TO GET THE BEST RESULTS

While space is too limited to give complete instruction and information usually required for amateurs, I will give a few pointers that will be of great help to those interested in growing fine exhibition dahlias.

First of all, in making your selection, be sure that you select varieties of merit, and of a reliable

grower.

Second: Place your order early so as to not be disappointed in getting what you order. Do not be misled by prices far below market prices as good dahlias are always in demand and are not sold at a loss unless inferior quality, etc.

Do not condemn a root if it is small, the size of Do not condemn a root if it is small, the size of a root has nothing whatever to do with size of plant or bloom. While some varieties make large roots, others make very small ones. The latter in many cases producing the healthiest plants. If the root has a healthy "eye" or sprout it will grow and produce a healthy plant if properly cared for.

As most of us are anxious to see our new selections in bloom do not make the mistake and plant

tions in bloom do not make the mistake and plant too early. The ground should be warm to the depth that the root should be planted. I suggest from May 25th to July 1st. The latter being better for May 25th to July 1st. exhibition blooms.

Plant not less than 8 inches deep laying the root flat (never stand up); cover say three inches with earth and fill in the hole as the plant grows. Never hill. A small handful of bonemeal or well rotted stable manure in the bottom of hole is very beneficial but, do not let root come in direct contact with manure. Applying liquid manure two or three times during the blooming season will help to produce larger and better blooms.

Perhaps the most important operation is cultivation. Never allow a crust to form, hoe as often as necessary, then a few times more will be of no harm.

Same thing applies to spraying if necessary.

Disbudding is also important in producing exhibition blooms, only allow the terminal bud to develop, pinch out the rest of buds and laterals down the stem for three or four sets, then you may leave a pair if more blooms are desired. For more complete instructions I would suggest that you go to your nearest library and get a book on Modern Dahlia Culture. Or if you send me \$1.65 I will mail you prepaid W. H. Wait's Book on Modern Dahlia Culture, worth many times its cost to anyone interested in growing better dahlias. It answers any question you may ask regarding the dahlia, seedlings, plants, harvesting, storing, dividing and many other valuable pointers. A book you will read many times over.
