ALPINE and ROCK PLANTS

Every garden should include a rockery, but unfortunately, outside of the large estates, very few are to be found. This is somewhat remarkable, as the rockery lends itself well to the small town garden. While it may be extensive, on the other hand, a charming effect may be obtained by a nice arrangement of suitable stones and a judicious selection of plants in an odd corner if only a few feet across.

We carry a large stock of rock plants, and while space in the catalog is not sufficient to list a very large number of them, we offer below a collection of fifty varieties, differing in habit, color and time of flowering, which should be of assistance to the amateur especially in forming the nucleus of a collection of these interesting plants. Gardeners who fail to see here any particular variety required are invited to write for prices, stating their requirements.

The Spring planting period varies slightly with the character of the season, but may generally be considered to extend from March to about June 1st.

Depth to Cover the Seed. Following is a good general rule—cover to a depth equal to 2½ times the diameter of the seed. Exceptions—50 per cent deeper when sowing during hot weather, or on soils that dry out quickly; 50 per cent less deep when sowing on heavy land or during wet weather.

A Good Hint. Radish is a strong germinator, while Beet, Parsley, Carrot, Celery, Parsnip, Onion and some others are weak; it is recommended to mix a small quantity of Radish with these seeds when sowing, removing the Radishes afterwards. Radish seedlings break the soil crust and quickly mark your row. This process is particularly advantageous upon soils that bake.

White Big Boston Lettuce

BEET, *Winter Keeper*

This Beet is also known as *Long Season* and *Coal Black*.

It is a late Beet, not of handsome shape, but of exceptionally fine quality, remaining sweet and tender even when very large.

The Beets will keep all Winter and retain their fine quality until Spring. They are half long, very dark red and have green foliage.

BROCCOLI, *Real Italian*

There is a growing demand for this vegetable, which is very similar to Cauliflower, both in culture and cooking.

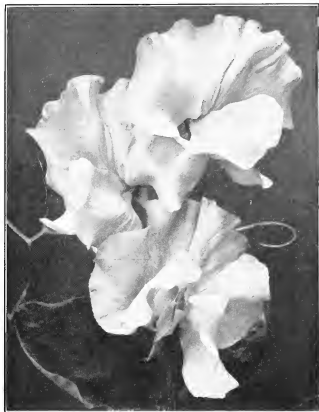

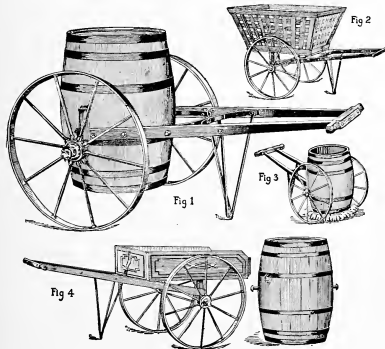
Fig. 1—Shows the barrel cart, to which any barrel spray pump can be attached. This is a very handy and convenient combination for spraying fruit trees, chicken houses, as well as watering and spraying the gardens.
