

FOREWORD

Many people take keen delight in new varieties of Peonies. They tire of seeing the same kinds year after year.

There is still room for improvement in the Peony. Among the standard kinds already well established, the first class singles can almost be counted on one's fingers, and the same is true of the Japs. Many doubles lack distinctiveness, many late kinds are not sure to open except in the coolest climate, and many reds of all types fade badly or are poor in color.

No apology is needed, therefore, for the introduction of 46 new kinds, provided high quality is maintained and prices are fair.

In 1921 and 1922 I planted a large quantity of Peony seed, much of it obtained from carefully planned crossbreeding. This year came bloom on 3 and 4 year old clumps of the best plants from this seed. Had you stood in my fields last June, I believe you would have realized you were facing the dawn of a new era in white singles, red singles and red Japs, and that among the doubles were some fine whites, dark reds and pinks.

In choosing peonies for introduction, high quality has been my first object, then difference in season of bloom, height of stem, and in the reds, various shades impossible to differentiate on paper. These reds create a wonderful contrast. No red is knowingly offered that fades to a dead or ugly shade.

The number of clumps of each variety in existence runs from only 3 to 10, with five or six the usual number. Nevertheless prices are very much lower than the level for Peony introductions in past years.

The 1931 National Show

Nearly 300 new seedlings were exhibited by nearly a lozen originators. The American Home Achievement Medal for the best new Peony at the show was won by my Nippon Princess, a very distinct pink Jap. It and seven other Auten seedlings received Honorable Mention from the Seedling Committee. These were Nippon Maid and Nippon Red, red Japs; Monterey, the salmon red Jap introduced last year; Hennepin, red single; White Perfection, white single; White Beauty, white double, and No. 465, nink double which which will be introduced later pink double which will be introduced later.

These awards show that the Auten originations merit your consideration.
