WHEN the crisp days of autumn come, and the cool nights; when the Roses bloom more red and more golden and richer pink than at any other season-now, more than ever, it is a delight to go among them planning new arrangements, considering additions to the stock of this or that favorite variety, weighing the merits of new varieties seen or heard about, and wondering which, where, and when to order them.

There is no reason why it should not be done at once. Almost always perfect success is assured in autumn planting if the simple protective measures given below are taken. Plants are strong, new, and full of summer's vigor now; and we dig and ship them as they are ordered, so that there is the least possible delay between our fields and your garden, and no loss of their precious vitality.

Prepare the beds in September or early October, if possible, by digging them 18 inches deep. Enrich the soil with well-rotted stable or cow-manure or other suitable fertilizer. Let the ground settle until the Roses arrive, so that it will be firm. Dig holes large enough to be comfortable for the roots, which should be spread horizontally with the ends pointing downward. In filling the holes, tamp the earth tightly until they are half full, then fill them with water and wait until it has entirely drained away before finishing. Cut back the tops of the plants slightly, leaving a foot or more of the branches. Before the ground freezes hill the soil about the plants as high as possible. Later, protect with a layer of light litter which will insure their safety over winter.

## MALUS • Flowering Crab Apples

## Six of the Newest and Finest Phlox Decussata

Phloxes are very showy and extremely useful hardy plants. They deserve a prominent position in every garden, since they thrive in most soils, although a rich loam is most desirable. The flower-bed should be deeply spaded and manured previous to planting. Do not plant less than five of each variety, otherwise the effective coloring of mass planting will be lost. By growing a complete collection of Phlox, a continuity of bloom can be had from early June until late faII. Height 2 to 3 feet.
