To Our Friends and Patrons:

With the advent of another planting season we present for your perusal our Annual Catalog for 1931, it being the fortieth edition of same. It offers the very best the world affords in flowering and ornamental plants for your home and garden. Only the most meritorious of each family of plants are grown.

THANK YOU—We take this means to thank the many patrons who favored us with their orders during the past season, and trust that the plants we supplied came fully up to expectations.

OREGON-GROWN PLANTS—We have prepared for this season's trade the usual large and fine stock of Oregon-grown plants, such as we have been sending our customers for years. The fact that we send out such fine, large healthy plants, which always reach their destination in a perfectly fresh condition, no doubt accounts for their popularity with flower-loving people in every nook and corner of the Pacific Northwest.

OUR ROSES—We have made the Rose our leading specialty for many years, always listing the best and most reliable sorts and adding each year the finest new kinds. The stock we supply is classed as No. 1 grade and must not be confounded with low grade plants offered at lower prices. Our Roses are noted for their fine root-system and strong clean vigorous growth. We offer only two-year-old field grown stock at quoted prices.

OUR PRICES—While it is true that we are not seeking a reputation for cheapness, we know that our prices are as low as good plants can be sold for and that no firm in our line of business is supplying stock equal to ours for less money.

METHOD OF SHIPMENT—As a rule small orders can be sent more economically by parcel post while orders for amounts over four dollars will go by express to better advantage. Two-year-old roses, shrubs and vines being quite heavy and bulky are usually sent by express at expense of purchaser.

PARCEL POST SHIPMENTS—Orders for small plants of all kinds will be sent by parcel post when requested by purchaser. Also small orders of larger plants when such is possible. It is quite obvious that our proximity to all points in Oregon, Washington and Idaho is a distinct advantage to us and our customers under the parcel post zone rates.

Many of the larger and higher priced plants are too bulky to send by parcel post. We reserve the right to send orders containing such by express at the expense of purchaser.

EXPRESS SHIPMENTS—We prefer this method of shipment in the case of orders for field-grown roses, shrubs, and roots, when such orders amount to \$4.00 and over. By this means we are also able to leave more earth on pot grown plants resulting in less disturbance of roots and therefore more satisfactory growth when replanted. When shipped by express the customer pays the transportation charges but because of the short distances to all points in the Pacific Northwest the cost is very reasonable.

CANADIAN ORDERS—Only seeds, bulbs and greenhouse grown plants can be sent by parcel post to Canada. Any other plants must go by express. Every Canadian order must be accompanied with an additional remittance of 25 cents on each dollar's worth of bulbs and plants ordered, if ordered sent by parcel post.

MISTAKES—We use great care in filling and packing orders but nevertheless mistakes may occur. Should any happen with your order kindly advise us at once and it will be rectified.

TERMS STRICTLY CASH—Every article in our catalogue is priced, therefore purchasers must know their cost when making out their order. The prices are fixed on a cash basis and as our customers for the most part are unknown to us and as we do not have a system of bookkeeping, our terms are strictly cash with the order.

OUR GUARANTEE—We guarantee all seeds, bulbs and plants true to name to the extent that we will replace any which may through error prove otherwise. We likewise guarantee safe delivery of all seeds, bulbs and plants.

COMPLAINTS—If any, must be made upon receipt of the goods, otherwise they cannot be considered.

REMITTANCES—Send money by bank draft, postoffice or express money-order. Personal checks on local banks only accepted when 10 cents is added for exchange. Postage stamps will be accepted for small amounts.

SMALL ORDERS—No plant orders filled for less amount than 50 cents.

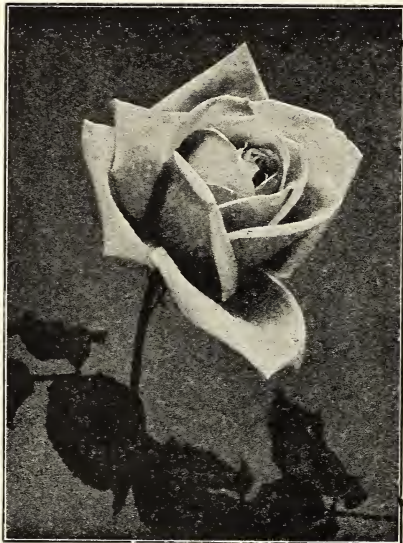

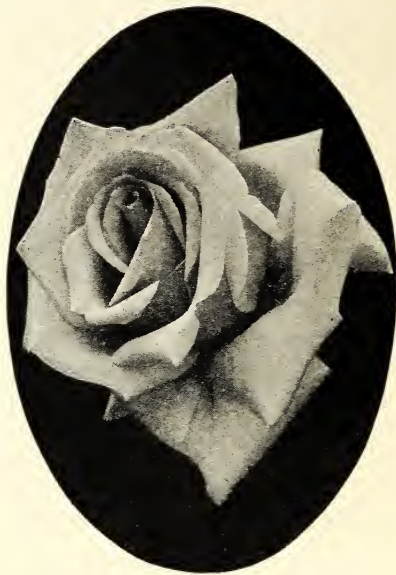

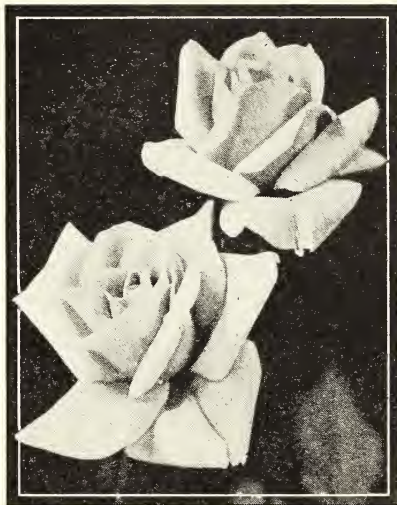

American Beauty. Quick grower, constant bloomer, making magnificent buds and large bold flowers; color, rich rosy crimson, shaded and veined in the most charming manner.

Austrian Copper. A single-flowered rose of the June-flowering type. Rich, copper colored flowers in clusters. Much admired at the Portland Rose Show. \$1.00 each.

Baby Crimson Rambler. A polyantha or baby rose especially useful for bedding. Dwarf growing with clusters of small double crimson flowers in great profusion.

Baby Dorothy. Similar in habit of growth with the preceding but with clusters of small double bright pink flowers similar to Dorothy Perkins.

Captain Hayward. Deep glowing red flushed with crimson. Very strong growing. Hardy anywhere. Free blooming and sweetly scented.

Chateau des Clos Vougeat. Deep velvety crimson shaded with blackish maroon, in texture and finish as if cut from so much velvet.

Columbia. Bright rose pink of glistening freshness. Flowers of largest size and finest form produced freely on stout canes. Magnificent dark green mildew proof foliage.

Conrad F. Meyer. Large double cupped shaped silvery pink flowers. Very fragrant and lasting. Perfectly hardy anywhere.

Duchess of Wellington. Intense saffron yellow stained with rich crimson. Very large and of fine form. Beautiful in bud as well as open flower. One of the finest offerings of recent years.

Eldorado (Land of Gold). Deep golden yellow touched with scarlet at base of petals. Large full and very fragrant. A splendid American introduction.

Felicity. Brilliant rose-pink with cerise and yellow suffusions. Strong growing. Very free and continuous blooming. A most satisfactory garden rose that we have the honor of producing.

Frau Karl Druschki. Extraordinary strong growing and very hardy. Immense pure white flowers on long stout canes. The best known white sort.

General Jacqueminot. Well known for its hardiness and rich crimson buds and flowers.

Hoosier Beauty. Rich crimson-maroon flowers of exquisite form. Beautifully shaped buds. Sweetly scented. A splendid dark sort.

Hugh Dickson. Sturdy growing and very hardy producing large crimson scarlet flowers of fine form in profusion.

H. V. Machin. Splendid garden and exhibition rose bearing very finely formed crimson-scarlet flowers on stout stems. Vigorous upright grower.

Irish Elegance. This beautiful single-flowered rose is very popular on the Pacific Coast. Buds of elegant form of a rich apricot color opening into a pretty single bloom of coppery bronze. A fine decorative rose. Does not require pruning.

Juliet. Outside of petals old gold, interior rich rosy red. Hardy as an oak tree and a strictly everbloomer.

Kaiserin Augusta Victoria. A strong, vigorous grower, producing buds and flowers of enormous size. Color, pure white.

Killarney. The Irish Beauty. Color, an exquisite shade of deep shell pink lightened with silvery pink.

Kitchener of Kartoum. Semi-double lasting flowers of pure dazzling scarlet with velvety sheen. Strong growing of branching habit. Free and continuous bloomer all season. A fine decorative rose.

Lady Ashtown. Pale Rose du Bari shaded to lemon-yellow at base of petals. One of the finest pink roses yet produced.

Lady Hillingdon. Deep apricot yellow, long and pointed but, a fine forcing or garden rose, excellent for cutting. Flowers are of good substance, very lasting and foliage handsome and luxuriant.

Laurent Carl. One of the richest and most brilliant colored roses in our collection. Beautiful shaped buds expanding into large full blooms. Color rich velvety carmine shaded to bright scarlet.

Los Angeles. A beautiful American rose now so well known as to scarcely need a description. Long pointed buds of a luminous flame-pink toned with coral and shaded golden yellow at base of petals.

Madame Butterfly. A sport from the popular Ophelia with all the colors intensified making it a rich harmony of pink, apricot and gold. Beautifully shaped buds. Fine long stems.

Madame Caroline Testout. Large finely formed satiny pink flowers on stout upright canes. The most continuous blooming rose that we have. The hedges of roses about Portland are of this variety.

Madame Cecile Brunner. A beautiful dwarf rose of the Polyantha class, now in great esteem as a cut flower for corsage and table decoration. Small elegant shaped buds in clusters of ten or twelve. Color, a beautiful shade of salmon pink.

Madame Edouard Herriott. Long pointed buds of deep coral color shaded with yellow at base. Opens into a coppery scarlet tinged with orange. One of the most popular sorts of the day.

Miss Lolita Armour. Rich chrome yellow shaded to coppery orange at base of petals. Large flowers on stout stems. Produced by the same hybridizer who gave us Los Angeles.

Mrs. Aaron Ward. Deep golden orange shaded to lemon yellow at edge of petals. Full long lasting flowers freely produced. Rather dwarf growing. Lovely shaped buds.

Mrs. Charles Russell. Flowers very large of globular form. Color bright cerise shaded to scarlet at base of petals. Strong stout canes, almost thornless, with massive bronze green leaves.

Mrs. John Laing. Soft satiny pink with silvery suffusions. Flower full and lasting. Sweetly scented. Strong growing. Hardy anywhere.

Mrs. Wakefield Christy Miller. Delicate pearly blush, shaded salmon, outside of petals vermilion. Large shell-like petals of great substance.

Mrs. Wm. C. Egan. Soft rose pink shaded silvery pink, yellow base. Remarkably free. Finely formed buds and flowers on stout canes. A fine rose.

Ophelia. A grand variety of English origin, remarkable for its strong upright growth with charmingly shaped buds and flowers. Flesh pink shaded to rose with copper yellow at base of petals.

Paul Neyron. Massive bright pink flowers on long stout canes. One of the largest blooms in the family. Perfectly hardy.

Premier. Robust growing with luxuriant foliage and very large deep pink flowers freely produced. Especially beautiful in bud state. A popular cut flower variety.

Prince Camille de Rohan. Dark rich velvety crimson passing to maroon shaded black.

Radiance. A grand American rose producing large globular flowers of a rich cerise-pink color. Entirely distinct from all other roses.

Red Radiance. Of the same general habits as the well known Radiance rose, but with flowers of a rich ruby-red color. Of the easiest possible growth and gives general satisfaction.

Rose Marie. Long pointed buds of a rich even shade of rose-pink opening into a large handsome flower. Remarkably free in bloom. One of the best bedding roses extant.

Sunburst. Magnificent yellow garden rose. Buds long and pointed opening into large full flower. Color rich shade of cadmium yellow shaded with orange and copper.

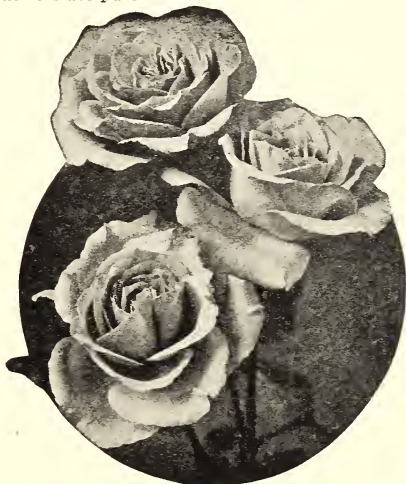
Ulrich Brunner. Extra large bold flowers full and globular; color, rich glowing crimson flamed with scarlet; a good grower and free bloomer.

Two-year-old Plants, 75 cents each (except as noted).

American Pillar. Single flowers, 3 inches in diameter hang in clusters along the branches. Color, apple-blossom pink with prominent white center. A rampant climber. Very hardy. 60 cents each.

Climbing American Beauty. Medium sized double flowers of a rich ruby red cover the glossy green foliage. A climbing rose of great value for porch, pillar or fence decoration.

Climbing Cecile Brunner. The flowers are produced in clusters and, like the bush variety, are of exquisite form and color, being a rosy pink. Flowers are delightfully fragrant and are produced so freely as to simply hide the bush.

Climbing General McArthur. Climbing form of the well known red rose of that name.

Climbing Hadley. A climbing variety of this popular red rose is bound to be popular. A strong, rampant climber throwing long canes.

Climbing Hoosier Beauty. Identical with the superb bush variety Hoosier Beauty except that it is a rampant climber. Rich crimson shaded to black.

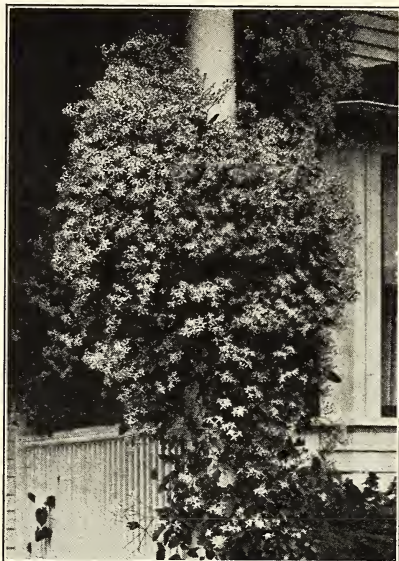
