The above is from a letter written in Sept., 1932, by Roy Erford, Sec'y of the Washington Gladiolus Society. Mr. Erford wrote also:

"Last spring, I received from you a small-sized bulb of your Golden Chimes. It bloomed on Aug. 17th, at which time it had attained a height of 51 inches. There were 21 buds; florets, 5 inches, six open. It was a wonderful spike with perfect placement of florets, and, from the standpoint of beauty, in a class by itself among the yellows." In a later letter Mr. Erford writes:

"I feel that I did not overstate the merits of Golden Chimes. I just can't keep from waxing enthusiastic over that variety. When it bloomed for me, I rubbed my eyes to make sure I was awake and not dreaming. It has an abundance of what may be described as charm. I don't think anybody ever produced anything better than Golden Chimes."

Mr. Erford has been growing a lot of varieties for several years, growing at least 200 kinds each year, and keeps a careful record of each variety each year by means of a card-index system. Hence he knows Glads, and speaks with authority concerning the new ones.

Another authority who has an extra fine collection, Prof. J. C. Gould of Mandan, N. Dakota, writes:

"The big Golden Chimes would have been right at its prime for the Fair here in late July, (1932), but evidently providence thought I was altogether too much wrapped up in that one glad. At any rate, two days before the fair, just as the lower floret was opening, I went out in the morning to take my daily look at the huge spike that was already nearly 6 feet tall. I was intending to cut it and take it to the basement for safe and careful keeping. You can possibly imagine my disappointment and righteous wrath when I found that a demon-possessed grasshopper had flown in during the night, and seeing the Golden Chimes towering up above all the rest, ate a lunch out of the stalk just above the sixth floret. The other 18 buds were so heavy that they had broken off where the hopper had weakened the stalk. The 6 florets that were left made a gorgeous spike by themselves, but I did not cut them to exhibit. It was a good stayer, the florets lasting 5 full days without wilting, out in the hot July sun without protection. The huge spike was perfectly straight until after the grasshopper chopped through. All in all, I feel that this was the finest spike I have ever raised in my 15 years or more of glad growing."

This wonderful strain of **Giant Ruffled Pansies** was originated by **Mrs. Merton G. Ellis**, and has in just a few years become world famous. The blooms are of wonderful shades and coloring beyond all description. They have very heavy texture, sweet fragrance and during good pansy weather a very large proportion of them will be over three, three and a half and even four inches across. They stand erect on very long strong stems and, cut with their very luxuriant foliage, just a few blooms arranged properly make a gorgeous display.

CULTURAL DIRECTIONS

In most climates best results are obtained by planting Pansy Seed in the latter part of **AUGUST** or early **SEPTEMBER**. If planted much earlier the seedlings will be ready to transplant before the Fall rains start and they are apt to die out.

If seed is planted in **OCTOBER**, it is safer not to transplant till spring for in most climates the seedlings will not have time to become established before the freezing weather sets in.

Pansy Seed planted in the early **SPRING** will begin blooming about May and will produce blooms all summer. With good care they will be at their best and give their largest blooms in the Fall. The seed may be planted very early in the Spring in cold frames or hot-beds. When freezing weather is over they may be transplanted where they are to remain.

Sow the seed thinly in flats and just barely cover the seed with sifted soil. Press down with a flat board before sprinkling. More people get a poor germination because of planting the seed too deep than any other cause except by letting the flats or seed-boxes dry out. They must be kept moist, but care must be taken even in this respect. Damping off may result from too much moisture, irregular or other improper moisture conditions. Cover the seed-beds during the hot mid-day sunshine with a cloth frame. Protect them also when there is apt to be a heavy storm. Seed should germinate in about a week in August. It takes a little longer later in the Fall.

Transplant when the seedlings have three or four leaves if the weather conditions are favorable. Better to let them become a little crowded than to transplant during a hot dry spell. They should be planted out in the open where they will get plenty of sunshine and where they will remain for spring blooming unless the winter is apt to be entirely too severe. In some places they will need the protection of cold frames, but pansies will stand even some zero weather if protected by straw or peat moss placed around the plants but not completely covering them. Pansies that weather it through the winter out in the open will make the sturdiest plants, and produce the largest, finest blooms.

Pansies want especially rich soil. Well rotted horse, cow or sheep manures are good; also bone meal and other commercial fertilizers. Too much chicken manure is not advisable.

SPRING PLANTING IS DESIRABLE in climates too severe for the safe wintering over of plants from Fall-sown seed. Pansies are quite hardy and do well in nearly every climate.

SUGGESTIONS FOR MARKETING PANSY PLANTS



People in general want to buy pansy plants in the spring and there is small retail demand for them at other times, so seed must be sown with this in mind.

There is great demand for small plants with from four to six leaves early in the spring. They stand transplanting well and customers will obtain splendid results from them.

There is even greater demand for BLOOMING plants in the spring though they will not stand transplanting as well. They look so attractive put up twelve to the pansy basket, each plant bearing a giant bloom. Each plant should be wrapped separately with newspaper around the roots but not covering up all the foliage. Early in the spring these baskets sell for 90c to \$1.00, sometimes more.

Often it pays better to wrap 50 or 75 separately and place them in a peach tray, letting customers select the plants they wish. They sell readily for 10 cents a plant, and the very best ones will go quicker still at 15 cents a plant. One customer wrote me that she was getting 50 cents a plant and could not supply the demand. People are willing to pay for the best.

Although there is a great demand for pansy plants, yet there is also much competition on public markets, etc., so it is important to have BETTER PANSIES than the others have.

In digging pansies for market it is important to wait until a plant has had a bloom wide open for at least a week. The blooms increase in size greatly after first opening, especially in the spring. It sometimes takes patience to wait for them, but it pays.

There is also good demand from florists for small pansy plants, transplanting size, in the fall. Some amateur gardeners also realize that it is better to buy small plants in the fall than blooming plants in the spring but in general the public buys the blooming plants.

PLANTING DIRECTIONS

Plant the seeds either in early spring or mid-summer, in flats filled with rich soil. Cover with $\frac{1}{8}$ inch sifted soil.

Cover with either cloth or glass frame, glass preferred. If glass frame is used, place a single sheet of newspaper directly under the glass, not resting on the soil. This shades the soil and helps to retain the moisture. Keep quite moist. Remove shade gradually.

When the seedlings have 3 or 4 leaves transplant a foot apart. **Do not transplant during a hot dry spell.** If seeds are planted in summer, the seedlings should be transplanted into a cold frame for the winter. Bone meal is the best fertilizer for delphiniums.
