ALL bulbs offered here are grown on our place at Richmond Beach, Washington, on a gentle slope to the west and within a stone's throw of Puget Sound. Our soil and climate are particularly adapted to the growing of most bulbous subjects that do not require a tropical climate, and are bound to give you satisfaction.

We specialize on the native Pacific Coast Lilies and *Lilium Regale*. Shipment is made early in October and safe arrival is guaranteed.

As to culture, the safe rule is to plant the bulb with twice its height of soil over its top, except when naturalizing and they may then be planted deeper to permit of cultivating the top soil when required. There are two don'ts that must be observed if you expect your lily bulbs to stay with you: the first is perfect drainage, and the second is absolutely no manure except as a top dressing and then it must be well rotted.

We especially draw your attention to the fact that you can have delivery of the lilies, which are usually imported from Japan late in November or December, from 30 to 60 days earlier and will also have bulbs that are acclimated.

All stock is offered subject to prior sale, and no warranty expressed or implied is made as to the productiveness or any other matter in connection with bulbs or stock sold by us. Goods not accepted under these terms must be returned at once as no sale is made thereof.

The Gold-Banded Lily of Japan. This is one of the most popular lilies grown and is a native of Japan, bearing many enormous flowers with broad petals, having a gold band in the center and is spotted with brown or red.

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A very good rock garden subject 1½ to 2 feet. Deep crimson, dainty bells, spotted purple, in June-July. Very rare.

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A fine lily, much like Umbellatum except that it is likely to be of smaller stature, 2 feet, and has bulbils in the axils of the leaves. Flowers yellow tinted with orange and rich red, in June.

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The oldest in cultivation; 4 to 6 feet. Many pure white, fragrant blooms in May-June. Plant not over 2" deep. **Delivery July and August.**

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A native of Northern California; 4 to 9 feet and a very satisfactory subject when established. Very desirable for naturalizing among Rhododendrons and shrubs. Many orange-yellow, spotted crimson, recurved blooms in June-July.

Japonicum (small)50	5.00	
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One of the very few pink lilies that we have in cultivation, but one that is considered somewhat miffy. A native of Japan where it grows in the mountainous regions among low growing shrubs. Our stock of this lily has been grown from seed in our nursery and has not been coddled. This is the fifth year since the seed was planted and it has bloomed for the first time; a lovely apple-blossom pink. The bulbs that are offered will be small but should give a very good account of themselves next season and we firmly believe that they will prove much more hardy than those usually obtained from Japan late in the year. Sometimes called Kramerii, 3 to 4 feet, June-July.

with pink, and spotted sparsely with rich brown, the center rib of the petals is marked with a light green as in Henryii. It has a very delicate fragrance. The bulbs never reach a large size.

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This is the familiar Easter Lily that you purchase at Easter and is an extremely good garden subject; growing taller and bearing many large, trumpet shaped, pure white, very fragrant blooms in July; 2 to 5 feet.

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This lily is not as largely planted in this country as in Europe where it is found in most of the old gardens. Height, 4 to 5 feet, bearing many waxy white, recurved blooms. The petals are thick as with Hansonii, and it makes a wonderful plant when established in a location to its liking.

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A native of Northern California; 4 to 6 feet. Especially recommended for planting in moist locations at margin of lakes and streams. Many recurved orange-yellow blooms tipped with crimson in June-July. This lily will do well anywhere.
