This imported product, consisting of decayed vegetation which has been accumulating for many years along certain European lakes, has been found to be very important as a soil conditioner. It improves the texture, conserves moisture and aerates the soil. Used as a mulch for broad-leaved evergreens, such as Rhododendrons, Boxwood and Azaleas, as well as the coniferous sorts, it cannot be excelled.
