

JACK AND THE BEANSTALK, AND HOW I BECAME A GLAD FAN

In the fall of 1920 I got acquainted with Mr. C. W. Wood, the introducer of the gladiolus industry into our community. After paying him several visits, and spending hours and days discussing the beautiful blooms, I purchased my first stock from him. Through the courtesy of Mr. and Mrs. Wood I was induced to grow gladiolus bulbs commercially.

It was a long winter for me to wait for spring to come. Finally the time had come when I was to make my try at the new enterprise. My enthusiasm and ambition had got to its height. Mrs. Wood suggested planting a castor bean in my garden to eradicate the moles. After all was planted I continuously cared for the garden. Time passed, very quickly blooms began to appear, the castor bean took possession of the garden. I fed it liquid manure and Nitrates. At the end of the season this bean stalk had gained the height of thirteen feet and eight inches. Having decided to keep this stalk, I cut it close to the ground and laid it away. The stalk is still ten feet and two inches tall. SELECTION



CULTURE

Any good rich porcus soil will do. If not, work in a handful of bone dust around each plant. Use no fresh manures of any kind. Do not plant these Iris in low wet soil.

PLANTING

We have had good results in transplanting irises any time in the growing season. Set the plants so the rhi-zomes are about level with the ground.



DIRECTIONS FOR PLANTING

DIRECTIONS FOR PLANTING Plant in any rich, well drained soil. For bulblets make trench 3 to 4 inches deep, sow about 50 to the foot in narrow trench; in trench 5 to 6 inches wide sow 200 to the foot. For large flowers set larger bulbs 4 to 6 inches apart in single row 4 to 6 inches deep. Use no manure unless well rotted, or dried and pulverized. This can be used as a top dressing at planting and when flower spikes appear. A light application of Vigoro with the manure well worked into the soil will give excellent results. A good soaking with water after each application of fertilizer is very beneficial. Stir your soil after each watering when dry enough to work read-ily. Work soil deep at first and shallow when flower spikes appear. spikes appear.





PLANTING

Plant in any good soil that is well drained; fertilize the same as for Iris. In setting the plants have the eyes or buds come about level with the ground, as deep planting does not produce many blooms. September until the ground freezes is the best time to plant.




PLANTING INSTRUCTIONS

Plant bulbs in rich sandy soil, 4 to 6 inches deep about 2 to 3 feet apart. When about 8 inches high pinch out the terminal buds, leaving 4 to 6 pair of leaves on stalk. These will throw out side shoots. When flowering buds begin to appear pinch off all but the largest bud on each shoot. Work in about a toot from the stalk a handful of commercial fertilizer rich in potash and phosphates. In dry weather water frequently. All tall plants should be tied and staked. Work deep until the plant is about a foot high. Later cultivate shallow. Spray with "Black Leaf Forty" and "Bordeaux". If using dust of same ingredients apply while dew is on the plant. Both should be applied on under side of the leaf. Do not spray during heat of day nor use cold water.
