously, allowing water to soak in ground before filling the hole. Fourth, Cover the newly set plant with a mound of soil at least 6 inches high, completely covering the plant. This prevents the plant from drying out. After a four or five in a growth has pushed thru the soil, then rake away the mound of diffirom the plant gently. Follow these directions and success will be yours and don't forget to protect your roses during the winter months.
