## NOTES AND SUGGESTIONS Read Carefully

1. Report to the House every week. This is very important.
2. Confine sales strictly to sizes and varieties in this list.
3. No order to be taken for less than $\$ 2.00$ worth of stock, unless cash is paid in advance.
4. Take no order for delivery in places where there is no railroad station.
5. Take no order for delivery on a set date or during any certain month. Have order read Spring or Fall, as indicated on order blank.
6. Use the utmost care in writing order, to have all figures, sizes, varieties, with price in their proper place on the order blank, also write customers name plainly on top of order. Date the order, and write customers address plainly, rural route and location and distance from denvery point. Then have customer sign his or her name to the order, also sign your name on bottom of order as agent.
7. Be sure that order is added up correctly and see that the amount of, with the varieties correspond with duplicate you hand to customer.

8 . When writing size of an article on the order, do not write even sizes as: $5 \mathrm{ft} ., 6 \mathrm{ft} ., 18$ inches; all such irregular sizes are not in line with the sizes given in our price list and puts our office to a lot of extra work as we will have to return such orders to be corrected.
7. Read our booklet of instructions carefully and frequently.
3. This price list cancels all previous lists.
9. Confine your sales to central delivery points. Avoid making deliveries at every little town; as a rule customers can be induced to go to your regular delivery station.
10. You may sell 500 at 1000 rates where thousand rate is given, 50 at 100 rates except where otherwise noted in price list. Sell Forest Trees in even hundreds only. In giving dozen rates on Apple, Plum, Cherry, Grape Vines and Transplanted Evergreens, you may put in 3 of a kind to make up the dozen, and in giving 100 rates, you may put in 5 of a kind. This rule can also be applied on Gooseberries and Currants. On Raspberries and Blackberries, you may put in 6 of a kind to make dozen rates, and 25 of a kind in giving 100 rates.
11. Items printed in BOLD TYPE are special varieties and should be pushed in making sales.
12. The law requires that we leave an exact copy of the order with the customer. Give the carbon copy of the order to the customer and send the original order into the office with your weckly report.
13. Do not enter into any contract or agreement with the customer oiner than specified in the order.
14. Be sure to write plainly on the order the amount prepaid, and see that the carbon copy you leave with customer correctly shows amount of prepayment, send all cash collected on orders in with your report attached to the order on which payment was made.

## Cash on Order Plan

For each $\$ 1.00$ cash paid by customer at the time order is given, give customer 1 Rock Mountain Cherry. or one German Iris, or one Grape Vine, or one Golden Glow, or one Pyrethrum. If the customer pays \$5.00 on an order down, you are to give him as premium 5 plants of any of the above named kinds. Send all cash collections on orders to our office with your weckly report.

## Replace Terms

Any stock that fails to live, if given proper care, will be replaced FREE of charge, providing we are notified before September 1st following delivery. With the exception of Evergreens and Strawberry plants, which will be replaced only at one-half price.

## Delivery Season

Never promise a customer a definite date for delivery. We guarantee to ship at the proper time for planting. Do not agree to deliver goods to permises, but instruct customers they will be notified to call at some centrally located place in town, of a certain day to call for their orders. A delivery agent has plenty to attend to without making personal delivery of every package.

## We Pay Freight, Express or Parcel Post

The prices quoted in this iist are for goods delivered at any railroad station. Do not write up orders for delivery at inland town (off the railroad). Some nurseries make an extra charge of $10 \%$ or more to cover cost of packing and transportation.

## Terms of Payment

All orders are taken with the understanding that cash will be paid in full at the time of delivery, unless payment has been made in advance.

## Prices

In every instance the price named is entirely in keeping with the high quality of our guaranteed stock. Inferior grades of stock may be bought for less, but poor stock is dear at any price and an experienced planter will not buy it. It is not so much what the customer pays as it is what he gets for what he pays that determines his degree of satisfaction.

## Packing

Every customer's order is selected stock, packed in separate bundles (well packed with packing material) to assure delivery of his order in first class growing condition. Large orders are packed in separate boxes with plenty of moist packing material around the roots. No extra charges are made for this feature of service.

The first importance in landscaping is foundation plantings. Thru the foundation plantings you connect the dwelling with the ground. Then fill in the corners of the outside lines. An outdoor living room (or private area) can also be worked out.

1 by $11 / 2$ fect.

To ascertain the number of plants required to the acre at any given distance, divide the number of square feet $(43,560)$ in an acre by the number of square feet you desire to devote to each plant. For instance, in Strawberries planted $11 / 2$ by 4 feet, each hill will occupy 6 square feet, making 7260 plants to the acre.

## Spray Program for Minnesota

The spray mixture for Apples and Plums best suited for Minnesota conditions is made by using $11 / 2$ pounds of powdered Arsenate of Lead, with 4 pounds of Dry Lime Sulphur to 50 gallons of water. Mix throughly and apply spray with about 200 pounds pressure.

## APPLES

FIRST SPRAY-When first flower buds show pink.
Pest Control-Early stages of leaf eating caterpiliars, Curculio and Scab.
SECOND SPRAY-As soon as petals drop from flowers and before calyx cup closes.
Pest Control-Coddling moths, caterpillars and those listed under first spray.
THIRD SPRAY-Last week of June or first week in July.
Pest Control-Scab, apple maggots, railroad worms and leaf eating insects.
FOURTH SPRAY-About July 20th.
Pest Control-Scab, apple maggot, plum curcuilio and leaf eating insects.

## PLUMS

FIRST SPRAY-Just before blossoms open.
Pest Control-Curculios, plum pocket, blossom blight, twig blight.
SECOND SPRAY—Just after petals fall.
Pest Control-Curculios and brown rot.
'THIRD SPRAY-When plums are the size of small peas.
Pest Control-Curculios and brown rot.
FOURTH SPRAY-When fruit first starts to color.
Pest Control-Curculios and brown rot.

## Special Spray for Plant Lice

Nicotıne Sulfate $40 \%$, 1/2 Pint
Soap two-thirds pound
Water, 50 Gallons.
The first lice usually appear just as the buds are bursting. If very numerous when applying regular spraying, Nicotine Sulfate spray may be added to the regular spray. It is more effiective when used alone.

## CURRANTS AND GOOSEBERRIES

PLANT LICE-Just before buds open. Use 15 pounds of dry lime sulphur to 50 gallons of water.

## CURRANT WORM

SPRAY-Use Arsenate of lead at the rate of $11 / 2$ pounds to 50 gallons of water and 4-5-50 Bordeaux mixture as soon as the caterpillars are seen. Use Hellebore if spraying is needed when fruit is nearly mature. This may be dusted on the leaves early in the morning.

## CURRANT BORER

Prune out and burn infected canes before June 1st. Borers usually attack the canes that are two or more years old. Most of the fruit is borne on these canes. Do not prune out all old canes each season.
