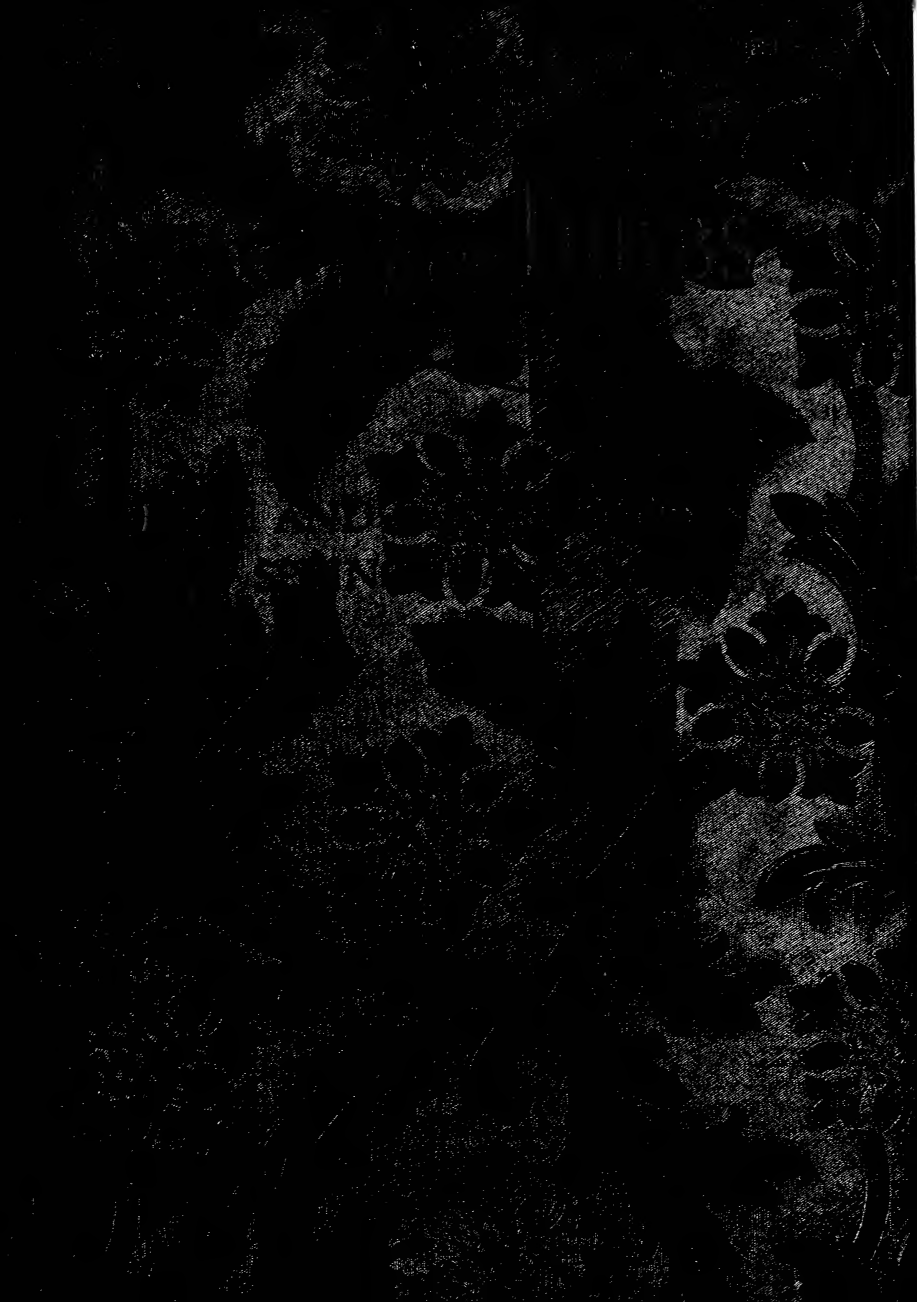

NO flowers are more valuable in the mid-summer and autumn gardens than the Gladioli; their uses are unlimited. The great range of their colors enables them to bear a part in any scheme of color, and by careful selection of proper varieties and proper timing of planting they may be brought into bloom at any time from June to November in the garden and from November to June they may be had in bloom under glass.

Gladioli will give satisfactory results in any good garden soil. The depth of planting for the corms differs with the character of the soil. The lighter the soil the deeper the corms should be set, and in dry seasons this deep planting is of great advantage, as it insures a cool and more or less moist environment for the roots. Deep planting has the further advantage of very largely doing away with the necessity of staking. In heavy, moist soils, however, there is danger in too deep planting, as the soil may become too wet and cause the young shoots and even the corms (bulbs) to rot.

The general method is to plant in rows from 1½ feet to 4 feet apart, depending upon the method of cultivation to be employed. Dig a trench 5 inches deep and 2 inches wide at the bottom. Place the corms (bulbs) on the bottom of the trench 3 inches to 5 inches apart and then fill the trench with soil.

They like plenty of air and sunshine under which conditions they will grow to perfection. In dry seasons they should be thoroughly watered; a little sprinkling

in the evening is of only slight benefit; give them a thorough soaking so that the soil is wet 5 inches deep and then leave them alone for a week.

Cultivate after every rain or watering; keep the surface of the soil loose and open; give the nitrogen a chance to get into the soil where things are growing.

Do not plant Gladioli in the same patch many years in succession. New ground each year is best. Do not use horse manure as fertilizer. Ground fertilized with old cow manure the previous year is best.

Unpack the bulbs as soon as received and give them a thorough airing; keep in a good dry cellar until ready to plant.

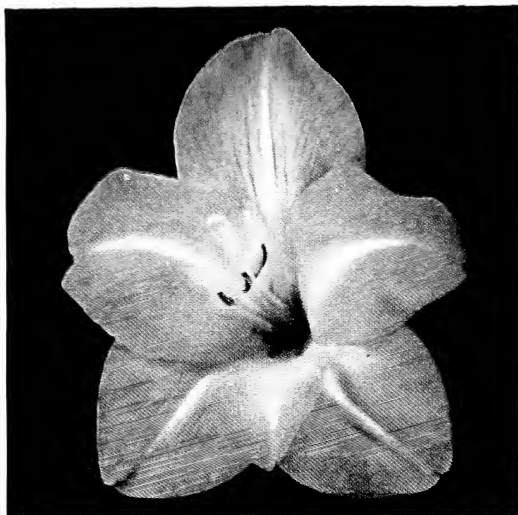

OUR NEW GLADIOLUS INTRODUCTIONS

MRS. E. H. MAYTAG (*Midseason*). An outstanding novelty, greatly admired by all visitors to our trial gardens. The flowers are well placed with six or more open at one time. The color is an exquisite shade of soft salmon-pink. Slightly ruffled. A very strong and graceful grower. Each, \$5; \$45 for 10.

GLADIOLI *Art Shades*

AUTUMN FASCINATION (*Herbst-Zauber*) (*Late*). Beautiful warm salmon-copper color. The artistically colored flowers are very large and of exquisite form. Several blooms open at one time on tall, straight stem. One of the latest to flower. \$7 for 10, \$68 per 100.

DESDEMONE (*Late*). Immense flowers of ashy rose, striped violet, large dark red blotch edged with ivory-white. Scarce. \$4.25 for 10; \$40 per 100.

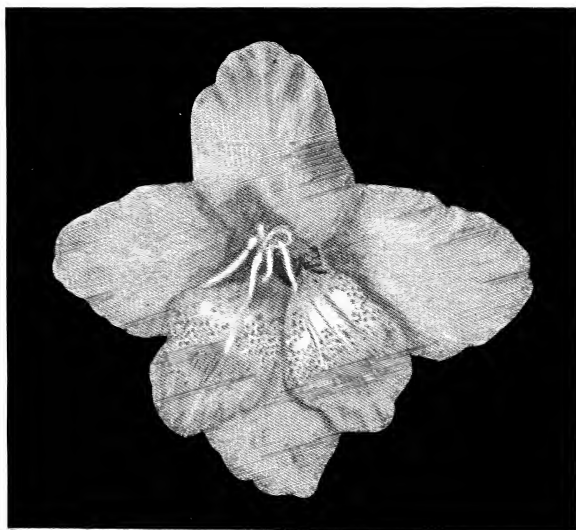

RED COPPER (*Midseason*). Large flower, deep salmon-rose, heavily flaked blue. Lower petals red, white and yellow, penciled with blue. Wonderfully odd and attractive. \$1.25 for 10; \$10 per 100.

ROSE ASH (*Midseason*). Corinthian-red shading into ashes-of-Roses on the outer edges. Lower petals light yellow speckled with ruby. Flowers large and well placed. HEAVENLY BLUE (*Midseason*). Aniline-blue. Some years ago we did not dare to think of Gladioli with such a tender heliotrope-lilac color as that of "Heavenly Blue." 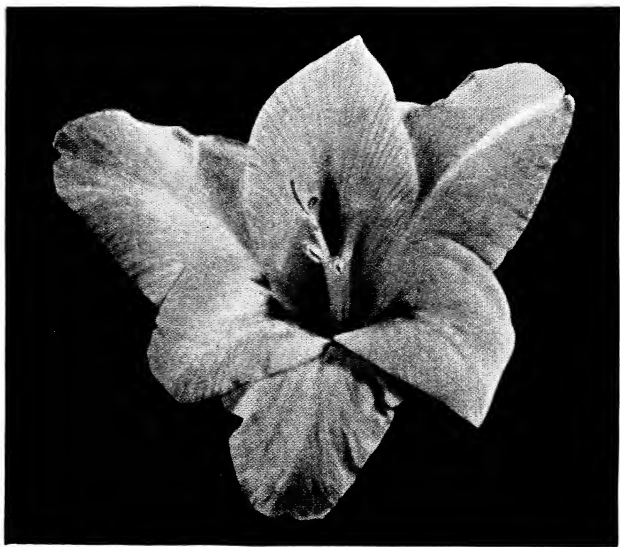

MRS. FREDERICK C. PETERS (*Late*). Beautiful shade of rose-lilac, with crimson blotch bordered white on lower segment; resembles an Orchid in color. Flowers of large size and many open at one time on a strong stem. Awarded First Class Certificate of Merit by the Massachusetts Horticultural Society and other High Awards. \$1 for 10; \$7.50 per 100.

MRS. VAN KONIJNENBURG (*Midseason*). Matchless aniline-blue; grows five feet tall carrying beautiful blooms, many open at one time, well placed. Superior to any blue variety so far introduced. It has peculiar lasting power as a cut flower when worn as a corsage bouquet and therefore kept out of water. 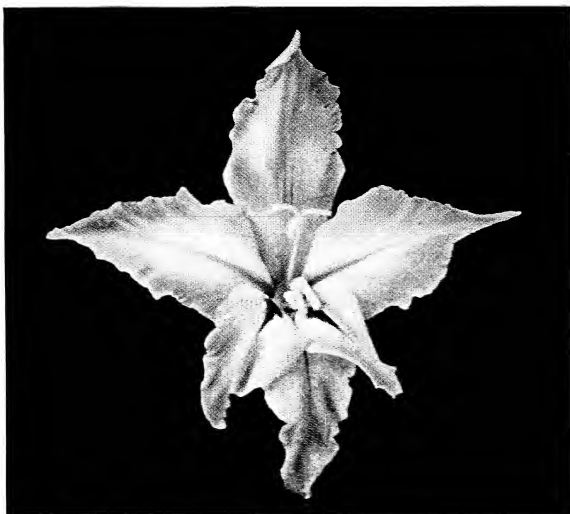

- HENRY FORD** (*Late*). Very dark rhodamine-purple shading into deeper tones near the center; a very clear color. The many flowers, placed on extra strong spike, are very large. Of surpassing merit. \$1.25 for 10; \$10 per 100.

MONTBRETIAS

MONTBRETIAS are graceful, sparkling flowers of the mid-summer and autumn, reflecting the colors of the advancing year and lending a charming gaiety and lightness to the borders.

For the best effect the bulbs, more correctly called "corms," should be set only a few inches apart, and in groups of not less than a dozen, near the front of herbaceous borders or shrubbery. Thus planted the sheaves of narrow leaves and slender, arching stems strung with brilliant flowers, like miniature Gladioli, have the appearance of little fountains of bright color—rose, scarlet, yellow, orange, red, often marked with brown. They flower for many weeks, and a border where blue and white flowers predominate set at intervals with such gay patches of color, is delightful indeed.

Their long lasting qualities make Montbretias most admirable for cutting, so that it is well to have a few hundred bulbs set out in some by-place where the graceful stems may be copiously cut for house and piazza decoration.

These Cape bulbs may with entire safety be left in the open ground over the winter, and merely covered with a light mulch. They may be set out in the spring as early as we plant Gladioli, and should be put in the ground at least five inches deep.

As with Gladioli, a quantity of these bulbs might well be planted in pint berry or wire baskets, early and at various times, kept in frost-proof cellar or frame, to be later plunged basket and all into vacant spaces in the borders or other parts of the garden.

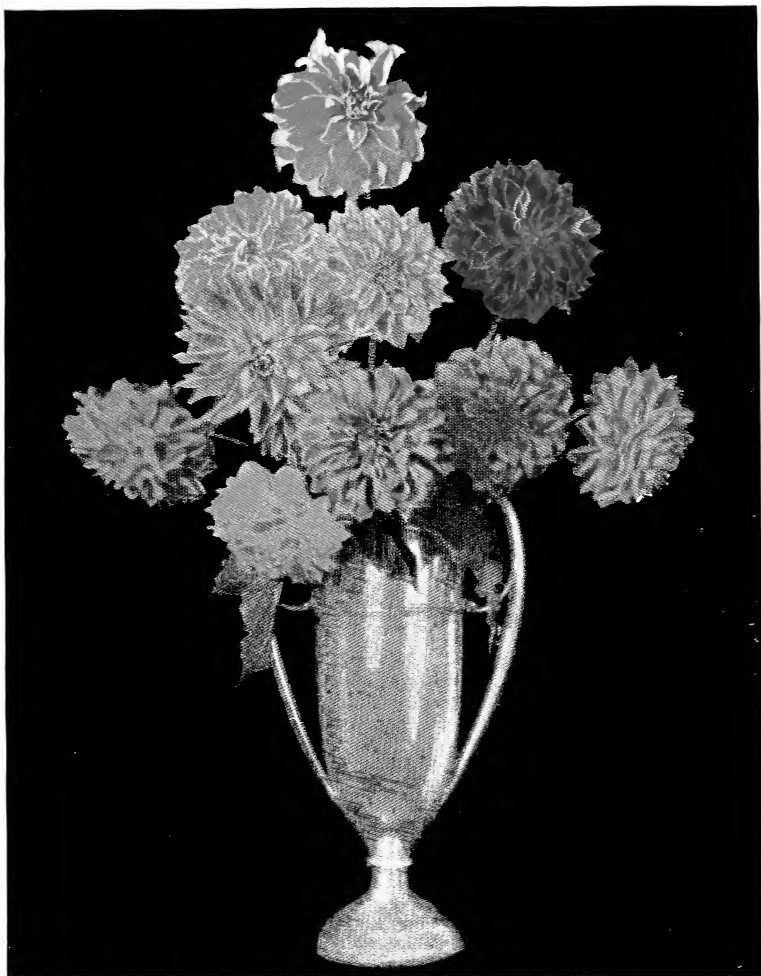

LILIUM AURATUM

Wild Collected Bulbs

AURATUM WILD COLLECTED BULBS. While in so many gardens *Lilium Auratum* does exceedingly well, even with a degree of permanency, in some gardens it seems capricious in its nature and some do not seem to have good success with it.

To those of you who have had this experience we would suggest that you try our **WILD COLLECTED BULBS** and plant them in deep soil. These collected bulbs, as different from the "Cultivated Bulbs" generally offered, seem to succeed remarkably well and produce good heads of flowers on strong spikes the first season after planting. They are particularly desirable for mass effects.

They are collected in the Mountain Regions of Japan in their native habitat. We suggest the planting of these **WILD COLLECTED BULBS** in closely set

beds, the beds somewhat raised and protected with wire of a quarter inch mesh against moles and their followers, the field mice. This close planting causes a natural shading of the young shoots.

It is a Lily so beautiful and of a color so lovely and unusual that it is worth taking pains with. It roots from the stem as well as from the bulb, and therefore should be

planted rather deep, fully eight inches. It has been known to give as many as seven blooms to a stem, though one and two flowers to a stem the first year is usual. The funnel-shaped, finely formed flowers are six inches or more in length, and as much across, of a beautiful clear pink color, often shaded blush. REGALE (*The Regal or Royal Lily*). One of the most beautiful, and one of the hardiest Lilies in cultivation—"Lilium Regale" is truly a royal Lily, worthy of a place in every garden; it is a lover of loam and sunshine.

A vigorous grower with sturdy stems, 4 to 6 feet high, densely covered with long, linear-lanceolate foliage. Center of flower flushed with yellow, shading to white at the outer edges; externally the flowers are streaked with brown on the "ribs," shaded through the almost translucent petals with a delightful pearly tint; the contrast between the rich wine color of the reverse of the petals and the gold shading of the throat is extraordinarily beautiful.

The Regal Lily is very floriferous and, when thoroughly established, bears as high as eighteen and twenty flowers during the season. Like most all other Lilies, especially the stem-rooting varieties, they should be planted deep—at least 9 inches, should have good drainage, and when growing they should be watered copiously with liquid manure as they are gross feeders. They succeed in any good rich garden soil.

In the herbaceous border, planted in clumps of 5 to 25 bulbs, they are especially attractive among the Delphiniums and other July flowering perennials. Where these magnificent Lilies are planted in quantity, the air in the cool of the morning and in the evening is laden with delicious perfume, exhaled from every blossom. On account of the great demand for

bulbs of Regale Lilies, millions have been grown from seed and consequently many inferior types are produced.

SPECIOSUM. Originally a native of Korea, deservedly one of the greatest favorites as a border plant, of daring as well as beautiful form. The petals are well rolled back and are handsomely spotted, often branded with distinct color. The style is thrown out in a curved line of much grace and strength. The stamens boldly diverge from it. The anthers are conspicuous for their size and color and extremely delicate poise. In addition to all these attractive qualities it has a strongly waved outline to the petals, which adds much to its beauty. It flowers through the late Summer into Autumn. To see the plants growing impresses one with a feeling of vigor and well being. Must be planted deep, because it forms an unusually strong mass of stem-roots.

The cultivation of this Lily lays no great tax on the resources or ingenuity of the planter, and its requirements once understood, it may be relied upon to prosper, sending up its flowering stems year after year in increasing numbers; while *Speciosum* will grow in limy soil, there can be no doubt that it is more at home in ground that is free from lime, and it may be grown to perfection in a rich, open, woodland soil overlying a stiff, sandy loam, into which its long roots can wander as they please.

On the richness of the top-soil depends the growth of the stem and flowers, and it is no exaggeration to say that one cannot mulch this Lily too much.

It opens its flowers so late in the season that it is probably best to plant *Lilium Speciosum* in full sunshine. Plant 10 or 12 inches deep, possibly among ground shading shrubs making sure as to drainage.

LILIES OF THE VALLEY

No dweller in the country should be without a generous bed of Lilies-of-the-Valley. In high and in lowly gardens these simple, fragrant flowers have ever been among the most welcomed of the year. In early times the dried or distilled blossoms were deemed a cure for many "griefs" of the flesh, and while our faith in their potency may be less firm to day, surely it is true that when we come unexpectedly upon the slender stems of frosted, scented bells hiding among the bright green leaves, we receive refreshment for the mind and the spirit.

The Lily-of-the-Valley is essentially a shade-loving plant. Beds should be given a northern or north-western exposure if possible, and the most desirable soil is a rich, sandy loam. In planting, the clumps should be set about three inches apart and about two inches below the surface. A dressing of well rotted manure and leaf mold in the autumn after the leaves have died down will insure more and finer flowers in the spring. The roots of this fair flower are poisonous.

LILY-OF-THE-VALLEY CLUMPS. Their importation having been restricted, they are very scarce. Extra heavy clumps for immediate effect, \$8 for 10; \$35 for 50; \$68 for 100.

THE Iris is the Orchid of the flower garden and with its varied and beautiful shades of color it lends itself in a manner unequalled by any other family of hardy plants to a great variety of grouping.

No hardy herbaceous border is complete without groups of Irises of different color shadings planted at intervals throughout the border, as they impart tone and color from April to July, while the soft glaucous grey shades of their foliage help to bring into relief the colors of other flowers. It should also be noted that the colors of the Iris family never clash with those of other flowers. Experience teaches us that the best method by which the most satisfactory results are obtained is to devote a portion of your garden entirely to the cultivation of Irises. While it can truly be said that no garden is complete without them, it is equally true that a very delightful garden can be made with nothing but Irises.

Such gardens are better developed on natural lines than on formal, that is to say, by irregular masses planted in arrangement which is never obvious, intersected with broad grassy pathways. In this manner the most charming effects are produced.

Irises can also be used to great advantage with Japanese Maples and flowering shrubs such as Lilacs and Viburnums, or with Pillar Roses or Clematis.

Since the Iris shows but little foliage in the spring, early Spring flowering bulbous subjects should be intro-

duced, such as Snowdrops, Crocuses, Chionodoxas, Muscari, Winter Aconites, Narcissi, etc.

Interplanting with *Lilium Regale* and other Lilies will greatly enhance the effect and beauty of an Iris garden extending the flowering season into July.

THE culture of the Bearded Irises offers no difficulties. But because they will grow under arid conditions, will survive in shade, and bravely assume the part, too often thrust upon them, of rescuing from desolation some garden region where little else will consent to grow, these willing plants are, more often than not, treated with scant consideration and denied the opportunity to develop the full measure of their beauty and nobility. Even so they pluckily grow and blossom; but give them their desire—abundant sunshine, good soil rich in lime and devoid of fresh manure, intelligent watering during dry seasons, particularly when the buds are forming—and the reward in multiplicity of flowers, in their improved color and size and texture, in the sturdy increase of the clumps, will astonish many a one who is under the impression that he is familiar with the manifold charms of color, the perfection of form of these most enchanting flowers.

Each Spring witnesses the introduction of many handsome Bearded Irises. Hybridists here and abroad are busy turning out creations that vie with the wings of butterflies in the extravagant loveliness of their colors and markings. To steer a course through this accumulated wealth of fine varieties, making a comprehensive selection, is no easy task. It has been our endeavor,

however, to make the collection we offer representative of the best work accomplished by American growers as well as by those noted abroad, and to retain the most valuable of the older varieties, discarding all that approach duplication or are of inferior quality.

We have given much careful study, in our trial grounds, in the gardens of others, and in the nurseries of the greatest specialists abroad, to the great number of varieties usually listed. We have noted the many similarities existing, and have finally selected what we would consider the most desirable varieties, so that you may plant all of the following in your garden without danger of regret.

DESCRIPTION OF VARIETIES

The number given in parenthesis following the name of the variety is the rating of the American Iris Society on the score of 100 representing perfection. Where this number is missing, no rating has as yet been given.

ALCAZAR (89). A giant in flower and growth. Standards—light bluish-violet. Falls—deep purple with a bronze-veined throat. One of the most magnificent and striking. Height, 3-4 feet. \$0.50 each.

DWARF BEARDED IRISES

THIS section is the first of the Bearded Irises to bloom. In the latitude of New York, they begin to bloom the latter part of April and continue during the first two weeks of May. They may be transplanted any time when the ground is not frozen. June, July and August are especially recommended as the best time to plant them.

Those that are 6 inches or less in height are especially interesting in a rock garden. Those that are ten inches or more in height are useful for planting in front of the later blooming varieties. The varieties listed are hardy and free flowering and the blossoms are in many cases almost as large as the later varieties.

Dwarf Irises are rather scarce but a few of them should be in every garden. The high quality of this collection is indicated by the uniformly high ratings. The fact that several of these were not rated, is no doubt due to their scarcity.

ATROVIOLACEA (82). The earliest of all to bloom. Rich velvety red-purple, the falls being a little darker than the standards. White tipped beard and slightly marked throat. Very pretty. Height, 5 inches. \$0.50 each.

BLACK MIDGET (83). A very dark purple with buds that are soot-black. Very scarce. Height, 6 inches. \$5 each.

BRIDE. A very popular early white Dwarf. Very fragrant. Height, 6 inches. \$0.50 each.

COERULEA (83). A very lovely sky blue Dwarf with styles the same color. One of the earliest, blooming in April. Height, 5-6 inches. \$0.75 each.

CYANEA. Rich crimson-purple, with a white throat that is beautifully veined. The largest of all the Dwarfs and a perfectly formed flower with nicely flaring falls. It is also very fragrant. Classed as one of the best of the purple Dwarfs. Height, 6 inches. \$0.50 each.

GLEE (86). Resembles "Statellae" in form and texture and graceful bearing, but the color is a lovely uniform soft yellow instead of the creamy white of "Statellae." It is a very handsome flower and has the advantage of a 3 to 4 weeks' flowering season. Height, 8-12 inches. \$3.50 each.

MAROCAIN (74). This is the darkest of all the Dwarfs, being a very rich dark red-purple. It is a prolific bloomer and makes a great show in the garden. Height, 10 inches. \$2 each.

NEGUS (80). As this grows taller than most of the other Dwarfs, it is of special value for the front of the border, in front of the taller growing Irises. The Garden Rating of 80 tells the story. The standards are dark, smooth reddish purple and the falls are intense dark velvety purple, almost black. It is even darker than "Dominion" and the rich golden beard and beautifully marked white throat stand out in strong contrast against the dark petals. It is so free flowering that a garden clump is one solid mass of rich color. It certainly is one of the best for garden effect. Height, 14 inches. \$1.50 each.

STATELLAE (74). This is a very lovely creamy white collected Iris that is probably a natural hybrid. It is often considered the finest of the white Dwarfs. It has a stylish bearing, the flowers are well proportioned and they are delightful for cutting. The falls are delicately flushed yellow and veined olive, with a brilliant orange beard. It is very fragrant. Height, 10-14 inches. \$0.75 each; 3 for \$2 , 6 for \$3.

DWARF BEARDLESS IRISES

THERE are a few exceedingly interesting varieties in this section, which are practically unknown, even to the Iris enthusiast, yet they are charming plants for the rock garden or as a ground cover. They will be shipped at the proper time for transplanting, which is spring, or late summer or early fall.

ENSATA. This is a very handsome little soft lavender flower that blooms about the same time as the Dwarf Bearded Irises and is very free flowering. It will do well in a very dry spot as it is drought resistant, but it does equally well in a moist situation. Height, 10 inches. \$1.50 each.

GRAMINEA. This is a very pretty little grass-leaved Dwarf that is delightfully fragrant and has the additional advantage of being one of the very few plants that will bloom in almost full shade. The flower is different in form from any other Iris and reminds one somewhat of the very rare and much sought after *Reticulata* Irises. The flat falls of *Graminea* extend just a half inch beyond the reddish violet styles, which otherwise cover them. The tiny standards are of the same reddish violet shade as the styles. The falls are purple veined over a cream ground. The individual flower lasts several days in good condition. The true variety is very scarce and is not to be confused with the entirely different Dwarf Bearded Iris of the same name. Height, 10 inches. \$1.50 each.

VERNA. This is a dwarf American species that reminds us somewhat of the *Crested Iris Cristata*, but in form the flower is more like a tiny Bearded Iris. It is without doubt one of the most lovely of all Dwarf Irises. It does well in partial shade and must have an acid soil, well treated with leaf mold or humus. Height, 6 inches. \$1 each.

EVANSIA OR CRESTED IRISES

CRISTATA. This is one of our most charming Dwarf Irises for rock gardening or as a ground cover under a tree, with its profusion of dainty soft amethyst-blue fringed and crested flowers, with a touch of gold in them and a delicate crab apple fragrance. The flowers are about the size of a dollar and about 6 inches tall. A semi-shady location is best and the ground should be well supplied with leaf mold. It is an American species from our Southern states but quite hardy in the North. Height, 6 inches. \$0.50 each.

CHRISTATA ALBA. This is a lovely white form of the above and very rare. \$5 each.

GRACILIPES. This is a tiny Japanese crested Iris and one of the most desirable of all Irises for rock gardening. The dainty fringed pale lilac flowers are touched with orange at the center. Prefers a semi-shady position with sandy soil mixed with peat and leaf mold, but seems to do well in any moist but well drained position. Very rare. \$2.50 each.

JAPONICA (*Fimbriata*). This is one of the most beautiful of the Japanese crested species and has proven quite hardy in our garden. It is a flower of unusual form and beautifully marked as though it were a painted miniature porcelain. The standards and falls, which are snow white, lie out flat like a miniature Japanese Iris, and all of the petals are beautifully frilled, the styles so much so to appear like a tassel of silk threads. Unlike any other Iris the flowers are borne in loose "sprays" and it continues to flower over a long period. The white flowers have a neat ring of lavender dots, surrounding a brilliant orange spot and are about $1\frac{3}{4}$ to 2 inches across. Height, 24 inches. \$2.50 each.

TECTORUM. The famous Roof Iris of China where it is held in high esteem and is seen growing on the thatched roofs of the houses. The deep lilac-blue flowers have a striking ivory-white crest. A hot, sunny position, with good drainage is best. Height, 8-10 inches. \$0.50 each.

TECTORUM ALBUM. An exquisite pure white form of the above, the crests being marked with gold. Height, 8-10 inches. \$5 each.

INTERMEDIATE IRISES

THE majority of the varieties in this section are the result of crosses between the early Dwarf Iris and the later Tall Bearded Iris. The result is a group that is "intermediate," in height as well as in blooming season, between these two sections. The Intermediates thus prolong the Iris season and make it continuous, as they come into bloom just when the last of the early Dwarfs are finishing and continue to bloom right into the season of the taller Bearded Irises. We have also included in this collection several of the best of the wild types, which bloom at the same time and are of intermediate height.

The varieties in this section are mostly too tall for the rock garden, but are especially fine for the border, in front of the taller blooming varieties. They are all extremely hardy, and are prodigious bloomers, the individual flowers being large and almost as fine as the later blooming Irises. You'll get a great thrill of these choice early flowering varieties. They may be transplanted at any time.

FRITJOF (74). A flower of good form and size with clear light lavender-blue standards and satiny red-purple falls edged lavender. Height, 24 inches. \$0.50 each.

GEORGEOS. This is not to be confused with the Dwarf Iris of the same name. It is a very choice variety, very fragrant and as richly colored as "Dominion," but in the intermediate class. It has very long erect open ruffled violet standards and rich velvety crimson-purple falls. The flower is distinctive in form and probably the finest of the "Intermediates" to date. Height, 16 inches. \$3.50 each.

HALFDAN (71). This is a very lovely creamy white flower of good form, the open standards showing a golden veined throat and yellow beard. Different from other whites on account of its creamy tint. Height, 20 inches. \$0.50 each.

INGEBORG (76). This is unquestionably the finest early white Iris for general use. It is a gigantic flower with golden veining at the throat and a rich golden beard. The flowers are of good texture and held on stout erect stems. Height, 12 inches. \$0.50 each.

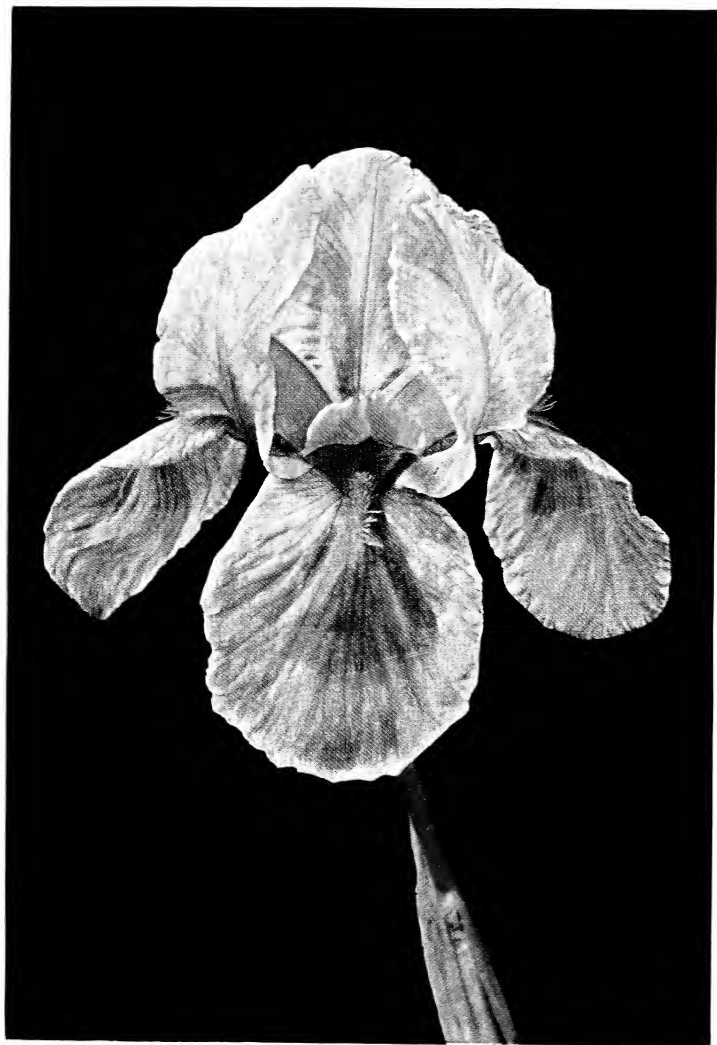
ISTRIA (83). A wild variety collected by the late Wm. R. Dykes in 1922 in Fiume. It is a very beautiful flower of snowy whiteness, good form and exquisitely fragrant. Stock very scarce. Height, 28 inches. \$3 each.

KOCHII (75). This is the wild type native to Italy. It is a bright rich red-purple, very free flowering and quite fragrant. Height, 20 inches. \$0.50 each.

LEOTA. This is a very fine fragrant creamy white flower with falls faintly flushed greyish lavender and the throat beautifully veined lemon-yellow. It is a flower of fine form and good size and entirely unlike any other early white Iris. Height, 20-24 inches. \$1 each.

PRIMAVERA. This is not only the largest yellow Intermediate, but it is the largest yellow Iris we have ever seen, the falls measuring over 6 inches from tip to tip and the standards, by actual measurement, being $2\frac{1}{4}$

SIBERIAN AND ORIENTALIS IRISES

These two are closely related and our best modern varieties in this section are hybrids of the two. These combine well with the Siberian Irises, not only because they are similar in treatment and growth and somewhat similar in flower and foliage, but also because they give a wider range of color, by including colorings not to be found in the Siberian Irises. There are many very beautiful species in this section as well as improved hybrids. Those listed have proven quite hardy in our gardens, while we are still testing many others not listed here.

DOROTHEA K. WILLIAMSON. A rich velvety royal purple flower of intense color, which we consider one of the best and most useful in this entire section. It is a hybrid of "Fulva" and "Foliosa" and produces a distinctive form of flower quite unlike any other Iris excepting "Fulvala," another Fulva hybrid. Does well in moist, well drained location and partial shade. Height, 33 inches. \$0.75 each.

EPAULETTE. Given an Award of Merit by the Royal Horticultural Society of England in 1924. This is a hybrid of "Chrysographes" and "Bulleyana," two distinct Chinese species. Height, 24 inches. \$3.50 each.

FOLIOSA. American Species of the "Hexagona" group, whose brilliant blue flowers nestle among the luxuriant foliage. SPURIAS

We are listing these together because of their similarity in flower form, which is quite unlike any other form of rhizomatous or fibrous rooted Irises, but slightly resembling the Spanish bulbous Irises. The Spurias are beardless, grass-leaved varieties and species and this group contains some of our most attractive garden Irises. They are exquisite cut flowers, last well when cut and are quite rugged and hardy and easily grown.

AUREA. This is a very fine uniform, rich golden yellow flower, which is lovely in association with the "Siberian" Irises. It is a little difficult to establish in the East, but when once established is hardy and a most magnificent flower. This Aurea "Species" is not to be construed with Aurea "Bearded" Iris, which is also yellow but entirely different and unimportant. Aurea "Species" or "Beardless" Iris is without doubt one of the finest Irises in the world. Height, 38 inches. \$5 each.

POGOCYCLUS IRISES

This very interesting section is the result of crosses between the "Oncoeyclus" type (Suziana, etc.) and the hardy "Pogon"—or "Bearded" Irises. The resultant hybrids carry the very interesting characteristics of the "Oncoeyclus" Irises, but are quite hardy in our Northern and Eastern gardens without protection. This section contains many very handsome varieties heavily veined and netted flowers, and others with unusual and curious markings. They are particularly attractive in a rock garden and thrive best in a rather dry, hot, sunny location, in well drained soil that has had plenty of limestone and sharp sand or coal ashes incorporated in it. No Iris garden is complete without a few specimens of "Oncoeyclus" Irises, as they are entirely different in form and marking from all other Irises, and even among themselves there is a vast difference between the varieties in this respect. We have many varieties besides those listed here, but are listing only those that have proven quite hardy without any special care. These begin to bloom in "Brookville," N. Y. about the middle of May with the exception of the new variety, "Mons. Streichen," which commences flowering during the last week of April.

DORAK. (88). This is a gigantic flower of fine form and unusual coloring; and a fine "show" Iris, as the high rating of 88 will indicate. The large, beautifully ruffled standards are of clear light violet and practically free from markings; the falls are of purple violet, with a white undertone at the throat and beautifully veined and marked. In size it compares with some of the finest of the later blooming "Fall Bearded" Irises. This is one of the best of the "Pogocyclus" group. Height, 30 inches. \$5 each.

The "Lyre Flower," "Bleeding Heart," or "Locks and Keys." A very graceful pot-plant for room decoration, and valuable for cutting. The elegant pendant branches are loaded with heart-shaped bright rose-colored flowers, and furnished with graceful delicate green foliage. Extra heavy clumps. \$9 for 10; \$85 per 100.

Galtonia Candicans
(*Hyacinthus Candicans*)

The Cape Hyacinth is a valuable summer flowering bulb with long slender leaves and a candelabra like arrangement of thirty or so pure white bell shaped blossoms borne on a scape from 3 to 4 feet tall. Distributed about the borders in groups or massed against shrubbery they are very effective, giving lines of definition and strength to the riotous growth of summer flowers. Planted with Gladioli they form an elegant contrast. They last a long time in bloom.

In every way they may be treated like Gladioli, but south of Philadelphia the bulbs may be left out of doors over the winter with a light covering and will increase and give better results every year. Extra selected bulbs, \$2 for 10; \$15 per 100.

(*Peruvian Daffodil*)

(*Amaryllis Hallii*)

A perfectly hardy bulb of the Amaryllis family. Produces attractive green foliage in the early spring, which later dies away. About a month later the flower

Schizostylis "Mrs. Hegarty" (*The New Pink Kaffir Lily*)

This startling novelty has created great interest wherever it has been seen and has received Award of Merit from the Royal Horticultural Society of London. It is unmistakably one of the most beautiful and hardy flowers for late autumn. It is strong growing and free-flowering, continuing to send up spikes bearing well expanded flowers until the arrival of frost. Blooming in late autumn it is particularly useful to brighten the border and it tones with the autumn foliage tints. The blossoms are of a pure, fresh, clear pink color, the shade of Begonia "Gloire de Lorraine," with yellow stamens. I saw in one of the finest gardens of America, located in Glen Cove, Long Island, a beautiful long border where Schizostylis "Mrs. Hegarty" was in full bloom in November, its masses of clear pink blossoms pierced by the soft light blue, lovely sprays of *Salvia farinacea*, making indeed a most unusual and exceedingly attractive effect. It is unmistakably one of the most beautiful and hardy flowers for autumn and I recommend it highly. Extra strong plants, \$12.00 for 10; \$110.00 per 100.

TRITOMA PFITZERII (*Red Hot Poker or Torch Lily*). Splendid for late summer and early fall, producing plants from 3 to 4 feet high, bearing flower spikes of

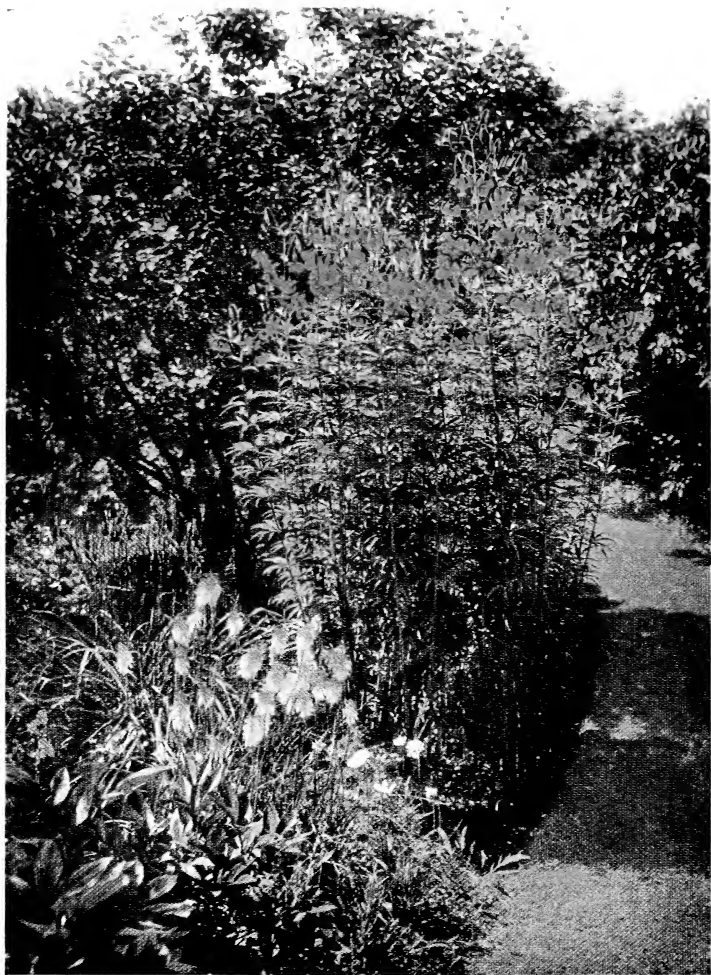
*The Lord God planted a garden
