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### A Message of Introduction

IN PRESENTING my 1936 catalogue, I wish first to announce that the purpose of compiling these pages is to give to the gladiolus growers not only a selected list of varieties but also valuable information that will be of assistance in the growing of better gladiolus. If I have done this I will have accomplished my purpose.

Each year I endeavor to offer a list of gladiolus containing the finest varieties it is possible to gather together. To do this I have collected what I considered to be the best American and foreign introductions and thoroughly tested them before offering them for sale. I have tried to give as accurate descriptions as possible but you must bear in mind that under varying conditions gladiolus will not always give the same results.

Included in this year's catalogue are brief but concise cultural directions, giving information on soil preparation, planting, fertilizing, watering and cultivating. The proper methods are given for the control of thrip in the garden and in storage. Also the proper treatment for the prevention of scab or neck rot. I trust that this information will be of some value to you.

### 1935 Awards

My gladiolus won the three major awards at the Minnesota Gladiolus Society Show again this past season. They are listed as follows:

Minnesota Gladiolus Society Permanent Trophy for the grand sweepstakes. (The second consecutive year winning this prize.)

The Colonial Gardens Challenge Trophy for winning the majority awards offered for the artistic arrangement of baskets, vases and bowls.

American Gladiolus Society Gold Medal for winning the most points in the open class.

### Comparative Prices

In buying bulbs do not consider price alone, as quality of the stock and reliability of the grower are of greater importance. However, I do believe that my prices are very reasonable considering that I offer good quality and service. Generous extras are always included with every order to insure you good value.

### Highest Quality

My soil is well adapted to the growing of vigorous clean bulbs. Irrigation is resorted to when necessary, so that the bulbs will not lose their vigor struggling to exist during dry weather. All Glads offered in this list are grown in my nursery. I do not make a practice of buying bulbs for resale or having them grown for me. All bulbs are guaranteed to be free of disease and insect pests, true to name and full sized. I would suggest, if you want good northern grown stock, that you place your order without delay, as many of the newer varieties are very likely to be sold out early in the season.

### Key to Classification

An added feature in my catalogue this year is the tabular headings at the top of each page. Under these headings and directly under each variety you will find abbreviations which will enable you to determine easily and quickly the substance, kind of floret, season of bloom and the type of flower. I have tried to be as accurate as possible in giving this information but a few minor changes may be necessary after further trial of some of the newer varieties.

The substance is the thickness of the petals and is classified as Excellent, Good and Fair, which are abbreviated by using only the first initials of each.

The kind of floret is indicated by "Pl." for plain petals, "Ruf." for ruffled petals and "Lac." for laciniated petals.

The season of bloom is divided into Early (60-70 days), Early Midseason (70-80 days), Midseason (80-90 days), Late Midseason (90-100 days), and Late (over 100 days). These are abbreviated by the first letter of each word.

I am using the new type classification as adopted by the American Gladiolus Society which places all gladiolus under one of three groups. These groups now class gladiolus as to size rather than on form or shape. The type is indicated by Exhibition, Decorative and Small Decorative, which are abbreviated by "Ex.," "Dec." and "Sm. Dec." respectively. Exhibition varieties have very large flowers and many florets open at one time. The decorative type is not hampered by demands for extreme size and many open, the florets usually being about four or five inches in diameter. Beauty of form and color are the important features of this type. Some of our finest cut flower varieties come under this class. The small decorative flowers have florets three inches or under, the smaller the better. This new classification gives us a truer and more accurate idea as to the type of flower and the smaller and more decorative varieties are now given their proper recognition at the shows.

### Terms

Please send cash or 25% deposit; balance before shipment. No orders accepted for less than \$1.50. Transportation charges prepaid. Five bulbs sold at the 10 rate and 25 or more at the 100 rate. Minimum charge for any item, 10c. As the planting and care of all bulbs and plants sold by us are beyond our control we can not be in any way responsible for the results after planting.

Large bulbs are  $1\frac{1}{4}$  inches or more in diameter but in most cases will be  $1\frac{1}{2}$  to 2 inches. Medium size will be from  $3\frac{1}{4}$  to  $1\frac{1}{4}$  inches and small bulbs from  $1\frac{1}{4}$  to  $3\frac{1}{4}$  inch. When there is a figure before the price such as 2-.15 it means 2 bulbs for 15c.

### Miss Marion

ERE is a flower that everyone will want to grow in their garden because it is early and of a shade of lavender not seen in any other gladiolus. Miss Marion will be in big demand as soon as it is better known and the stock is available. It has all around good characteristics and I cannot name a single fault that I have observed in the growing of this flower.

At the 1934 Indiana Gladiolus Society Show Miss Marion was entered in a collection of ten seedlings. This collection was awarded the I. G. S. Silver Medal. One spike of Miss Marion had 28 buds with 16 florets open that were 6 inches across. It was declared by many critics to be the best lavender in the entire show. After having grown it in Minnesota we are of the opinion that it will not be surpassed in its color class by any other variety for some time to come.

### COLOR

Beautiful mauve lavender, with a soft cream throat that enhances its beauty. It is a color that has long been sought after by hybridists and is a welcome addition to the gladiolus color scale.

### SEASON OF BLOOM

Approximately 75 days, depending on location and type of soil. It blooms considerably earlier than Minuet and that fact alone makes it a very valuable variety.

### SPIKE

Decorative type of flower, opening up to 10 florets at once in perfect placement. Twenty-two to 24 is the average number of buds but 26 is not unusual. We have never known a spike to crook.

### **SUBSTANCE**

Very good. The florets never burn or fleck and stand up under the hottest weather.

### **GROWTH**

Vigorous grower, producing a sturdy plant with wide rich green foliage. Blooms from young stock.

#### PROPAGATION

Good producer of bulblets that germinate very easily. It also makes sound healthy bulbs.

#### ORIGINATOR

Mr. Lloyd O. Zimmer, Bremen, Indiana. I am introducing Miss Marion in conjunction with Mr. Zimmer, having bought one-half of the stock from him last year. He is also the originator of such well known varieties as Queen of Bremen, Dream O'Beauty, Bob White and many others.

### PRICE

The stock of Miss Marion is comparatively small but we decided to market a limited amount this year. Bulbs are being offered in all sizes and at a very reasonable price. Bulblets are being withheld to increase our stock.

### Orange Delight

This miniature decorative variety, originated by Mr. A. E. Kunderd, is without a doubt the most outstanding gladiolus in its class. The color is a combination of apricot orange overlaid with bittersweet orange. Its brilliancy, together with its dainty spike, gives it a charm that words cannot describe. Laciniated petals and the very unusual form of the florets add to the beauty of this flower. For artistic arrangement in bowls and vases it cannot be equalled when a touch of color is desired. Orange Delight is a consistent winner in the shows and is enthusiastically admired by everyone who has seen it. It is an early bloomer, vigorous grower and good propagator. We predict a great future for this distinct flower.

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### Cultural Directions

#### SOIL PREPARATION

The soil best suited for the growing of gladiolus should not be too heavy and not too sandy. If too heavy add some humus material such as leaf mold, manure, etc., and perhaps some sand if soil is a heavy clay loam. To very light soils add peat, manure or leaf-mould as this will help to hold the moisture and keep the soil from drying out. All soils should have plenty of humus or the action of commercial fertilizers will not be so effective. Gladiolus will grow in any soil, but a little preparation will pay you well.

#### **PLANTING**

Before planting the bulbs, work the soil to a depth of eight to ten inches. Plant in rows eighteen inches apart and three inches between the bulbs in the row. They can also be planted in beds, placing the bulbs six inches apart each way. Place the bulbs six inches deep in light soil and four inches in heavy soil. Small bulbs are planted more shallow. Plant in full sun if possible.

#### FERTILIZING

Manure should be well worked into the soil in the fall. Use a commercial fertilizer in the spring, placing it below the bulbs or else working it well into the soil before planting. Five pounds to a one-hundred foot row is the amount to use. A fertilizer high in phosphoric acid should be used at this time, such as 4-16-4 or one of similar formula. The first figure indicates the percentage of nitrogen, the second phosphoric acid and the third, potash. A second application may be made between the rows when the leaves are six to ten inches high. If you wish to grow extra large spikes, use a fertilizer high in nitrogen about the time the buds begin to appear. One to two pounds is sufficient for a hundred-foot row.

#### WATERING AND CULTIVATING

Water every four or five days if necessary, but be sure to give them a good soaking when you do. Light sprinkling does more harm than good. Keep the surface of the soil well stirred up. Cultivate after each rain or watering to keep a crust from forming.

### Thrip

Thrip are tiny insects that feed on the leaves and blossoms. They live over winter in rubbish piles or on the bulbs in storage. Control of thrips in storage can be accomplished by placing the bulbs in bags or closed boxes and spreading naphthaline flakes over them. One ounce to one hundred bulbs is sufficient. Close the container tightly and leave for two or three weeks in a warm room. Then remove the naphthaline and place in cool temperature. Another good treatment is to soak the bulbs for four hours in Corrosive Sublimate, one ounce to ten gallons of water, using a wood or earthen container. This is also a preventive against scab on the bulbs.

Summer control of thrip can be accomplished by spraying the foliage at ten-day intervals, beginning when the plant makes its second and third leaves. One ounce of paris green (two tablespoons), two pounds brown sugar and three gallons of water has proven a good formula. A good pressure in spraying is beneficial. Care must be taken not to spray in the heat of the day as the paris green might burn the foliage slightly. Three or four applications are usually all that is necessary but you must start spraying when the plants are small

### Disease Control

Scab or neck rot can be controlled to a great extent by the following practice: Destroy all diseased bulbs, dip all bulbs in a good disinfectant and plant on clean ground that is well drained. Corrosive Sublimate is a good dip, using the same formula and treatment as for thrip. Calogreen has been found to be unusually effective in the control of scab. Dip just before planting for five minutes, using one-half ounce to one gallon of water. A little Calogreen must be added occasionally to keep the strength up. Metal containers may be used. Spraying the foliage during the summer with Bordeaux Mixture, using eight to ten tablespoons to one gallon of water, is also beneficial in the control of neck rot.

### Wayzata Everbearing Strawberry

I would advise you to place your order early. The past two years the supply of plants available for sale has been exhausted very early in the season and many were obliged to go without them or plant other varieties. Try them and you will never grow any other variety of everbearing strawberry.
