Depth to Cover the Seed. Following is a good general rule—cover to a depth equal to  $2\frac{1}{2}$  times the diameter of the seed. Exceptions—50 per cent deeper when sowing during hot weather, or on soils that dry out quickly; 50 per cent less deep when sowing on heavy land or during wet weather.

Radish is a strong germinator, while Beet, Parsley, Carrot, Celery, Parsnip, Onion and some others are was it is recommended to mix a small quantity of Radish with these seeds when sowing, removing the Radishs end the Radishs sed lings break the soil crust and quickly mark your row.
