The following seven sorts are included in the 15 Novelties selected by the All-American Committee of the A.S.T.A. as the best introductions for 1934.

- Calendula, Chrysantha or Sunshine (Gold Medal)**
This valuable addition is distinctly different in flower form, having a striking resemblance to a Chrysanthemum. Flowers 4 inches across, are clear buttercup yellow on long stems for cutting, and grows about 30 inches tall. Pkg. 10c.
- Petunia, Pink Gem (Gold Medal)** The first of a charming new race of plants 5 to 6 inches high, quite covered with 2 in. flowers in shades of pink. Fine for bedding, edging, window boxes, pots, and rock gardens. Pkg. 10c.
- Larkspur, Rosamond (Gold Medal)** A pure rose, self colored, tall double Stock-flowered Larkspur, outstanding in its class. Seed stock very scarce. Pkg. 15c.
- Aster, Los Angeles (Award of Merit)** Los Angeles is a new Super-Giant type. 3 ft. tall. The flowers are full petaled, deep and unusually large, yet artistically graceful in the feathery effect of the interlacing petals. The color is a pure shell pink, one that has been entirely lacking in the Giants of California. Pkg. (100 seeds) 10c.
- Canterbury-Bell, Liberty Bell (Award of Merit)** A dark violet-blue annual Canterbury-Bell blooming in six months from seed. Growth 2 to 2 1/2 feet high, each plant having from 6 to 8 spikes of flowers. Continues until frost. Good as a potted plant. Pkg. 10c.
- Hunnemania, Sunlight (Award of Merit)** Tulip Poppy. Clear canary yellow. It develops a band of short petals on the outside rather than the inside of the cup. This adds to the size and beauty. Cut flowers are lasting and produced over a long period. Pkt. 10c.
- Verbena, Spectrum Red (Special Mention)** New giant-growing Verbena. Intense bright red with out eye. Strongly recommended as the brightest Verbena in existence. Pkt. 10c
