

FLOWERS BY TELEGRAPH Through the Florists Telegraph HOW IT IS DONE

Parties desiring flowers delivered to friends or relatives in any part of the world, whereever there may be a commercial florist, may have them delivered at once or whenever desired by giving the correct address, specifying the choice of Flowers, Basket, Spray or Funeral Piece, etc., wanted and the amount they wish to pay, plus the cost of telegram and delivery charge, in case the flowers must be sent to a nearby town where no florist is located.

All members of the Florists Telegraph Delivery Association are supplied each month with a complete list and address of all members in good standing, thereby insuring the customer a sure and prompt delivery, provided the correct address has been given. In case the party for whom the flowers were ordered cannot be found, your florist is notified and your money refunded, less the cost of telegrams.

Another book is in the possession of the florist which gives the names and location of almost every city and hamlet in the United States and several other countries, stating whether or not there is a florist there. If not, the name of the nearest city to which an order may be sent and the flowers forwarded by Parcels Post, Express or Stage—the cost of which is deducted from the total amount of your order. Your card, of course, to accompany every package.

If order is to be delivered the next day or thereafter, we advise a night letter of 50 words which is cheaper and allows the florist to fully explain your order and include any message you may wish to send. Night letter rates east of Chicago, \$1.20; west of Chicago and east of Rocky Mountains, 90c; Portland, 48c; Spokane and Seattle, 30c. Every day we receive orders for delivery at home and for delivery elsewhere.
