

ADDRESS, ETC.-Give name of your post office, county and state, sign your name plainly; also specify means of conveyance preferred—whether by parcel post, express or freight.

FREE DELIVERY.—We will send by parcel post, to any part of the United States, all Vegetable and Flower Seeds quoted in this catalogue at packet, ounce, quarter-pound and half-pound rates, free of expense to the pur-chaser. All heavy seeds, including Peas, Beans, Corn, Clover Seed, Seed Grain, Roots, etc., are quoted at net prices at our store. Purchasers desiring these by mail are requested to remit an additional amount sufficient to cover postage, at parcel post rates according to zone. Allow two pounds in weight for each quart of Peas, Beans, or Corn. Particular attention is invited to this, as, when omitted, the cost of postage will be deducted from the amount received.

SHIPFING.-We deliver free to Express, Railroad or Boat. All goods travel at the buyer's risk, our responsibility ceases when we take the carrier's receipt. If goods are damaged so sign for them and enter claim with the carrier at once.

BAGS AND PACKING.—No charge is made for boxes or packing on anything, except Flower Pots, Nursery Stock and Hotbed Sash, and this at cost only. Cloth Bags are charged for at cost and if returned in good condition, charges prepaid, will be credited at price charged.





# Seeds of Hardy Rock Garden Plants

- 102 AETHIONEMA (Persian Candytuft). 9 in. June-July. Sun. Strong, twiggy bushes covered with long, slender spikes of rosy pink flowers. Pkt. 30c.
- 202 **ALYSSUM serpyllifolium** (Alpestre). Very dwarf. 4-5 in. Racemes of pale yellow flowers and rough, hoary leaves. Blooms just after the well known Saxatile variety. Pkt. 20c.
- 248 ANCHUSA myosotidiflora. 1 ft. May. Shade. A Russian variety with clusters of blue flowers resembling Forget-me-nots. Very effective. Pkt. 25c.
- 252 ANEMONE pulsatilla (Pasque flower). 10 in. April-May. An interesting plant producing violet or purple flowers. Pkt. 25c.
- 1068 AUBRIETIA eyri. A dainty low creeping plant. Fine for crevices of rocks. Rosy lilac, flowers for a long period. Pkt. 30c.
- 1292 CALANDRINIA umbellata. 4-5 in. Will do well in a hot location where other plants may not succeed. Bright crimson saucer-shaped flowers. Prostrate habit. Pkt. 20c.
- 1392 **CAMPANULA garganica.** June. A low spreading tuft covered with starry light blue flowers with small white eye. Fine for hanging over a rock. Pkt. 35c.
- 1402 CAMPANULA muralis. June. Very dwarf plant, fine for wall or rock garden. Covered with blue purple flowers. About the best rock garden plant in the Campanula group. Pkt. 30e.
- 1435 CAMPANULA rotundifo-lia (Scotch Bluebells). 1 ft. June to Aug. Clear blue flowers, especially adapted for crevices. Also does well on steep slopes. Pkt. 25c.
- 2510 DIANTHUS allwoodi al**pinus.** 6 in. June-July. Glossy foliage with large bright rose flowers. Thrives best in loam to which a little lime has been added. Shade a little in hottest part of Summer. Pkt. 50c.

- 6012 NEPETA mussini (Ground Ivy). 1-11/2 ft. Fine for any place in the rock garden; compact habit, producing masses of lavender flowers. Pkt. 25c.
- 6072 **OENOTHERA** missouriensis (Evening-primrose). 10 in. June to Aug. A low, prostrate growing variety with ascending branches. Flowers very large, soft yellow. Pkt. 30c.
- 7152 SAXIFRAGA umbrosa (London Pride). Sun or shade. Numerous small pink flowers, fine for rocks or edging; foliage makes a solid carpet. Pkt. 30c.
- 7242 SEDUM spurium coccineum (Stonecrop). 6 in. July and Aug. Sun. Showy rosy crimson flowers. They thrive in almost any soil. Pkt. 25c.
- 7262 **SILENE schafta** (Autumn Catchfly). **4** to 6 in. July to Oct. When in flower, they are a mass of bright pink. Pkt. 20c.

### PEDIGREED ASPARAGUS

MARY WASHINGTON. It is earlier, produces more, has larger stalks, possesses highest rust resistance and will net a great deal more money per acre than the Martha Washington. ### BEANS

- **ABUNDANCE.** An extra early variety, producing a heavy crop of long, stringless pods of excellent flavor. For forcing in the greenhouse during Winter it cannot be surpassed. Pkt. 50c., qt. 90c.
- MASTERPIECE STRINGLESS BUSH. An extremely prolific, quick growing variety. The plants are unusually strong and bear long, straight, fleshy pods which are tender and delicious as well as handsome. A fine variety for exhibition and for those who demand quality. Pt. 75c., qt. \$1.25.
- WEBBER WAX, or "CRACKERJACK." A high quality, flat podded, stringless variety of the season of Wardwell's Kidney Wax. 



Keep the plants free from weeds during Summer, and protect slightly during Winter.

The following Spring the roots will be ready to transplant into permanent beds; the roots should be set in rows 3 to 4 feet apart, and 1 foot apart in the rows; the crown of the root should be 4 to 6 inches below the surface of the ground. A fair crop may be expected the third year from the seed, or in one or two years when roots are used, according to the age of the roots planted. By planting two-year-old roots a fair crop may be obtained in one year, and after that a full crop every year.

# BEANS, Dwarf or Bush

One quart will plant 100 feet of drill. One and one-half bushels will plant one acre.

A warm, light soil is best adapted to the growth of Bush Beans, but they will do well in almost any situation unless it is very wet. Plant in rows 2 to 3 feet apart, dropping the beans 3 inches apart and covering 2 inches. Keep the ground free from weeds and cultivate often. Never disturb the vines when wet, as the pods become rusty. All the varieties are tender and must not be planted until the soil is dry and warm.



### **MUSHROOM**

Mushrooms are more easily cultivated than many people imagine, and may be grown in any dark room or cellar where the temperature can be maintained at from fifty to sixty-five degrees. For the bed, use a mixture of horse manure and good fresh loam in equal proportions. Before being placed in the bed let this material be thoroughly mixed, and well turned three or four times to sweeten in some dry place. Upon a dry, firm bottom, proceed to make the bed by spreading a thin layer of the preamend mixture and quark if the bed is eight induce the best preamend in the preamend in the best preamend i the bed, by spreading a thin layer of the prepared mixture and pound it firm till the bed is eight inches thick. Leave the bed, by spleading a time layer of the prepared mixture and pound it firm that the bed is eight inclusion. Leave it thus for about a week, or till the temperature of the bed has subsided to ninety or ninety-five degrees. Then make holes about 10 inches apart, and put in each a piece of spawn about the size of an egg. Cover the holes and press the soil solid and smooth. Let the bed remain in this condition ten days. Then cover with 2 inches of fresh loam. Over this place a few inches of straw. If the temperature is right, Mushrooms will appear in six to eight weeks from time of spawning. The bed will continue bearing about a month. After the first crop is gathered, spread over the bed an inch of fresh loam, and moisten with warm water. In the event of the surface of the bed getting very dry at any time it should be moistened freque with water a temperature of eight for a degrees. any time, it should be moistened freely with water at a temperature of eighty to eighty-five degrees.

Sow 8 to 10 seeds to a hill, thinning out after they have attained their rough leaves, and danger from bugs is past, leaving two or three of the strongest plants in each hill.


Turnips do best in highly enriched, light, sandy or gravelly soil; sow the earliest varieties as soon as the ground can be worked in the Spring, in drills 12 to 18 inches apart. Seed can also be sown broadcast, using 3 pounds to the acre. For a continuous supply through the season, sowings should be made every two weeks until the last of July, from which time until the middle of August the principal sowings are made for Fall and Winter use. 

### LAWNS

The following simple directions may be found useful to those who are not familiar with lawn making.

The soil should be of good depth, moderately rich, and in many cases the land should be carefully drained. Grading should be done and the soil thoroughly pulverized by careful harrowing and raking. Some good fertilizer—pure ground bone, wood ashes or a specially prepared lawn fertilizer—should be used. After spreading the fertilizer, the surface should be carefully raked and rolled. The rolling often develops uneven spots which should be leveled before the seed is sown. After sowing the ground should again be lightly raked and rolled.

The selection of seed is important. Use only such mixtures as are free from weed seeds, and such as will produce a firm, strong turf and a fine growth. A liberal quantity is necessary to secure good results (not less than 64 pounds per acre). The best time to make a lawn is from the middle of August through September. If seed is sown at this season, the grass will become strong enough to withstand the Winter, and a good lawn is assured the following season. If seed cannot be sown at this time, it should be sown as early as possible in the Spring.
