ALFALFA

Cossack Alfalfa

Cossack is one of the hardest and best drouth and frost resisting alfalfas.

This Alfalfa was brought to this country from Siberia by Prof. Niels E. Hansen, an American Agricultural Explorer. A small quantity of this seed was first planted in the high, dry regions of western South Dakota, where other strains of alfalfa had failed completely. The Cossack made a wonderful showing.

Cossack has a double root system, the branch roots as well as the deep tap root, making it both a frost and drouth resister. The crowns are very large and set low in the ground, throwing out from 150 to 300 shoots. It is a heavy producer of good quality hay of fine stems and many leaves.

Grimm Alfalfa

This strain is distinguished from common alfalfa by its branching root system and is particularly adapted to sections where the soil has a tendency to freeze and heave. On such soils the branching roots hold to the ground better than the common alfalfa, which has a deep tap root. Grimm alfalfa has a larger crown, producing more shoots than common, which makes it a better quality of hay.

CLOVERS

This crop is grown here chiefly for the seed, although it makes a wonderful hay crop. Clover is growing in popularity as a hay and pasture crop in some of our mountain valleys and on higher elevations. Clover is a natural cool weather crop and will often thrive in cool sections where it is too cool for alfalfa to do its best. Farmers and stockmen in the high mountain valleys will do well to keep this in mind. They can often grow big crops of Red and Alsike Clover where alfalfa will not produce to advantage. The clovers, are, also, very valuable to mix with other grasses for both hay and pasture.

Medium Red or June Clover

This is the standard strain of clover grown in all sections for hay and pasture purposes and the one grown for commercial seed purposes. SWEET CLOVER

A wonderful pasture and fertilizer plant. It makes a good, quick pasture that will carry the maximum number of animals. If sown straight without a nurse crop and irrigated freely it is ready to pasture in 8 to 10 weeks time and will last two seasons. Sweet Clover is a great drouth resister and can be grown to advantage on dry lands if you have sufficient moisture to germinate and start it. On dry land Sweet Clover should be

sown in very early spring or late fall. On irrigated lands it can be sown most any time during spring or summer. Sow 15 to 20 pounds per acre for pasture purposes. Grows well on all soils.

White Blossom Sweet Clover

A hardy biennial plant growing to a height of from 5 to 6 feet. Starts early in the spring and grows rapidly throughout the season. The heaviest producing strain of sweet clover and the best to sow for fertilizing purposes.

Hog Pasture Mixture

If you keep hogs you need a good hog pasture separate from other livestock. The following will give you maximum results and quick action.

- 10 lbs. Red Clover
- 10 lbs. Alfalfa
- 5 lbs. Meadow Fescue

25 lbs. per acre.

If sown in early spring straight without nurse crop and watered freely this formula should be ready for pasture within two months.

Short Moisture Pasture Formula

In locations where rainfall or sub-moisture is depended on, it is important to use the right kind of grasses best adapted to such conditions. There are many such locations that will produce pasture and hay profitably. We strongly recommend the following mixture for such locations:

- 7½ lbs. Tall Meadow Oat Grass.
- 7½ lbs. Slender Wheat Grass
- 2 lbs. Kentucky Blue Grass
- 5 lbs. Sweet Clover, either white or yellow.

Sow 22 pounds per acre as above. This mixture can be sown on the snow in early spring or in the fall just before the rainy season sets in; any time that you have plenty of moisture to start it. Sow broadcast on a well-settled seed bed. We strongly recommend this formula for irrigated districts where water supply is not dependable.

Sowing Instructions for Grasses and Clovers

Pasture Grasses on Irrigated Lands

Sow all pasture grasses straight, not with a grain nurse crop; grain smothers the delicate young grass plants, making a thin pasture or failure to get a stand at all.

Always sow on a well-settled seed bed. If land has been recently plowed it should be worked down firm before sowing. Grass seed will never catch well on a loose, ashy seed bed. Old clover, alfalfa, beet or bean fields make good seed beds for pasture grasses. Do not plow or disc such land; smooth it out with a spike-tooth harrow and firm it with a good packing tool; then sow your seed.

Sow all grass seeds shallow. This is natural for grasses; just broadcast seed on top of ground and harrow or brush in lightly. Grass seed will not germinate if sown too deep.

Soon as grass is sown, corrugate and irrigate thoroughly; then in four to six days irrigate lightly and continue with light waterings every four to six days for the first four weeks, after which a good irrigation every ten days or two weeks apart should be sufficient. Grass and clover seeds require plenty of moisture when first sown to insure a good stand.

Do not turn stock on pasture when grass is first starting. If turned on when grass is young, animals will pull it up, roots and all, ruining the stand. A new pasture should not be turned onto until roots are thoroughly set. It takes about 90 days after grass starts to grow for the roots to become thoroughly set.

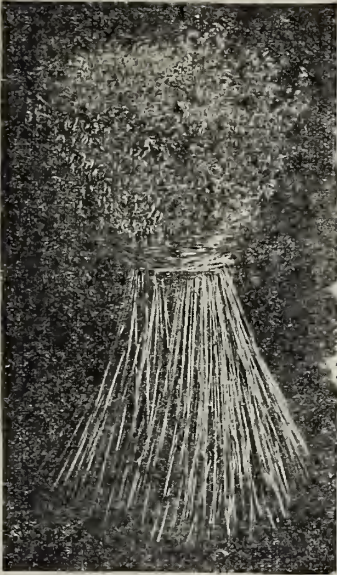

On dry farms, where it is necessary to sow annual pasture, this grain is very valuable. Sow 80 to 90 pounds per acre as early in the spring as weather will permit.

If you need quick pasture Fall Rye has great advantages. If sown in early spring it will soon give an abundance of quality feed. For pasture purposes this Fall Rye is superior, as it stools heavily without shooting seed stalks; will furnish good pasture clear through the growing season. FIELD PEAS

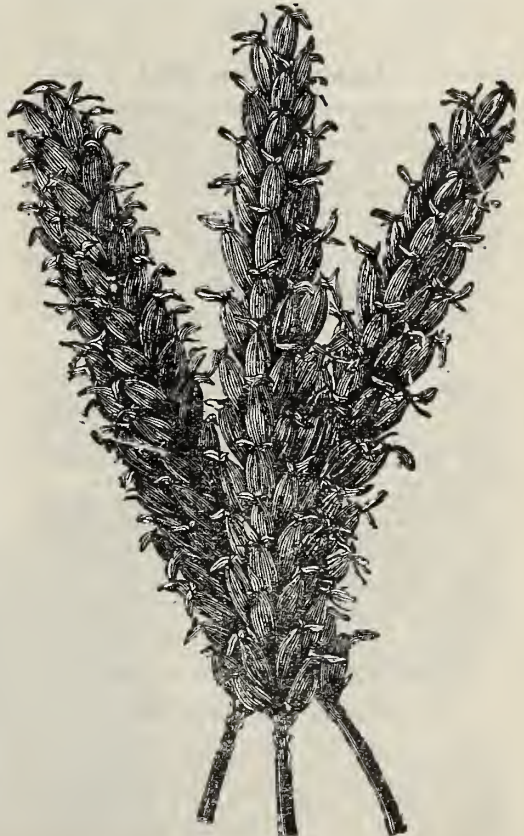
The crop is not expensive to grow, as it is sown just like wheat or other grains; requires no cultivation and when hogged off there is no harvesting or threshing expense.

Peas can be sown either straight or in combination with other grains, like wheat, hulless barley, etc., but be sure to use more peas than other grain in sowing. If the grain predominates it will reduce the yield of peas. This crop should be sown just as early as the ground is ready to work (spring frost will not injure Field Peas.) If wanted for winter feed Field Peas can be harvested and threshed like grain or can be stacked and fed in the straw. The vines make excellent hay or roughage and the hay yield is heavy.

Sow at the rate of 120 pounds per acre straight; if with grain use at least 80 pounds peas per acre and with 40 or 50 pounds grain.
