

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PHLOX

Succeed in any well-prepared garden soil.







ASPARAGUS

Asparagus from the home-garden is one of the most delicious of all vegetables. It is easily grown in any deep, rich soil, either from seed or roots.

Cuture. After soaking the seed in warm water for an hour, sow thinly in drills 12 inches apart early in the spring or fall. Cover 2 inches deep. When plants are well established, thin to about an inch apart and cultivate often. Transplant roots to permanent bed which has been dressed liberally with stable manure and a good fertilizer. Make trenches 4 inches deep and 6 inches wide, and place the roots, crown up, 2 feet apart, being careful to spread them in a flat position. Make the rows 4 to 6 feet apart. A bed 15 by 20 feet requires about 100 roots.

CABBAGE

Cabbage is always a welcomed vegetable, either cooked or served raw in salads. It is an all-season dish. Cabbage fresh from the home-garden is always of finer flavor than heads held in storage. Our pure-bred strains have been developed and selected for uniformity, high yield, and trueness-to-type.







Eggplant is a vegetable that requires no special attention. It is appetizing when sliced and fried, and when boiled and stuffed it is especially nutritious.

Culture. The seed germinates slowly and should be started in a hotbed or a protected seed-bed. Transplant outdoors when plants are 2 inches tall, if danger of frost is past. Space $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 feet each way. Young plants may need some protection from the sun. Keep the soil loose and fine. Ready for table in 4 months.



CUCUMBERS

The growing of Cucumbers for market is an important trucking industry. Either raw or pickled, the Cucumber serves as a valuable ingredient for salads and constitutes a tasty relish by itself. Quality Cucumbers can be grown easily in your own garden where you may pick them just at the right stage of their growth.

CULTURE. Where earliness is important, plant in dirt bands (see page 93) set in hotbeds or coldframes, filled with rich, friable soil. When danger of frost is past, transplant to open ground, the boxes being cut away, not disturbing the roots. Otherwise, as soon as the weather has become warm, plant in hills not over ½ to 1 inch deep, 4 feet apart each way, dropping 8 to 10 seeds in a hill. Thin to 3 to 4 plants when established. Earlier open-ground plantings may be protected with Hotkaps (see page 93). Give frequent cultivation until the plants make runners.




LETTUCE

With the discovery of its valuable health-giving vitamins, Lettuce has become a year-round table necessity. It is so easily grown that no garden need be without a generous supply.

CULTURE. Lettuce requires a rich soil, plenty of moisture, and a quick, steady growth from the time seeds are planted until the heads are ready for use. The most common causes of failure to get Lettuce to properly head are too late planting and not giving the plants sufficient room for developing. Lettuce seed is difficult to germinate in hot weather. We suggest the seed be first soaked in ice-water for an hour, then wrapped in dampened paper or cheese-cloth and placed in the refrigerator for 10 to 12 hours prior to planting. After the chilling is complete, spread seed out on dry paper in shade and dry slightly. Immediately broadcast on good moist seed-bed that has been thoroughly prepared, or sow 8 to 10 inches apart in rows 15 to 18 inches apart, covering with less than ½ inch of fine soil.





Earlier crops may be obtained by protecting the young plants with Hotkaps (see page 93). Give shallow cultivation every ten days. Pyrox (see page 90) is a splendid insecticide for preventing fungous diseases and destroying insects. Write to the U. S. Department of Agriculture for Farmers' Bulletin No. 1394, "Watermelons".





ONIONS

Onions have a prominent place in the vegetable gardens of America. They are highly prized for their tonic qualities. Raw or cooked, alone or in combination with other vegetables, they are wholesome and nutritious. As an appetizer, they have no equal, and many of the housewives' cherished recipes would be incomplete without them.

CULTURE. Plantings may be made from early September until March. Sow in rich soil, in rows 12 to 15 inches apart, and cover seed lightly. When 4 to 5 inches high, plants should be thinned to 3 to 4 inches apart in the row. Seed also can be sown in seed-beds and later transplanted to the field. Shallow cultivation should be practiced every week or 10 days. When mature, dig or plow up and store in a dry place, leaving tops on until needed for table or market.

RADISH

Radishes are well known as an excellent appetizer and garnish. Today the range in varieties gives the gardener his preference in shape, color, size and season.

CULTURE. Radishes thrive best in rich, deep, well-prepared soil. Plant in rows 12 to 18 inches apart and thin to 2 inches in the row. Also sown broadcast. Radishes are best when growth is quick and steady. Make sowings every 2 weeks for continuous supply.


SPINACH

Spinach is one of the most important sources of vitamins. It is included in all healthful diets, and is absolutely necessary to the general health and develop-ment of small children. When properly cooked and prepared for table, it is considered a most palatable and delicious dish.

Culture. Sow in rows 16 to 20 inches apart, covering seed 1 inch deep. When leaves are 1 inch wide, thin to 6 to 8 inches apart in the rows. Spinach develops best and is most tender and succulent when grown in rich soil and in cool weather. Ready in

SUMMER SQUASH

The recent discovery of health-promoting vitamins in Summer Squash has greatly increased its popularity as a home-garden vegetable. Properly cooked and prepared for table, Squash has an appealing and delicate flavor.

CULTURE. Plantings should not be made until all danger of frost is over, and the ground warm. Plant in hills 4 to 6 feet apart cach way, dropping 6 to 8 seeds to the hill and covering firmly with ½ inch of fine soil. TOMATOES

Tomatoes are an ideal home-garden crop. They yield heavily in a small space. No vegetable is more appetizing and wholesome, either raw or cooked, than juicy, delicious Tomatoes. They may be cooked in innumerable ways. Tomato-juice is a delightful and healthful beverage highly recommended by physicians.

CULTURE. For very early fruit, the seed should be sown thinly in a hotbed or indoors in shallow boxes or "flats" and covered with ½inch of soil. Harden plants by exposing to the air occasionally. In about 6 weeks the plants will be ready to set out, providing danger of frost is over. The rows should be 4 to 5 feet apart and the plants about 3 feet apart in the row, or 2 feet in row if staked. Cultivate as long as the vines will permit. Tomatoes are much improved in appearance, quality, and are usually a week or more earlier, when trained to stakes or trellises. The usual method is to set one strong plant to a 5- to 6-foot stake, tying the plant up and pruning it quite freely as the vine advances in growth.



COWPEAS

Cowpeas produce one of the largest and the most nutritious forage crops grown. When turned under, they furnish nitrogen and generally enhance the mechanical condition of the soil. Cowpeas are the cheapest and one of the most helpful soil-improvers known. They make a fine feed for work and beef-stock and for dairy herds, and are nearly equal in value to alfalfa and wheat-bran. Cowpeas contain four times as much digestible protein as timothy hay. 
SOY or SOJA BEANS

Soy Beans make poor land good and good land better. They will grow on all kinds of soil. Soy Bean hay is more nutritious than cowpea hay, and stock like it better. As a milk- and butter-producer, Soy Beans are equal to alfalfa, and superior to cotton-seed meal. They make a fine hog-pasture, as the animals themselves will harvest the crop. Cut for hay when the pods are well formed, or, if wanted for seed, let the Beans mature. Be sure to inoculate the seed with Nitragin. See page 93.
