1936

Twelve years have passed since I prepared my first little iris list. Years packed full of joy and sorrow, with the garden a haven of refuge in times of stress. Years full of many interests, of business cares that banished me from our Virginia garden for the greater part of each year. Years full of gardening violently in Virginia in summer, trying to make up for lost time, and peacefully in Texas during the fall, winter, and spring.

Years that were full of trying new plants; of making plant friends; of receiving old friends; of happy hours spent in coaxing willful or reluctant native plants to share our garden and bloom; and the ever recurring interest of crossing this with that, waiting for seed to form, to germinate, and finally the wonderful thrill of seeing the resultant plants grow to maturity and bloom.

One of the greatest interests brought by these years has been the comparison of the behavior of plants in the two gardens, especially that of iris rhizomes. Those of some varieties that have large or fairly large rhizomes in Virginia, dwindle perceptibly in Texas, without however effecting the bloom. These same roots replanted in Virginia, quickly regain their normal size. Some iris that were not remarkable in Virginia were very beautiful in Texas, while others that were lovely in Virginia refused to grow in Texas. So to the usual interest of growing beautiful and worth while iris was added the incentive to grow those that would do well in both places.

One thing to be remembered when planting iris in Texas, and I also prefer the practice in Virginia, is to cover the rhizome with at least an inch of dirt. Planting "as a duck sits in water" just went wrong down there. Good drainage.

Hemerocallis are happy in both climates, doing well in sun or shade, provided they are planted in a loose rich soil and watered during very dry spells.

Narcissus need only to be planted in a well drained spot, left alone, and the foliage allowed to die naturally, to give lovely bloom for many years before division is needed.

Falls pale rose purple, flushed Siberian purple; veined dull magenta purple with flash of aniline yellow at haft. Styles aniline yellow, ribbons rose purple. Beard cadmium tint orange. Flower 4X4 inches, ruffled. Stalk 30 inches.  
With the richness and general color effect of the Tallma rose - a lovely iris. \$ 3.00
- KING NOTTOC - (Davis 1936) Shekinah X ---. Standards and falls white flushed at claw and haft lemon yellow; falls heavily veined pyrite yellow at haft; Standards edged lemon yellow two thirds up. Styles white, rib pyrite yellow. Beard cadmium deepening to chrome. Flower 4½ X 4½ inches; stalk 30 inches.  
Clear cut, bright and effective. Stock limited. \$10.00
- NO-STN-911 - (Davis 1936) Record lost. Standards pallid blue violet deepening to pale violet blue. Falls pale bluish violet flushed amethyst violet. Styles broad, fringed, pale violet blue. Haft white veined old gold. Beard white, tip lemon. Standards broad, cupped; falls broad, flaring. Flower 6 X 6 inches, stalk 30 inches.  
This huge flower is beautifully shaped, well placed on the stalk for grace, and is very lovely. \$15.00
- PECOS - (Davis 1936) Mother of Pearl  $\frac{3}{4}$  Dominion. Standards Bradley's violet, falls velvety anthracene violet, flushed petunia violet at center. Styles white, crest and rib Bradley's Violet. Beard white, tint apricot. Standards conic, falls flaring. Flower 5 X 5½ inches; stalk 38 inches.  
For a number of years I have selfishly kept this lovely iris to myself until the insistent demands from garden visitors have compelled its naming and introduction. \$ 3.00
- SAXET - (Davis 1936) Record lost. Standards deep dull bluish violet, veined and flushed old gold; falls nigrosin violet, flushed and veined ox-blood red. Haft white heavily veined old gold. Styles deep dull bluish violet with amber edge. Beard orange. Standards broad, cupped; falls flaring. Flower 5 X

5 inches; stalk 30 inches. Unusual and pleasing. Effect of puckered silk.

This is truly an artists flower, charming either in garden or vase. Stock limited. \$10.00

RIO GRANDE - (Davis 1936) Lewis Trowbridge X Halfdan. Standards Verbena violet; falls light hyssop violet, flushed hyssop violet at center. Haft ivory veined old gold. Claw slightly veined old gold. Styles verbena violet, rib hyssop violet. Beard white, tip primuline yellow. Standards conic, falls drooping; both broad, ruffled. Flower 4 X 5 $\frac{1}{2}$  inches; stalk 36 inches.

In effect a very lovely pale blue self of an unusually rich satiny finish. \$3.00

SHIMMER - (Davis 1936) Shekinah X ---. Standards cream edged nappes yellow, flushed amber at claw. Falls pale verbena violet, flushed and edged rose buff, veined old gold at haft. Styles amber. Beard heavy, primuline yellow tip orange. Standards cupped, ruffled; falls flaring. Flower 4 $\frac{1}{2}$  X 4 inches; stalk 36 inches.

This is one of the very loveliest of Shekinah's daughters. The coloring is very rich and - it shimmers. \$10.00

SIVAD - (Davis 1936) Crusader X Dominion. Standards light lavender violet, falls anthracene violet, flushed manganese violet. Styles fringed, light lavender violet; edge ivory; rib ivory. Claw and haft reticulated nappes yellow. Beard primuline yellow. Flower 6 X 5 inches; stalk 38 inches.

A truly magnificent flower. Stock limited. \$15.00

SUGAR CANE - (Davis 1936) Crusader X Dominion. Standards cream with underbone of pale rose purple, flushed at claw and edge mustard yellow; falls pale rose purple, flushed liseran purple, and veined old gold. Styles nappes yellow edged mustard, rib mustard. Beard primuline yellow tip orange. Standards cupped, falls drooping. Flower 4 X 4 $\frac{1}{2}$  inches; stalk 36 inches. Very floriferous.

An unusual and lovely flower, with the substance of its parents and a decided break in coloring. \$7.50

NOTE: GIBBER FOR BULBS MUST BE IN BY NOVEMBER as we only dig those ordered. We do not follow the two year cropping system that is customary with most commercial growers, and which produces bulbs of larger and uniform size. Some of our stock has been in the ground from four to eight years or longer, and so eventually the bulbs when dug are of a larger size and as uniform in size as those from above plan. We consider that the method we follow produces stronger, healthier bulbs and better bloom.
