Thepage Early Dent. A combination of white and yellow dent produced on both red and white cobs. It is well adapted for ensilage in sections of high elevation. Ears are 8 to 10 inches long, stalks from 10 to 12 feet high.

Luce's Favorite. (Northern Grown) A hybrid variety growing from 10 to 12 feet high. Ears 10 to 12 inches long. Large, bright yellow kernels.

Golden Ensilage. This variety has proven to have great merit. 8 to 10 feet tall, ears 8 to 10 inches long, somewhat similar to West Branch in appearance, except the kernels are more yellow.

Cornell No. 11. Heavy yielding, matures in the northern states. Ears 9 to 11 inches long, stalks about 8 feet high. Bright yellow. One of the best for ensilage.

Minnesota No. 13. A 90 day variety producing ears averaging 8 inches in length, with 16 to 20 rows of bright, rich yellow, smooth kernels. A fine dent for northern planting.

Golden Glow. An early variety growing 8 to 10 feet high, bearing ears 6 to 9 inches long, with golden yellow kernels. Is highly recommended for ensilage.

Page's West Branch. Ears 10 to 12 inches long, about 8 inches in circumference. Golden yellow grains, some with reddish cast, some with white caps. Often yields as high as 20 tons of ensilage to the acre. Our strain is the best.

Lancaster Sure Crop. Produces an abundance of green fodder, thus making it an excellent corn for ensilage. It develops early. Kernels are orange yellow with slightly paler cap.

Early Triumph. A large grained, early variety, being a cross between a flint and a dent. Stalks, ears and kernels are of medium size. Color is bright yellow. Does well in sections of short seasons.

Early Eureka. Three weeks earlier than Page's True Eureka. Not as large, nor as many ears. Large white dent. Produces a large tonnage.

Hundred Day Bristol. Ears 10 to 12 inches long, 10 to 14 rows of yellowish straw colored kernels. White cobs, stalks 8 to 12 feet tall. Is a heavy yielder and hardy.

Northwestern Red Dent. A hybrid variety. Classed with the earliest varieties. Produces a heavy growth of stalk. Is a fine variety for fodder and growing in demand.

White Cap Yellow Dent. Ears of good size, well filled with good size grains, the tops of which are white capped, the lower part being yellow.

Early Mastodon. Stalks are of good size, usually bearing 3 or 4 ears which average about 11 inches long. Its many desirable qualities cause it to be sold as a novelty under many different names at high prices.

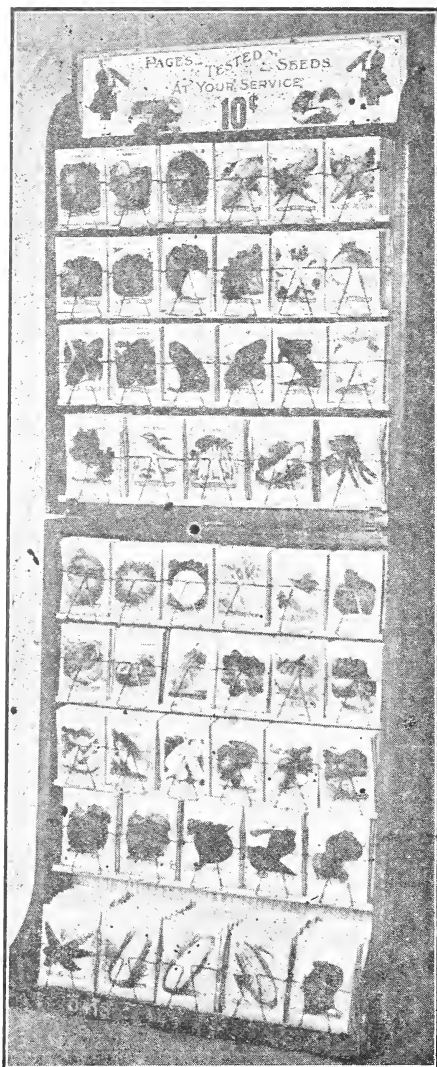
