The former has been said by competent judges to be the finest thing yet seen in its color class, and the latter is richer and shows the strongest bronze coloring than anything the introducer has seen in its color class during a recent trip in Iris season, along the Atlantic Seaboard from Washington to Boston.

A special price is made to those mentioned in this heading of \$3.50 per single rhizome of Arabian Prince, with the understanding that the purchaser makes a written statement that he or she will keep it within his or her garden during 1934, '35, and '36. Of course, at the listed price of \$4.00, no such statement will be asked and required. But one rhizome to each purchaser; the supply is very limited, largely due to a steady demand for it from those who have seen it during 1933, and '34. Keep its height in mind, viz: 20 to 22 inches.

Regarding Bronze Glory, a special price of \$5.00 per strong rhizome is quoted to you and sold at this figure under the same condition as governs Arabian Prince. As to Arabian Prince, its color will please everyone; as to Bronze Glory, this is frankly a question for every deep, rich, bronze, brown-red in existence, will have its somber tone, and there will be some who will not like a brown-red, however rich it may be. And, just as frankly again, we think it is far ahead in richness and velvety qualities of many fine varieties now in commerce. The supply is fairly large and from one to three rhizomes can be sold to each purchaser.
