
A Message from the President


ZINNIA FANTASY MIXED

tinues until frost. Not over 6 inches in height. Little Gem: Makes a perfect "blanket of snow" not over 4 inches in height.



CALENDULA (Pot Marigold): (h A) An excellent flower of exceeding beauty. Fine for gardens, potted, or cut flowers. Blooms the entire year if climate permits.

CALENDULA CHRYSANTHA: A pleasing shade of clear yellow. Strikingly new in form and entirely distinct from all existing varieties. The flowers are large and composed of long incurved and loosely arranged petals, giving the appearance of a broad petaled Chrysanthemum.

Radio: A novel development of great popularity. The flowers are deep orange, globular shaped with bristling quilled petals, which add materially to the grace of the blossoms.

Coronaria: Giant white hyacinth flowered. Umbellata Type: Mixed, Crimson, Lilac, Rose, Cardi-

nal, White.
CANARY BIRD VINE: (h A) A rapid growing annual climber, the yellow blossoms bearing a resemblance to a

bird with its wings half extended.
CANTERBURY BELLS: These beautiful flowers are very popular with northwest "flower-lovers." The real bell flowers of all sizes and colors. Every garden, small or large, has a spot for such lovely blooms.

Campanula Medium: Imposing branching plants heavily loaded with large pendant bells. Two varieties: Single mixed and double mixed.

Calycanthema (Cup and Saucer): (h B) A beautiful and distinctive type laden with flowers, each of which is a large cup-shaped bell with saucer. Comes in five varieties: light blue, dark blue, rose, white and mixed.

CARDINAL CLIMBER: (h A) Considered by many garden lovers as the most beautiful annual climber. A strong, rapid grower with fern-like foliage. Literally covered with a blaze of circular cardinal red flowers, from midsummer till frost.

CARNATION (Dianthus Caryophyllus): (t P) Beautiful, colorful, fragrant blooms with sturdy stems. Being easily winter killed should be sown indoors during March. Transplant to other boxes when 1 inch high. Transfer to open garden when soil becomes warm. COLORS: Pink, white, red. Height, 1 to 1½ feet.

Chabaud Double Giant: A new variety, blooms six months after seeded. COLORS: Double cardinal red, double deep rose, double flesh pink, and double mixed.

Margaret: Very popular double mixed. Blooms four months after seeded.

American Hybrids: Large flowering type. Very popular with florists.

CASTOR BEAN (Ricinis): (t P) Tropical appearing foliage plant. Highly ornamental, with bronzed metallic foliage and bright colored seed pods. Grown singly it forms a picturesque pyramid. From 3 to 5 feet high. Pkt. 5c.

Gibsoni: Striking foliage of dark red. Outstanding mixed varieties.

CHRYSANTHEMUM: (h A) Attractive long-stemmed summer flowering plant, wide varieties of color. Sow seed in flats and transplant when soil is warm. Height from 1 to 2 feet tall.

Coronarium: Double, finest mixed.

Carinatum: Single mixed.
Carinatum: Tall double yellow and tall double mixed.

CINERARIA: (t P) Magnificent and indispensable flowering plants for window gardens. White, blue, violet, crimson shades, covering the plant with a sheet of blooms. Should be sown under glass in fine soil.

Hybrida Grandiflora: Semi-dwarf, extra choice mixed.

Pkt. 25c.

CLARKIA (Rocky Mountain Garland): (h A) A beautiful native flower of the Pacific Coast. Does very well in shady places and is excellent for cutting. Produces bright attractive flowers massed in beds. Height, 1 to 2 feet.

DAHLIA: (t P) To grow these beautiful flowers from seed does not require the skill of an expert. Sow seeds in boxes indoors very early, transplanting to open, when danger from frost is past. They will bloom the first season. Tubers of the best may be used the next season.

Coltness Mignon: A beautiful dwarf variety. Excel-

lent for bedding.

Double mixed and Single mixed.

DAISY: (h A) A flower every Pacific Coast garden should have. Beautiful true color blooms, excellent for cut

flowers or open gardens.

African Daisy (Arctotis Grandia): A useful and charming cut flower from June till late frosts. Will last a week or two in water, undeveloped buds opening up perfectly if kept in sunshine. Plants form bushes about two feet across. Deep foliage and daisylike flowers, pale lilac color.

Orange African Daisy: Extremely showy annual with bushy plants 12 to 15 inches high. Flowers are 2½ inches across, rich orange gold, with dark disc and

halo. A magnificent sight in bloom.

DELPHINIUM: (h P) Due to recent improvements, this flower has become the most popular tall growing perennial on the west coast. Our seeds come from the improved original strains found on the north coast of Wales. The range of colors run to the most delicate combinations of mauve and light blue, Crater Lake blue, heliotrope, pinkish-lavender, deep blues and purples.

EVENING PRIMROSE (Oenothera Lamarckiana): (h B) Outstanding for exposed positions, in border or rockery. A constant bloomer all summer. Shades of yellow. Sow seeds early in boxes covering very lightly with fine soil firmly pressed down.

FOUR O'CLOCK (Mirabilis Jalapa): (t P) These flowers make an excellent combination with "Moon Flowers." Their blooms open at four o'clock and close at sunrise. Early culture, bearing a profusion of bright flowers of various shades. Sow seed early in the open and transplant. 2 to 3 feet in height.

Choice Mixed.

FORGET-ME-NOTS (Myosotis): (h h P) Excellent for the shady damp spot in your garden. Start early for flowers the first season or sow in summer for blooms the following spring.

Blue, Dwarf Sky Blue and Mixed.

GAILLARDIA (Blanket Flower): (h A) Its brilliant flowers are among the gayest ornaments in the summer gardens. Free blooming from early summer until autumn frosts. These beautiful flowers are very effective as border plants or cut flowers. Colors of striking yellow, crimson and orange.

Picta Lorenziana: Finest mixed double annual. Picta Single. Outstanding splendid mixed. Perennials: Prtala Hybrids and Fine Mixed.

GERBERA (Transvaal Daisy): (t P) Another colorful African Daisy variety of uniform beauty. Does best in warm situations or corners well protected from early frosts. We offer a splendid mixture of hybrids of this beautiful flower, shades ranging through red, cerise, salmon, orange, yellow and white. Pkt. 15c.

GERANIUM (Pelargonium): (t P) This universally known and best liked flower is very easily grown from seed. Sow thinly in boxes indoors, covering with glass until seedlings appear. When about 1 inch high, transplant to small pots in rather poor soil, firmly pressed down. Later re-pot or transfer to open ground.

Zonale: Extra choice, single mixed. The well known

bedding geranium.

Lady Washington: Foliage green, flowers large. Finest mixed. Pkt. 15c.

GOURDS: (h A) A sturdy and rapid grower with excellent climbing ability. Especially fine for covering verandas and trellis work. Bears large tubular flowers of white or yellow, followed by curiously shaped fruits which often resemble familiar objects, such as eggs, oranges, dipper, club or pitcher. When ripe they will keep indefinitely. Plant after soil is warm.

GYPSOPHILA (Baby Breath): (h A) These light airy plants have little foliage but produce a very lovely effect in the garden. They are unexcelled in their ability to add much charm to bouquets. Easily raised from seed. Plant very early in flats, transplanting when soil becomes warm.

Grandiflora Alba: True white. Convent Garden strain. Grandiflora Rosea: Pink form of the above. Very de-

sirable.

Perennial: Paniculata Alba; single.

GEUM: (h P) Flowers like little double roses are gracefully poised on long stems over a thick rosette of strawberry-like leaves.

Mrs. Bradshaw: Beautiful scarlet.

Lady Stratheden: Brilliant golden yellow. Pkt. 15c.

HELICHRYSUM (Monstrosum): (h A) The finest ever-lasting for the home garden. This hardy annual makes an excellent winter bouquet with its red, yellow and white flowers. Sow in open and transplant or thin to twelve inches apart.



JOB'S TEARS (Coix Lachryma): (h A) The narrow cornlike leaves of this odd ornamental grass bear numerous little sprays of flowers. Grows 12 inches high.

KOCHIA CHILDSII (Summer Cypress): (h A) This gracefully poised plant forms symmetrical decorative bushes. Green foliage turning fiery red in autumn. Grows 1 to 2 feet tall.

KUDZU VINE (Jack-and-the-Bean-Stalk): (h P) A great climber! Will grow from 8 to 10 feet the first season. When once established it may grow from 40 to 50 feet a season.





EARLY FLOWERING SPENCER **SWEET PEAS**

OR those home gardeners who have had trouble in producing later varieties of Sweet Peas we highly recommend these Early Flowering Spencers. They come into bloom from three to four weeks earlier, and for that reason they should be well in flower before the summer droughts arrive. In addition to this, the vines have a long blooming season, and where nights are cool they will continue to bear for months. After plants are well up, thin to four to five inches apart, draw soil around them until trench is filled above the level. This gives depth to the roots, preserving moisture. Keep ground well worked and water if needed, and, occasional thorough soaking being better than a daily sprinkling. Keep flowers cut close. Pruning tips of vines will aid in prolonging the season of bloom and insure better flowers.


