I am planting seed of many varieties of rockery and other plants, the plants of which will be ready at various times from June until September. I am giving only a partial list—those with which I am somewhat familiar. Many of the others are entirely new to me and are not found in American catalogues. Most of the seed was secured in England, Austria and Switzerland. Of some kinds there will be many varieties—for instance, of Dianthus, there will be twenty. If interested in new plants, write for new list later. None of these plants will be more than 15c each. If I think the plants too small for the 15c, I will return the balance. R for rockery and V means several varieties.
