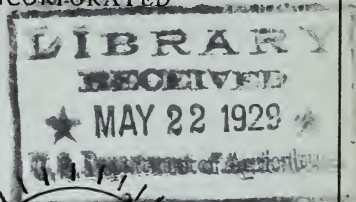

**COMPLAINTS**—Should there be any reason for complaint, we must be notified on receipt of goods, otherwise we cannot entertain it.

**DELIVERY**—We charge for delivery of stock, based on the size of truck required and the distance.

**ORDERS**—Are accepted on condition that they shall be void should any injury befall the stock from frost, or other causes over which we have no control.

**GUARANTEE OF GENUINENESS**—While we exercise the greatest care to have all our trees and plants genuine and reliable, and hold ourselves prepared to replace on proper proof, all trees that prove untrue, we do not give any warranty, express or implied; in case of any error on our part it is mutually agreed between the purchaser and ourselves that we should not at any time be held responsible for a greater amount than the original price of the stock.
