




Part of our trails showing Celery, at Ridgewood, New Jersey

Depth to Cover the Seed. Following is a good general rule—cover to a depth equal to $2\frac{1}{2}$ times the diameter of the seed. Exceptions—50 per cent deeper when sowing during hot weather, or on soils that dry out quickly; 50 per cent less deep when sowing on heavy land or during wet weather.

A Good Hint. Radish is a strong germinator, while Beet. Parsley, Carrot, Celery, Parsnip, Onion and some others are weak; it is recommended to mix a small quantity of Radish with these seeds when sowing, removing the Radishes afterwards. Radish seeedlings break the soil crust and quickly mark your row. This process is particularly advantageous upon soils that bake.

With the proper selection of varieties, a continuous supply of Lettuce can be had throughout the season by sowing seed outside at intervals of two weeks, from April 15 to August 15. Use the head Lettuce for early and late sowing, and the leaf Lettuce during the summer months. To produce solid heads, plants in very rich soil. For first-early crop, sow in hotbed in March, and transplant outside the middle of April. Sow outdoors as soon as the ground opens, in drills from 1 to 2 feet apart, covering the seed with ¼ inch of soil. Thin out to 10 inches apart. Lettuce should not be transplanted after May 15, or you will not get heads. Drop two or three seeds every 10 inches and leave the strongest plant to grow.

CULTURE OF SWEET PEAS

In order to have any success at all with Sweet Peas they should be planted very early, as soon as the ground can be worked in the spring.

Whenever possible select a position in the garden where they will get morning and forenoon sun only and no afternoon sun; in this way the flowering season will be long and the stems more satisfactory.

Dig a trench about a foot wide and deep and fill in about 4 inches with well rotted barnyard manure. Then replace 4 inches good garden soil. Then open 2 drills or rows about 8 to 10 inches apart and plant seed 1 inch deep.

Whenever the plants are well up they should be thinned out to six inches apart and another two inches of soil applied.

The brush or wire support is placed in the center of the two rows to act as a support to which the vines from both sides can cling.


Watering: Whenever the soil begins to get a little dry give a thorough soaking; about once a week at first and later on twice a week, which is much better than a little sprinkle every day.

Feeding: In most soils Sweet Peas will benefit from Liquid Manure applied after the plants have flowered for some time.

Do not allow dead flowers to remain on vine. The more flowers you pick, the more you will have.





HARDY GARDEN LILIES

The Lilies listed below are for spring planting and should be planted by June 1st. Bulbs should be planted six inches deep except where noted. Lilies do best in the hardy border or among shrubbery, because the flowering stems bear masses of roots immediately below the ground surface, and the shady situation helps protect these feeding roots from the hot sun. Lilies thrive in any well-drained garden soil where the ground does not become water-logged, but do not want to come in contact with fresh manure.



Lilium auratum

Auratum (The Golden-banded Lily of Japan). Delicate ivory white color, thickly studded with chocolate, crimson spots and striped through the center with a golden yellow band. Should be planted 8 to 10 in. deep, in sunny or partly shaded situation. August.

Auratum Phatyphyllum. By far the most vigorous of the Auratum family. Has broad petals with gold band in center. The spots vary in color from brown to yellow.



ROSES

Everybody who has a garden must have Roses. No home is complete without a few of the dwarf varieties grouped in the garden or in beds in the lawn. A rambler or so on the fence or on a trellis adds greatly to the beauty and arrangement of the yard and garden.

Culture and Hints on Growing. Roses like a well drained location where they will get the full sun for at least part of the day. The soil should be prepared at least 18 inches deep with which about one-third of its bulk is replaced by well rotted cow manure. As roses are great feeders, a trowel full of Bone Meal worked around the plant two or three times a season will insure better results.

In planting make the holes rather broader than deep, so that the roots may be spread out naturally in a horizontal position. Set the plant so that the junction of the root and top will be just under the ground surface when leveled off. Work fine soil among the roots, tamping it firmly with fingers and fist, and when

roots are all covered tamp it solid. Water the plant well with a full pail of water.


Fig. 2—Shows the truck with the leaf rack attachment, which is very handy in cleaning up leaves and garden refuse.
