LAWN AND GOLF COURSE SEED

BENT, GOLF-A-LAWN (*Agrostis tenuis Astoriana*)

This strain has a wide range of adaptability and is especially suited to the heavier soils. It spreads from underground creeping roots which produce a splendid upright growth of fine texture and of a rich green color. Makes a permanent turf which will stand hard usage. Unexcelled in combination with other turf-forming grasses for the home lawn, such as is to be found in our A-1 Mixture. Especially fine for Putting Greens, Bowling Greens, Athletic Field Mixtures and Estates. Certified Seed: 1 lb., \$1.75; 10 lbs., \$15.00. (Sow 1 lb. to 350-500 sq. ft. of area.)

BENT, SEASIDE (*Agrostis stolonifera maritima*)—

Often referred to as Coos County Bent, Cocos Bent. A true, stoloniferous, creeping bent. As its name implies, it thrives in the lighter soils adjacent to the sea coast. Makes a splendid, permanent turf either used grasses. Certified Seed: 1 lb., \$1.75; 10 lbs., \$15.00. (Sow 1 lb. to 350-500 sq. ft. of area.)

BLUE GRASS, KENTUCKY (*Poa pratensis*)—

Produces a firm, velvety, elastic turf of deep, vivid green. Thrives in open situation away from Summer Fogs. Roots deeply, forming a permanent turf on the heavier types of soils. Unsatisfactory on sandy soils.

TURF AND LAWN MIXTURES

There are many advantages in securing carefully executed formulas of turf and lawn grass mixtures for definite exposures and soil conditions. No one grass, or grass seed mixture will thrive under all exposures surrounding a home, especially if there are hedges or trees to create shade.

Species of grasses vary in their range of adaptation to soil and climate and exposure; consequently, it stands to reason that, using several congenial grasses together, the chances of securing a good permanent turf are correspondingly increased.

Single strain lawns, of Bent, or Fescue, require considerably more attention than the average Home Gardener cares to or has the time to give them, inasmuch as each type of lawn grass seed has its good and its poor or rest periods.

A-1 SPECIAL TURF MIXTURE—

Contains a portion of Bent in combination with other fine-leaved, turf-forming, long-lived grasses. Improves with age. No Rye or Clover. We offer this as the best blend possible to obtain for a permanent turf. Unexcelled. Has produced many of the finest and most beautiful lawns in the Bay Area. HARDY LAWN MIXTURE (formerly sold under the name of Golden Gate Mixture Improved)—A popular mixture of hardy grasses with a little Clover, which grows quickly and stands considerable abuse. Thrives in light and medium heavy soils. 1 lb., 50c; 10 lbs., \$4.50. (Sow 1 lb. to 100 sq. ft. of area.)

NAVLET'S EMERALD GREEN TURF MIXTURE—



After the dormant season, roses cannot be handled "bare root". They must be planted in containers. The prices remain the same, excepting that they must be shipped by express, charges collect. The dormant season extends from November to April.

The difference in price (aside from Patented varieties over which we have no control) is not to be taken as indicating superiority or inferiority of varieties. Many old favorites in the 35c group surpass the more recently introduced or more popular 50c group in beauty and general satisfaction.

- Cher.** (Cherokee) Climbers, very glossy evergreen foliage, mainly single flowered. Often used for hedges if trained on wire.
- HT** (Hybrid Tea) Perpetual bloomer, with delicate blending of colors, vigor and great hardiness. Many have Tea scent very strongly.
- HP** (Hybrid Perpetual) Hardy, very resistant to cold. Growth vigorous and upright, with long, unbranched canes. Stems long; flowers borne erect; foliage rough; fragrance very distinct.
- Pern.** (Pernetiana) Very recent class; result of cross between Persian Yellow and Hybrid Perpetual. A wonderful group with startling color effects.
- Pol.** (Polyantha) Small flowers borne in large clusters. Very rampant growth and bloom only in the Spring.
- DP** (Dwarf Polyantha) Low-growing, the flowers in clusters, blooming all Summer.
- T** (TEA) Growth is slender and not very vigorous. Foliage very glossy. Bloom continuously. Require considerable pruning, good soil, and proper care, for which this variety will repay you.

ARIEL (HT) Bud and flower large, globular, very lasting, semi-double, orange-copper, darker at the outer edge, borne singly on long stem. Very hardy.

AUTUMN (HT) Medium size, egg-shaped, burnt orange, flower medium size, double fragrant, burnt orange, inside buff and gold, streaked with red. Free bloomer.

DUCHESS OF YORK (HT) Flowers large, full. Bud deep yellow, opening to a deep shrimp center and gold base.

E. G. HILL (HT) Massive blooms. Deep maroon velvety inside. Perfumed old rose.

ETOILE DE FEU (HT) A very bushy plant. Buds are globular. Flowers cup-shaped. Color orange-salmon. Very resistant to mildew.

ETOILE DE HOLLANDE (HT) Flowers gigantic, rich velvety crimson produced with great freedom. One of the best reds.

FEU JOSEPH LOOYMANS (HT) Erect plants with glossy foliage. Long pointed buds of glowing apricot and old gold, opening to large richly tinted yellow blooms.

GLORIA MUNDI (Poly)—The flowers are of a very brilliant orange-scarlet. Very double and has good lasting qualities. Very beautiful.

GOLDEN EMBLEM (HT) A beautiful clear yellow, occasionally flaked with coppery orange on outer petals. Beautifully shaped buds, glossy green foilage.

INDEPENDENCE DAY (HT) Buds are sunflower yellow overlaid with orange apricot, with colors blending as buds develop.

IMPRESS (HT) Beautiful orange-cerise. Good keeper. Blooms fully double. A very showy rose.

J. C. THORNTON (HT) A very good variety. Flowers are of a glowing-crimson scarlet. Strong grower. Very much admired when grown in the garden.

PRESIDENT JAC SMITS (HT) Rich velvety scarlet-crimson; semi-double; brilliant in color. Tall grower. Good for cutting in bud form.

PRESIDENT HERBERT HOOVER (HT) Vigorous, healthy rigid stems, long pointed buds, blended orange and pink, varying from coppery red in the bud, to glowing orange-yellow at the base of each petal, suffused with vivid rose-pink.

PADRE (HT) Brilliant coppery-red flushed with yellow at the base. Strong upright grower and exceedingly free flowering.

QUEEN ALEXANDRA (HT) Large flowers (5" across), double, full, moderately fragrant of a velvety rose-red, suffused with lemon-chrome, fading to deep rose-pink. Light lemon yellow reverse. Dark green, glossy, disease-resistant foliage. Vigorous, continuous free bloomer.



TALISMAN

JOANNA HILL (HT) Orange-yellow, darker than Sunburst. Full, semi-double. Vigorous, upright growth. Profuse bloomer.

LADY FORTEVIOT (HT) Golden yellow, changing to deep apricot. Extremely fragrant. Continuous bloomer all season. Bushy.

MARI DOT (HT) Bright salmon passing to salmon-pink, yellow base. Glossy, green foliage. Vigorous, healthy growth.

MISS ROWENA THOM (HT) Blending of fiery rose and rosy mauve, together with old-gold. Continuous bloomer all season.

MRS. ERSKINE PEMBROKE THOM (HT) Clear, deep canary yellow, without a trace of shading. Upright habit. Profuse bloomer all season.

MRS. SAM MCGREDY (HT) Scarlet-copper-orange, heavily flushed Lincoln red on outside of petals. Profuse, continuous bloomer.

SUSAN LOUISE (H. Gig) Long-pointed deep pink bud, semi-double flesh-pink flower. Upright 4-5 ft. Intermittent bloomer.

ROSE MARIE (HT) Large, globular bud; very large, cupped, double, moderately fragrant, clear rose-pink, borne singly on long stem. Abundant, glossy dark green large disease-resistant foliage.

ROSLYN (HT) Beautiful new yellow. Large double flowers on long stems. Orange colored bud. Bloom golden yellow, center deeper with orange splashings on back of petals. Lustrous foliage.

SOUVENIR DE MME. BOULLET (HT) A full deep yellow rose, almost orange in the center of the bud. Buds are long and open into a cup-shaped flower.

AMERICAN BEAUTY (HP) Perpetual bloomer. Deep, brilliant rosy-carmine, exquisitely shaded.

BETTY UPRICHARD (HT) Buds are coppery-red and as the flowers open the outside of the petals is orange-carmine, inside a delicate salmon pink. Semi-double and very fragrant.

CECILE BRUNNER (DP) The smallest of the roses. Compact, fairy-like, rose-pink flowers, very double and fragrant.

CHATEAU DE CLOS VOUGEOT (HT) Brilliant scarlet shaded fiery red, changing to dark velvety crimson. Perpetual bloomer. Very double and intensely fragrant.

CUBA (HT) Produces enormous semi-double blooms of a blazing red-orange. Very showy in the garden. Strong, vigorous plant with excellent foliage.


DAME EDITH HELEN (HT) Bright pink rose, large and perfectly shaped. Heavily perfumed. Bloom abundantly, with long, strong stems.

DAZLA (HT) Long-pointed buds; flowers extra large, semi-double, with waving petals of brilliant brownish-orange and a large golden circle around stamens at base. Fine for hedging.

GENERAL MacARTHUR (HT) Branches freely. Blooms crimson-scarlet. Every shoot carries a large, double, well formed flower of exquisite fragrance.



- INFORMAL DECORATIVE (ID)—Double flowers, full to the center, usually with long, twisted petals, and often irregular in arrangement.
- FORMAL DECORATIVE (FD)—Double flowers, full to the center, usually with broad, flat petals, often rounded at the tips, and regular in arrangement.
- CACTUS (C)—Double flowers, full to the center, with long, narrow, pointed petals, incurved, recurved or straight, but rolled more than half their length.
- SEMI-CACTUS (SC)—Double flowers, full to the center, with coarse, twisted petals, usually somewhat incurved, and rolled ordinarily less than half their length.
- PEONY (P)—Semi-double flowers showing a bright yellow center, having small twisted petals circling about the center.









Pruning the Cane Fruits—Blackberries, Dewberries, Raspberries, etc. The cane fruits bear on the growth of the previous season. The first thing to remember then is: cut out old canes as soon as they have fruited. Better done soon as possible after the crop is harvested, although it may be deferred to Fall or Winter. Over prolific varieties, should have all but four or five canes cut out to the ground. Cut back the new canes and their side shoots a third or so in the winter or early spring.

PEST CONTROL CHART

Numbers used in this chart correspond to those assigned to the INSECTICIDES AND FUNGICIDES listed on preceding pages. Where more than one number is shown, the Gardener has a choice of material to effect control. The order in which they are given indicates our preference, except 15-22 where either is equally effective.

We have indicated the period during which it is considered best to apply the Spray and Dust Materials listed as follows:

"D"—Dormant application during rest period in winter when deciduous trees have dropped their foliage.

"SD"—Semi-dormant application, when leaf and blossom buds are swelling and show pink in Spring.

"F"—Applications during period of leaf development and during full growth.

Where indicator is not shown, apply soon as insect or disease noted, or during full growth as the case may be.

- Angle Worms—In Lawns and Moss. Use 46.
- Aphis (Aphids or Plant Lice)—Curl and stunt tender leaves and blossoms and make leaves sticky with honeydew in which black Smut Fungus grows. 25-32-26-20-(9 & 45)-10a. (F).
- Aphis Eggs—On Prune, Cherry, Almond and Peach Trees. 23, (D).
- Aphis, Woolly—On Apple and Pear Roots 29.
- Argentine Ants—Are carriers of Mealy Bug, Aphis and Scale. Kill in Soil with 2-29-25. Kill through workers with 1-3.
- Army Worms—Larvae of night-flying insects. 36-11.
- Bacterial Gummosis and other wounds of the bark, scrape off dead wood and paint wound with a paint made by mixing 8 with water.
- Beetles—The 12-spotted green Lady Bug is typical. Larvae feed on roots and tubers. Adults feed on bright colored flowers. 12a-13-6.
- Blight—Celery 21; Ornamentals, Garden and Greenhouse Plants 21; Peaches (Shot Hole Fungus) or Almonds 15-22-8 (Nov. 15 to Dec. 15); Potatoes and Tomatoes 6-8.
- Brown Patch—Large and Small on Lawns. Use 27-35.
- Brown Rot—Apricots and Cherries 8 (SD); Prunes and Plums 15-22-8 (SD).
- Cane Blight—Blackberries, Loganberries, Raspberries 22-8 (D).
- Caterpillars—Attack foliage of a wide variety of plants and trees. Spray with 5b or s. Dust with 12a.
- Cherry Slug—Cherries and Pears. Dark green worms secrete a slime and look like Slugs. Eat off the surface of leaves, leaving network of veins. 25-13-5B (F).
- Codling Moth—(Worm of Apples, Pears, Quinces). Important to follow sequence of sprays. 5 (SD) (F).
- Curl Leaf—Peaches and Nectarines. Curling and distorting of leaves. Trees often defoliated. Nothing can be done to cure it, but it can easily be prevented 8-15-22 (SD) 7-33 (F).
- Cut Worms—Larvae of night-flying insects. 36-11.
- Damping-off Disease—Of seedling plants. Treat soil and plants with 35-7-33.
- Earwigs—Attack plants, flowers, vegetables in the garden, and anything in the house. 19-36-37-38.
- Fern Lice—Weak solution of 26-(9 & 45) -10a.
- Flea Beetle—Tiny blue or green with metallic lustre. Eat away leaves. 13-25-6. Tomatoes 6.
- Grasshoppers—Moisten and scatter 36-11-37-38.
- Ground Squirrel—Gas with 14. Poison with 31.
- Lawn Moths—Distribute 5 lbs. 5 to each 1000 sq. ft. and wash in thoroughly. (See Page 8 Planter's Guide.)
- Leaf Beetle—On Strawberries. Dust with 12a-13.
- Leaf Hopper—On Grapes. Dust with 14-25.
- Leaf Miner—Some call them tracing bugs, because they leave winding white areas on leaves as they feed on the leaf tissue of Cinerarias, Holly, Chrysanthemums, Nasturtiums. Use 20.
- Leaf Rollers and Leaf Tiers—Caterpillars, common to Apples, Cherries, Roses, etc., which roll and tie and eat leaves. Dust 12a-13. Spray 10a-5b.
- Mealybugs—Waxy scale likely to be found almost anywhere. They suck the sap from twigs and roots of plants and secrete a sticky honeydew that covers foliage and harbors Black Smut Fungus. Control Ants, vice versa. On Plants, spray, saturate soil around roots and dip roots of all suspicious transplants 20-28. Dig 43 into soil around infested plants. Mix Tobacco Dust in soil at planting time.
- Mealy Plum Louse—Plums and Prunes. 9-45.
- Moles—Open runway at intervals and put quantity of 14 or 29 or 24 in each hole. Close hole.
- Mildews—Attack nearly all plants, covering leaves, succulent new growth and buds with a gray, powdery growth. On Apples, Pears, Currants, Grapes, Spray 41-15-22; Dust 40-42. On Garden and Greenhouse Plants and Ornamentals Dust 21-40-42; Spray 7-33-41-22b. On Peaches, Beans and Peas, Dust 40-42. On Cucumbers, Spray 8. On Delphinium, Dust 21; Spray 7-33-22b. On Roses Spray 8-15-22 (D); Dust 21-40-42; Spray 7-33-22b (F).
- Morning Glory—Use 44, after sundown.
- Moss—On Trees. Use 3 lbs. Caustic Soda in 100 gals. water, and spray thoroughly. (D).
- Oak Moth Caterpillar—Make spray of 3 lbs. 5s in 100 gals. water, add 1 gal. black strap molasses as a bait. (Where sensitive or tender plants are under the Oaks, use 4 lbs. 5b instead.) Apply when Caterpillars are small, March and April for winter brood on Live Oaks. For summer brood spray last half July or first half August. Dust with 12a-13.
- Peach Borer—Roots of Peaches, Apricots, Prunes and Cherries. Apply 29 as soon after Sept. 1 as possible. Clear off and smooth ground around tree. Place 1 oz. to each tree in a ring about 2 in. from the tree. Do not let it touch the tree. Cover with dry dirt banked up against trunk and tamp. Trees must be at least 6 years old.
- Peach Worm (Peach Twig Borer)—Peaches, Plums, Nectarines, Apricots. Spray 5b (SD). Combine with Curl Leaf Spray.
- Pear Thrips—On Prunes, Pears, Cherries. Dust 25.
- Pine Tree Borer—Use 16.
- Red Berry—Himalaya Blackberries (Blackberry Mite.) Spray 15-22 (D), 33-41 or 28 (F).
- Red Spider—Almonds, Apricots, Cherries, Peaches, Prunes, Plums. Spray 15-22 (D). Dust 40 (F).
- Rot of Bulbs—Corms, Roots, Tubers. Use 35.
- Rust—Asparagus, Beans. Dust 40. Roses, Hollyhocks, etc. Spray 33-41-22b.
- Scale—On Deciduous trees. 23, (D); 28 (F). Evergreen trees and shrubs 28 (F).
- Slugs—Cherries, Pears. See "Cherry Slug."
- Slugs, Snails—Moisten and scatter 36-11-37-38-42a.
- Sow Bugs—Scatter 39 in dry places. 36-11-37-38-42a.
- Squirrels—Use 14-31.
- Termites—Saturate soil with solution of 44. Treat holes leading to nests with 14-29.
- Thrips—On Gladiolus. Treat Bulbs with 24. Spray foliage with formula including 22a. Pears, Prunes, Cherries, see "Pear Thrips." Found in the flowers of most plants. When a flower is shaken over the hand, the Thrips fall out and look like animated straw slivers. They are responsible for misshapen and marred flower petals and browned tips. Dust 25-32.
- Weeds—In areas where plant life is undesirable. Use 44. Dandelions and Broad-leaved Weeds in Lawns. Use 44 concentrated applied to each plant. Dilute Sulphate of Iron and apply. (See Page 8 Planter's Guide.)
- Weevil—On vegetables. Dust with 12a-19.
- White Fly—Larvae. Spray with 20-28. Adults, Dust with 25-32. Under Glass, fumigate with 14G.
- Wireworms—Long, slender, smooth larvae which turn into beetles in three years. Unplanted beds, treat with 14. Planted, with 29, mixed in top soil. Must not touch stems.
- Woolly Aphis—On Roots. See "Aphis (Root or Woolly)." On branches and trunk of Apples and Pears. Spray with 20-26-(28 & 9).
