







Mushrooms

One brick of Mushroom Spawn is sufficient for 10 square feet of bed.

For the bed, use a mixture of horse manure and good fresh loam. Before being placed in the bed let the material be thoroughly mixed and well turned three or four times. To prevent violent heating it is good policy to mix thoroughly with the manure, about one fourth its bulk of good loamy soil and oak leaves. In making up the bed, tread it firmly and, if necessary, wet it slightly. Leave it thus for about a week, or till the temperature of the bed has subsided to 85 or 90 degrees. Then make holes about 10 inches apart and put in each a piece of spawn about the size of a walnut. Cover the holes and press the soil solid and smooth. Mushrooms will appear in six or eight weeks from time of spawning. The bed will continue bearing about a month. No mushrooms can develop if the temperature is insufficient; the bed should not be below 80 degrees at time of spawning, and the atmospheric temperature not below 65 degrees.









For a continuous supply through the season, sowings should be made every two weeks until the last of July, from which time until the middle of August the principal sowings are made for fall and winter use. Swedish or Rutabaga Turnips are largely grown for a farm crop, as well as for the table; make sowings from the 10th of June until the last of July, in drills 2 to 3 feet apart, and the plants when well up should be thinned to from 8 to 10 inches apart. 


