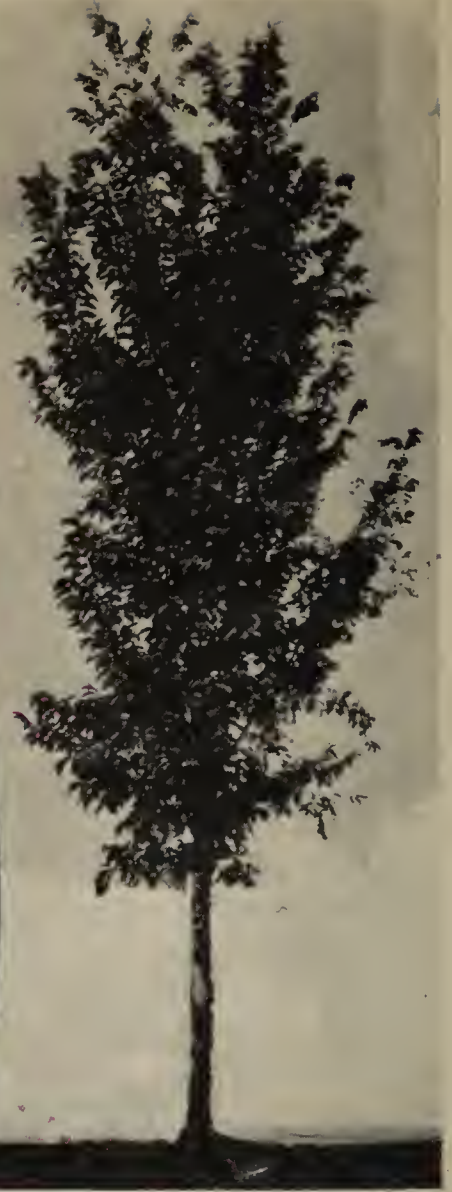

Father started in the nursery business nearly a half century ago—before most of us boys were born.

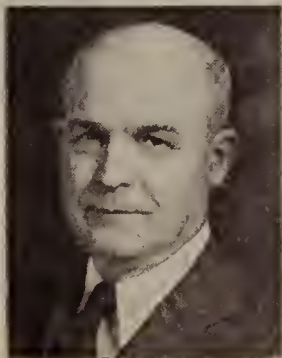

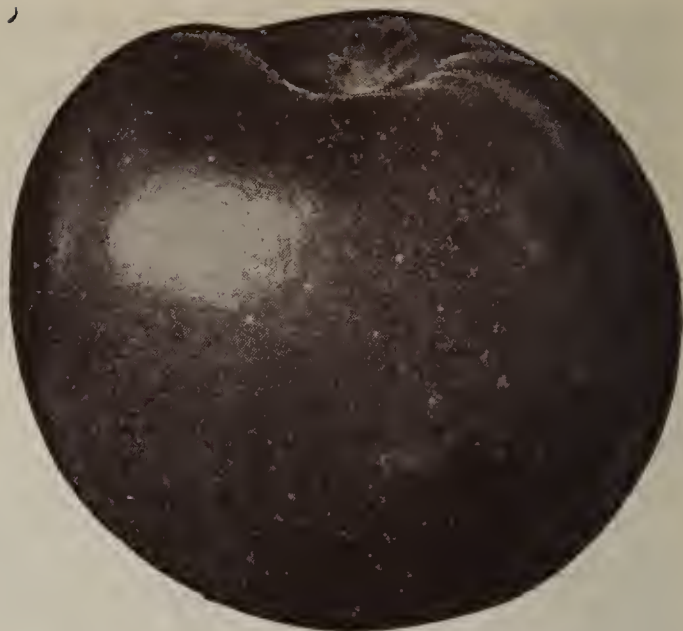
Have the hole for each tree dug plenty large, so that you can fill in good top soil all around and on the bottom of the root.

Plant so deep that the tree stands about 2 or 3 inches deeper than before in the nursery row.

It is wrong to bank up soil around the tree. We advise you to have the surface level or a little lower right around the tree. This will allow water to get to the roots.

Root-pruning. At planting time the ends of all roots should be cut smooth with knife; do not neglect this.

FALL APPLES

These are considered winter apples in the northern states, where the ripening season is too short for some of the regular winter apples.

Maiden Blush Bears young and regular. Apples are of good size and flavor.

Wealthy This is the leading fall apple. Perfectly hardy, good eating and cooking apple, large, mostly covered with red, fine grained, juicy, but a little sour. Very productive. Ripens here in September. They ripen early, but are not good for long keeping. In the home orchard, plant only small numbers of Summer Apples. For market, they pay well, especially near the cities.

SUMMER APPLES

Duchess of Oldenburg Very hardy, medium size, greenish-yellow with red stripes. Bears extra well. Ripens in August to September.

Early Harvest Medium size, greenish, tender and juicy. A fine eating apple. Very hardy, and a good bearer. The earliest apple to ripen here, in July.

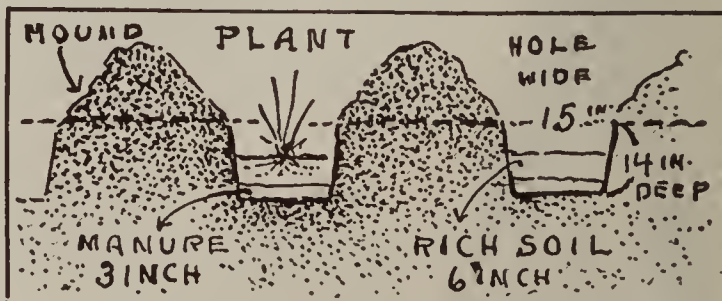

Planting of Flowering Shrubs Dig the holes just as you would for trees; that is, plenty large, so that you can have several inches of good, loose top soil all around and on the bottom of the root. Always fill in with good top soil, and just before the hole is completely filled, apply plenty of water, which will settle the soil properly. When the water is all soaked down, fill up with loose soil to have the ground level.

After planting, your shrubs should stand about 2 to 3 inches deeper than before in the nursery row.

On all trees and shrubs cut the ends of the roots smooth, just before you plant. This should never be neglected.

Flowering shrubs may be cut back at the time of planting to any desired height. In later years, that is, on older shrubs, pruning may be done during the dormant season, removing the oldest wood by making the cut close to the ground. Flowering shrubs may also be pruned in the summer, this pruning pertains to the branches only, and is always done after the shrubs have bloomed.

PLANTING and CARE of FLOWERING SHRUBS

Planting Prepare the holes for the roots to have them a good deal bigger than the roots would require. This will allow you to fill in with loose top-soil all around the roots. Set the shrubs so that the stand about 2 inches deeper than they stood in the nursery row. Apply plenty of water to set the soil.

Pruning On old shrubs the oldest wood should be removed entirely, making the cut on the surface of the ground. This pruning is done late in the fall or very early in the spring. Shrubs that are not of the desired shape should be trimmed back to any desired size or shape shortly after they have bloomed.

HOW TO PLANT CLEMATIS

The small flowering Clematis are easy to get started. Special attention, however, should be given the planting of the large flowering plants. We advise to dig a large hole, in the center of which a cone-shaped mound of soil should be formed, and the roots of the plant should be spread evenly over this mound of soil. Then fill in with good top-soil. When planted the crown of the root should stand one-half to one inch below the surface of the ground. Cool soil with some moisture is best for Clematis, occasional watering, and a mulch of peat-moss are advisable.

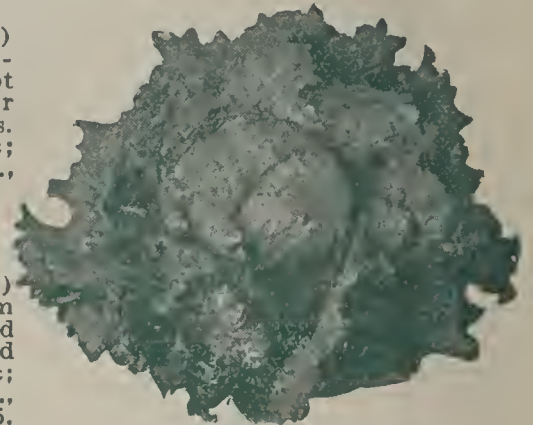
