When the plants are 5 or 6 lnches in height, transplant into rows 3 to \(31 / 2\) feet apart, setting the plants from 2 to 3 feet apart in the rows, accordlng to the variety. To prevent violent heating it is good policy to mix thoroughly with the manure, about one fourth its bulk of good loamy soil and oak leaves. In making up the bed, tread it firmly and, lf necessary, wet it sllghtly. Leave it thus for about a week, or till the temperature of the bed has subsided to 85 or 90 degrees. Then make holes about 10 inches apart and put in each a piece of spawn about the size of a walnut. Cover the holes and press the soll solid and smooth. Mushrooms will appear in slx or eight weeks from time of spawning. The bed will continue bearing about a month. No mushrooms can develop if the temperature is insufficlent; the bed should not be below 80 degrees at time of spawning, and the atmospheric temperature not below 65 degrees.

Swedish or Rutabaga Turnips are largely grown for a farm crop, as weil as for the table; make sowings from the 10th of June untii the last of July, in drills 2 to 3 feet apart, and the plants when well up should be thinned to from 8 to 10 inches apart. They are best preserved in a pit or cellar during the winter and are excellent for the table early in spring.
