



WHEN AND WHAT

THE RIGHT TIME for sowing all seeds as we give them in the different months, should naturally be governed by the conditions of the weather and the soil.

JANUARY-Sow in hotbeds: Cabbage, Lettuce, Beets,

Onion, Tomato and Cauliflower.

Sow outdoors the latter part of the month: Turnips, Mustard, Spinach, and English Peas.

FEBRUARY—Sow outdoors: Radish, Turnip, Mustard, Spinach, Onion Seed, and English Peas. Set out Onion Sets and Onion Plants. Sow Sweet Peas.

Sow in hotbeds: Cabbage, Beet, Tomato, Eggplant, Kohlrabi, Lettuce, and Pepper.

Set out frost-proof Cabbage Plants. Sow Lawn Grass. Sow Oats, Canada Field Peas, Red Top, Orchard Grass and Lawn Seed. Set out Grape Vines and Fruit Trees. Spray trees now.

MARCH—This is the month to begin general garden operations. Sow outdoors: Cabbage, Lettuce, Carrot, Beets, Parsley, Parsnips, Leek, Onion Seeds, Salsify, Spinach, English

Plant Onion Sets, Irish Potatoes. Sow Sweet Peas. Plant Early Corn. Set frost-proof Cabbage Plants, Onion, Cauliflower and Lettuce plants, Asparagus, Horseradish and Rhu-Early Corn. barb roots

Sow: Clover, Grasses, Oats, Alfalfa, Lawn Grass, Rape,

Set out fruit trees of all kinds, Strawberry, Raspberry and Blackberry plants. Continue to spray trees.

APRIL—Sow Beets, Bush, Pole Beans, Carrots, Cress, Celery, Cucumber, Endive, Leek, Lettuce. Mustard, Okra, Parsley, Parsnip, Kohlrabi, Herbs, Peas, Radish, Swiss Chard, Squash, Tomato, and Turnip. Set out Onion Sets; plant Potatoes and Corn. Set Cabbage, Beet, Onion and Lettuce plants.

Sow all kinds of Flower Seeds and plant Spring Bulbs. Sow Rape, Clovers, Alfalfa, Millet, Sorghum, Kaffir Corn, Lespedeza, Sudan, Orchard and Herd's Grass. Plant Cotton, Corn, Artichokes, Crotalaria.

Continue your spray work on Fruit Trees.

MAY—Plant Bush, Pole, Lima Beans, Beets, Cabbage, Carrot, Corn, Cucumber, Cantaloupe, Endive, Eggplant, Lettuce, Mustard, Okra, Pepper, Parsley, Parsnips, Peas, Pumpkin, Squash, Swiss Chard, Spinach, Tomato.

Sow Flower Seeds; put out Flower Bulbs; Cabbage, Tomato, Pepper, Eggplant and Sweet Potato slips. Sow Millet,

Sorghum, Sudan. Bermuda Grass, Cow Peas, Chufas, Peanuts, Field Corn and Popcorn, Sov, Velvet Beans, Cotton, Kaffir Corn, Milo Maize, Sagrain.

JUNE—As you get space in your garden, plant Corn, Cucumbers, Cantaloupes, Collards, Pumpkin, Okra, Squash, Watermelon, Swiss Chard, Salsify, Carrots, Savoy Cabbage, and late Beets. Set out Tomato, Eggplant, Pepper and Sweet Potato plants. Sow a later crop of Bush, Lima and Pole Beans. Sow Tomato seed for Fall Crop.
Sow Stock Peas, Soy Beans, Buckwheat, Broom Corn, Sorghum, Velvet Beans, Sudan, Bermuda Grass, Millet, Mexican June Corn and Sagrain.

JULY—Plant for late crops Corn, Cucumbers, Carrots, Savoy Cabbage, Collards, Tomato Seed, Bush, Pole and Lima Beans, Okra, Squash, Potatoes, Pumpkin, Rutabaga, Turnips. Sow in the field: Cow Peas, Millet, Sorghum, Soy Beans, Sagrain, Sudan Grass, Mexican June Corn, Buckwheat.

AUGUST—Begin to plant now your Fall Garden. If weather is favorable, sow Turnips, Kale, Radish, Rutabagas, Collards, Mustard, Beet, Bush and Pole Beans, Lettuce, Cucumbers, Squash; plant Potatoes for late crop. Sow Crimson, Burr Clover and Millet.

SEPTEMBER—Get busy on your Fall Garden. Sow Turnips, Rutabagas, Kale, Mustard, Swiss Chard, Spinach, Lettuce, Endive, Radish, Onion Seed. Set out Shallots, Onion Sets. Sow Crimson, Burr, Alfalfa, Red Clover, Grass Seeds, Vetch, Austrian Winter Peas, Rye, Barley, Winter Oats, Range Rape.

OCTOBER—Sow Spinach, Kale, Seven Top Turnips, Mustard. Set out Onion Sets, Shallots.
Sow Rye, Barley, Winter Oats, Wheat, Vetch, Austrian Peas, Rape, Alfalfa, Red Clover, Burr Clover, Grass Seeds, Lawn Grass Seed.

NOVEMBER—Set out Onion Sets and Shallots. Sow Winter Oats, Rye, Barley, Wheat, Lawn and other Grass Seeds. Set out Fruit Trees, Strawberry plants, Asparagus roots. Plant Hyacinths, Tulips, Crocus and Narcissus bulbs.

DECEMBER—Get your hotbed ready and sow Cabbage,

Lettuce, Beet and Cauliflower seed for Spring use.
Continue to plant Dutch bulbs. Set out Fruit Trees and Shade Trees. Spray fruit trees and grape vines this month.

ALFALFA

Alfalfa deserves to rank first among the legumes. It furnishes more green forage, more pasture and more dry hay per acre than any known variety of hay or grass. Pound for pound of dry feeding matter, it is worth more than any other forage—and is relished by stock, cows, sheep and

As a soil builder, there is nothing better—extremely deep rooted, it withstands drought better than most other legumes. In the South, Alfalfa usually lasts four or five years without reseeding, sometimes longer, depending on presence of weeds, weather conditions, etc. Do not pasture so closely as to injure the crown or new shoots.

Alfalfa requires a sweet soil—if your soil is acid, apply sometime ahead of seeding, the fall previous to seeding if possible, at least 3 tons ground limestone per acre broadcast and harrow this in. It will not grow on acid soil. Sow on good loam or clay or medium sandy soils, provided they are well drained to a depth of at least four feet. Avoid soil with a "hard-Pan" close to surface, for it prevents drainage. Avoid low spots where water stagnates or freezes—Alfalfa cannot stand "wet Feet." Sow on a bed free of weeds—if possible, sow on land which has been in some cultivated crop. Plow previous fall if possible, or at least several weeks in advance of seeding. Then disc and harrow frequently to set the seed bed—a firm seed bed is desirable as it conserves moisture.

Sow 20 to 25 rounds per acre (some use 30 or 35 lbs.) cover about 1 inch. Some roll the seed in, using corrugated roller or cultipacker. Plant in March and April, September or October.

INOCULATE THE SEED BY ALL MEANS. If not inoculated, young plants have to depend on whatever nitrogen is available in the soil, usually not a fifth of the large quantity they require. When inoculated, the bacteria soon supply all the nitrogen the plants require and assure a vigorous growth. Lack of inoculation has caused many Alfalfa failures. Use either Nitragin, or Dickinson's Humus, described and quoted on page 19 of this catalog.

Inoculation of your seed before planting will give you a much stronger and quicker growth, producing a greater tonnage of hay. The cost of inoculation per acre is so small that the increased yield will repay it many times.

The big benefit comes in the value added to your land. The roots of the Alfalfa are the home of the inoculated bacteria, that draw the fertility-building nitrogen from the air and store it in swellings on the roots called nodules. These nodules not only feed nitrogen to the plant, but rot away in the ground to supply valuable nitrogen to all future crops of all kinds.

Lespedeza Sericea, the New Perennial Lespedeza

An entirely new type—once planted, it comes back each spring from the crowns like Alfalfa, and is often called "The Poor Land Alfalfa." All other lespedeza varieties must be re-seeded or allowed to drop their seed each year.

Sericea has an enormous root system, penetrating often four feet into the soil, with a perfect mat of smaller roots spreading everywhere—You can see what this means as a positive cure for soil erosion. Further it seems to be the answer to a farmer's prayer for a pasture that is drought proof. Sericea pastures in Korea in use for fifty years are better today than ever. The enormous root system is loaded with nodules of nitrogen, adding immensely to soil fertility provided you inoculate when seeding.

Sericea will grow apparently anywhere in the South on almost any type of soil (except Miss. Delta buckshot) without liming or any kind of treatment. Two cuttings of hay and a seed crop may be obtained each year, as high as four

tons of dry hay in one season, the equal of Alfalfa in feeding value. Sericea is extremely leafy.

Plant only hulled and scarified seed in April or May, after danger of frost is past. This treatment of the seed brings quick germination. If you plant unhulled seed in the spring you won't get 10 per cent germination, so avoid this. For seed crop, plant 2 pounds scarified seed per acre in $2\frac{1}{2}$ ft. rows. The yield is from 300 to 900 lbs. of seed per acre. For hay, sow 10 pounds of scarified seed per acre. Have your seed bed free of weeds, thoroughly plowed, disked and harrowed, cover seed very lightly—you can use a light roller to advantage, firming the soil to conserve moisture.

The first year you will see lots of grass and weeds, but don't give up—the second year Sericea looks much better, and the third year, and thereafter, you have a crop you will be eternally proud of.

LESPEDEZA—Japan Clover

Three species of lespedeza—two annuals and one perennial—should be considered before deciding which to plant. The annuals are (1) Common, with two improved varieties, Tennessee 76 and Kobe, and (2) Korean. The perennial is Lespedeza Scricea.

The annual Lespedezas are grown all over the South, on every sort of soil without use of lime on poor worn out soils, and where Red Clover and Alfalfa won't grow without lime. Sow for pasture, for hay, for soil improvement or for seed and algorithm.

seeding—Sow in February, March and April either alone or on top of winter grain. If alone, have soil thoroughly pulverized before sowing the seed. Rolling the seed in will firm the soil and conserve moisture. The secret of success is to get a full stand early. Sowing 25 or 30 pounds of seed you can expect a good hay crop that fall under normal conditions; or good grazing may be had beginning soon after grain harvest and continuing until frost. Red Top or Herd's grass and Orchard grass are fine in combination with Lespedeza for grazing, the grasses coming out much earlier. Inoculate all lespedezas—Use Humus or Nitragin.

Kobe Lespedeza

Kobe has certainly earned a home for itself on Southern Farms, particularly where long periods of drought occurred, for Kobe came through these droughts where Common Lespedeza was burned out. This drought resistance is a life-saver to a farmer, and is no doubt due to the very extensive root system and its rank growth, with larger than ordinary leaves. We have seen Kobe 38 inches tall but usually it is 2 to 2½ fect tall. We have seen yield of 4 tons per acre with Kobe. It is excellent for hay and pasture alike. Can be sown with oats, also with Orchard Grass and Red Top or Herd's Grass.

Korean Lespedeza

Korean is the earliest of the annual Lespedezas, coming up first and growing rapidly, therefore giving earliest grazing of any lespedeza. Grows taller than Common, larger plant and coarser, with broader leaflets. Korean matures earlier than other lespedezas, seed beginning to ripen in September. The only variety suitable for Northern half of the United States. Korean is fine in combination with grain for it will drop seed before time to break the ground to sow grain in the fall. Korean is fine in pasture combinations, and an abundant hay yielder.

Tennessee No. 76 Lespedeza

This variety is similar to the common or wild variety, except that it is taller and more upright in growth, holding

all the branches off the ground, even when the plants stand alone. It is finer stemmed than Korean or Kobe, and grows to the height of nearly three feet under favorable conditions. It blooms slightly later than Kobe and considerably later than Korean or Common. The hay yields made on the West Tennessee Experiment Farms are larger than those of the other varieties.



Common Lespedeza

The original variety, grown all over the South, for hay, grazing and soil building. Not so tall as Kobe and Korean but is a good erop and will always be in demand.

Hop Clover, or Yellow Hop

(Annual)

This clover will be found growing wild over a good portion of the South, and is very valuable in all pastures. Hop comes out very early in the spring and lasts until mid-summer, when Bermuda Grass and Lespedeza take up the job of furnishing pasturage. Grows about 6 to 8 inches high, is very similar to lespedeza but a little more upright and has a yellow blossom instead of lespedeza's purple bloom. It is the earliest and fastest growing clover adapted to the South. Clays and loams that are not constantly wet satisfy it best. Sow 1 to 3 pounds per acre in your pasture mixture.

Black Medic

Grows all during the winter and is just the thing to build up run-down soil and will improve the yield of crops that are planted on the land the following spring. Sow in March, 18 to 20 lbs. per acre.

White Dutch Clover

(Perennial)
Creeping in type, not adapted for hay but excellent in lawns and should be in all pastures. Much relished by stock, and high in protein. Does not cause bloating, comes out very early in spring without interfering with other grasses, thrives under trampling. Sow 1 or 2 lbs. per acre in your pasture

Inoculate

Seeds of all legumes—clover, alfalfa, vetch, all peas, beans and related crops—will yield far better if inoculated with Nitragin or Dickinson's Humus, and in addition leave in the soil a heavy deposit of nitrogen which benefits all succeeding crops. Farmers and gardeners who have used it would not be without it.

Red Clover Makes a Good Hay Crop

Red Clover

(Biennial)

As a soil builder, Red Clover is equal to any; in feeding value, it ranks next to Alfalfa. Should be on every Southern farm that will grow it. Requires a sweet soil, well drained—medium fertile to rich. Plant alone for hay or with Timothy. Fine in pastures, and a splendid soil builder. Sow in March, April, September, October. Be sure to inoculate with Humus or Nitragin, if you want best results. Prepare seed bed well thoroughly, discing and harrowing, sow seed and roll in with roller or cultipacker; have ground free of weeds.

Alsike Clover

(Biennial)
Somewhat smaller seed than Red Clover, 6 to 8 pounds per acre enough, about equal to Red Clover hay in feed value, hay a little finer and preferred by stock. Rarely winter kills. Will thrive on poorer soil, and does fine on damp moist soils. Does not require lime, or at least very little. Grown and handled throughout same as Red Clover.

White Blossom Sweet Clover

(Biennial)

Good for forage pasture and soil improvement—will grow on almost any Southern soil (even very sandy soils) that contains lime, thriving on land too poor to grow Red Clover or Alfalfa. Resembles Alfalfa when young but grows much larger, almost same rank in feeding value; both as hay and green forage. Stock seldom relish it at first, but when forced to eat it, soon develop a decided preference for it. Cut it before it reaches the blossom stage—too woody after that. Has a deep-spreading, heavy root system making it a big Nitrogen gatherer and soil improver, provided it is inoculated. Use Humus or Nitragin. Pasture from time plants are 6 inches high—the more stock you turn on it the better, for close grazing encourages its growth, and when tall becomes coarse and unpalatable. Being a biennial, will disappear unless allowed to make seed second fall.

Yellow Blossom Sweet Clover

The Yellow Blossom type is very similar to that of the White Blossom. For those who wish to use Sweet Clover for pasture, hay and bee purposes, we would advise the use of the Yellow Blossom type.

Mammoth or Sapling Clover

Very much like the common Red Clover but larger, heavier and later. Recommended for thin soils. Sow 10 to 12 pounds to the acre.

Crimson Clover

(Annual)

Sow 12 to 15 pounds in August and September in South. cut for hav in early bloom stage next spring, which is best time to turn under for soiling crop. Also furnishes large amount of Nitrogen in soil if properly inoculated. Use Humus or Nitragin.

Burr Clover

Sown in July, August and September. Makes superior pasturage, fair hay, and grows on any thin land, and if turned under the following spring, acts as a splendid fertilizer. Sow 20 pounds of burrs to the acre.

New Early Giant Burr Clover

Exceeds all other varieties as it attains a height of 4 to 5 feet while Common Burr grows only 1 to 1½ feet and besides it is 3 to 4 weeks earlier in growth, blooming and maturing of seed. It succeeds on any loamy sandy soil. As a cover crop for turning under, you can't beat this new Giant type of Southern Burr Clover. Sow in August and September 3 to 5 bushels to an acre. These are composed principally of grasses which ripen together for cutting; but they also contain other grasses which will also add very much to the pasturage yield, in case it is desired to use the fields for pasturage. These grass mixtures afford splendid crops of hay of the finest quality and highest feeding value, and after being cut will give continuous and abundant pasturage till winter comes. May be used for hay exclusively, or for hay and pasturage as needed.

PERMANENT GRASS MIXTURE No. 1. For hay or pasture. Recommended for light, loamy or medium upland, for either hay crop or grazing purposes. Composed of Orchard Grass, Perennial Rye Grass, Meadow Fescue Grass, Red Clover, Alfalfa, etc. Sow 30 to 35 pounds to

Russell-Heckle's Grass Seed

In planting grass seeds the land should first be thoroughly cultivated and pulverized. The seed may then be scattered by hand or with a hand-seeder, such as described in this catalogue. A harrow or rake should then be used, which will mix the seeds with the soil so they will be covered about one-quarter inch deep. If not convenient to sprinkle, the planting should be done when there is a good season in the ground, and land rolled or dragged after harrowing. This will pack the soil so the moisture will be saved from evaporation and thus cause the seed to germinate, and to nurture the grass until it establishes a good root system.

Sudan Grass

Sudan is an annual and must be planted over each spring, after the ground has become thoroughly warm. Very quick growing, Sudan can be cut 3 or 4 times each season, depending on moisture present. Ready to cut about 8 to 9 weeks after sowing, when first heads appear, or a little later won't hurt. Let it stand in cocks until thoroughly dry; the stems are very juicy and take longer than leaves to cure. Can be sown with Soy beans or Cowpeas and the mixture makes a well balanced ration. If planted on rich land, will yield splendidly. Sudan hay alone is relished by stock, and is as nutritious as Timothy. Should be planted on fairly rich loamy soil.

As a summer pasture, Sudan has few equals, continuing until frost. It is well to run mower over Sudan before turning stock in it—this will start it to stooling and prevent the whole young plant from being pulled up. Sudan is a splendid milk producer, supporting 1 to 3 cows per acre all summer depending on conditions. ('an be cut and fed green also. Plant 10 to 15 pounds in drills, 25 to 30 pounds per acre, broadcast.

Red-Top or Herd's Grass

This grass makes excellent pasturage and a good crop of fine quality hay, and succeeds on a greater variety of soils than any other in general use. The place for Red Top is on rather moist soil, deficient in lime and fertility. It will grow where the soil is too poor for Timothy and Kentucky Blue Grass, and once established thickens and improves year after year. It is a good variety to sow with Timothy and Clover for meadow or pasture and is more permanent than either of the other two. On good soil it grows about two feet high; on poor, gravelly land about half that height. It has been grown successfully even on alkali land where other grasses failed. It requires about 8 to 10 pounds to seed an acre of the Fancy Clean seed. It can be sown either in the spring or fall.

Orchard Grass

A long-lived perennial, comparatively deep-rooted, therefore, drought resistant. Splendid in pastures, furnishing about the first green bite in the spring and the last in the fall. Grows well in the shade of orchards and open wood lots. Prefers a well-drained rather light, neutral or sweet soil. Equal in productivity to Timothy, and outlives it—about same feeding value. Cut in full bloom for hay. Sow spring or fall in the South, 21 to 28 pounds per acre on thoroughly prepared pulverized soil, then roll in, making firm seed bed.



Sudan Grass

Bermuda Grass

Bermuda delights in sunshine and warmth. It is extensively used in this section for levee work and pasture. The seed should be planted in April, May or June. Seed requires 20 to 30 days to germinate. The ground should be well prepared with a good firm seed bed, and seed broadcast at the rate of ten pounds per acre. Do not cover more than half an inch. The seeding should not be done too early, as the seed will not germinate if sown before the weather and ground become warm.

Hulled Bermuda Grass

Is the same Bermuda Grass seed with the outer hull removed. This promotes quicker germination, requiring 8 to 10 days only, as against 20 to 30 days for unhulled seed. Further, only about one-half the amount of seed is required when using hulled seed.

Timothy

A short-lived perennial, usually lasts 3 to 5 years, as the root system is rather shallow, it thrives best on rich, moist bottom lands, and on heavier types of soil—poorly on thin or sandy soils. Prefers sweet soil but does not form a sod. Won't stand close pasturing but is very palatable and will not injure stock no matter how much is eaten. For hay, cut after the purplish blue blooms have fallen, when the seed have formed and are in "milk" stage. Set the mower bladefull 4 inches above the ground. Vields 1½ to 3 tons of hay.

Sow spring or fall, 15 pounds alone or 10 pounds Timothy and 5 pounds Alsike or 6 pounds Red Clover. A well worked seed bed rolled before and after seeding is desirable, increasing supply of moisture.

Poa Bulbosa—Winter Blue Grass

This was written up in a lengthy article in November, 1935, Country Gentleman. Comes up in the fall, stays green all winter, grows faster in February-March and matures in May, making a big bulbil or seed crop. Stays dormant all summer, coming out again in the fall. Has given very attractive results in Oregon, and while little has been tried out in the South, the Bureau of Plant Industry says it should be splendid in combination with Bermuda Grass or lespedeza in the South, making an almost year round pasture.

Thin stands can be obtained with 30 pounds per acre, and once started the plants will spread and thicken. Stands lack of moisture well.

Carpet Grass

Easily Eradicated by Plowing

Grows practically anywhere over the South where temperature does not go below ten degrees above, thrives vigorously on any kind of soil if moisture conditions are favorable; even on acid soils and poor sandy soils. Equal in feeding value to Bermuda. May be grazed both earlier in spring and later in fall than Bermuda; stands close grazing and heavy trampling. In fact spreads more rapidly with close grazing. Sow 10 to 15 pounds per acre for pasture. Add 5 lbs. Lespedeza per acre to all Carpet Grass pastures. On golf courses, parks, lawns, sow 20 to 30 pounds per acre. Making a thick leafy sod that improves with close cutting. Sow spring and summer.

Dallis Grass

Is a perennial, will grow 3 to 5 feet high if not cut. Has a long growing season all over South. Can be cuf twice a season, making excellent green feed and hay. Stands close grazing and is not injured by light frost. Hardy, thrives on most soils that are not too dry and sandy, but prefers fairly heavy soils with moist condition. Sow from middle of March to June, 6 to 8 pounds per acre.

Spade or plow ground to the depth of 8 inches. Afterwards harrow or rake carefully, pulverize all lumps and remove all large stones. If the soil is shallow, procure a supply of fine mold and spread over the surface to a depth of 5 inches. Soil may be enriched by bone meal or well-rotted manure wherever necessary, then rake level and roll the soil well to make a solid bottom. Scatter the seed evenly over

the surface at the rate of 60 or 75 pounds per acre. Rake seed in and roll, water regularly and carefully, as the soil is liable to dry out in the heat of the day, and if it does while the seed is germinating it will invariably perish. When the grass is 3 inches high it should be cut and rolled, and repeat until the grass has become firm. For small areas use one pound lawn seed to 20x20 or 400 square feet.

Evergreen Lawn Grass



For Lawns — To maintain the supply of humus in the soil, to keep the grass roots cool, to grass roots cool, to conserve moisture and to help keep out weeds, it is desirable to mulch the lawn in late fall and early spring with a one-half inch layer of rake lightly with a

spring with a one-half inch layer of Swedish Peat Moss. Sprinkle it evenly, rake lightly with a bamboo rake, and water well. This will prevent the necessity of many waterings and will save both money and trouble. In watering, it is better to soak well once or twice a week than to sprinkle daily. An occasional good watering and plenty of Swedish Peat Moss incorporated in the soil, will attract the grass roots downward where they will be protected against severe hot spells.



CULTURE. Soy beans may be planted either broadcast or in drills. Usually a better crop is had when planted in drills and cultivated, and few crops leave the land cleaner and in better condition for the following crop. They grow equally well on light and heavy soils, but on heavy soils they should not be planted more than 1 to 1½ inches deep except in dry seasons. On light sandy soils plant deeper, but not more than 3 inches deep. When sown broadcast sow 1 to 1½ bushels to the acre; in drills about a peck to the acre. Plant in April, May or June.

INOCULATE. Be sure to inoculate the seeds with soy bean bacteria, Dickinson's Humus Inoculation or Nitragin. Not only will you have assurance of a surer stand but a better crop and the succeeding crop will have the benefit of the nitrogen stored in the bean roots.

Biloxi Soy Beans

An upright variety growing 4 to 5 feet high, covered with a dense mass of foliage that does not shed easily. A heavy yielder of beans; the oil and protein contents are high; a fine bean for hogging down, for planting with corn or sorghum and for oil. The beans do not shatter, will stay in the pods until February. Late in maturing, requiring a long season to mature, but makes an unusually luxuriant growth; sow seed broadcast at rate of two bushels to an acre. In drills, sow ½ bushel to the acre.

Delsta

Very stout, erect, short and bushy, splendid for combination with corn. Plant thick for hay. Very prolific, beans little larger than Mammoth Yellow and shatter much less.

George Washington Soy Beans

Very early maturing, ready to cut in August; makes more vine than Virginia, and a very desirable variety; sow seed in May, same quantity as recommended for Virginias.

Laredo Soy Beans

One bushel will plant 6 to 8 acres in rows 3 to 3½ feet apart, depending upon how thick you want them. We know of one farmer who got a perfect stand using one bushel to 12 acres. They should not be covered deeper than 1½ inches; a half-inch is better. One or two cultivations to keep down the grass and weeds is advisable. The Delta Experiment Station reports splendid results from sowing Laredo March 25th to April 10th with a wheat drill on oats planted the previous fall. This drill helped instead of hurting the oats, and the beans were not large enough when the oats were harvested to interfere with the binder. Sow seed broadcast at rate of one bushel per acre; when sown in drills sow about 1 gallon or 2 gallons per acre.

Mamloxi (Mammoth-Biloxi Hybrid)

Developed at Stoneville, Miss., Experiment Station. Is erect in growth, upright, very prolific yielder of beans, and very fine for combination with corn, and soil building. Good for hay if planted thick. Matures about with Mammoth Yellows but shatters very little. Seed yellow with some brown markings.

Mammoth Brown

A fine big foliage variety, succeeds well in this section; won't shatter. The plant is upright, with heavy branches; a big yielder of beans and foliage. Does well on all soils. It is a medium early variety; matures its beans in about

Cow Peas

Culture: May be sown any time from March to September, either broadcast or in drills. One to two bushels per acre for broadcasting; two to three pecks for drilling.

SOWING COW-PEAS WITH SOY-BEANS, KAFFIR CORN, SORGHUM AND SUDAN GRASS. Cow-peas may be sown with these crops to furnish support and make the harvesting easier. Sow half a bushel soy-beans or one peck kaffir corn or sorghum or ten pounds Sudan grass with one bushel cow-peas to the acre.

SOWING COW-PEAS WITH MILLET. New Era and Whippoorwill are the best kinds to sow with German millet —one bushel of peas to three-fourths of a bushel of millet per acre. The crop should be cut when the millet is ready. The peas will have reached the dough state by that time and make an excellent combination of large-yielding and most nutritious feed.

Mung Beans (Green Seeded)

Mung Beans grow in upright bush form, 2 to 4 feet high according to soil and climatic conditions. They have very heavy foliage, fine leaves and finer stems than any soy beans; a very important feature of Mung Beans is that the foliage is perfectly green and still growing when the seed is ripe and ready to be threshed. The hay cures quickly and may be threshed in 2 or 4 days after cutting, and it retains all the leaves. Threshed Mung Bean hay, properly cured, is equal to Alfalfa hay and is readily eaten by all kinds of live stock. This makes it possible to make from 5 to 20 bushels seed per acre for a money crop, besides obtaining at same time yield of 1 to 2 tons of very best quality hay high in protein. Matures in 70 to 90 days; harvest when majority of pods turns black. Best results with a mower and windrow attachment, or follow mower with side-delivery rake.

Mung Beans are a greaf soil builder, when properly inoculated. Use Humus or Nitragin. Sow 20 pounds seed per acre in 36 inch rows—cultivate until rows grow together too close to permit it.

Velvet Beans

Makes an enormous growth for forage, also worth millions to the South as a soil builder.

Makes Nutritious Fall and Winter Grazing.—In the South, velvet beans are used very largely for winter grazing, and for that purpose is one of the best crops for the light soils and in the long season of the Gulf Coast and Florida. They should be allowed to grow until December, or until killed by frost, after which they can be grazed through the winter, as the vines, leaves and pods decay very slowly and remain palatable a long time. Early in the year, the erop remaining is plowed under as a soil improver, and adds very materially to the productiveness of the soil.

As a soil improver they are considered superior to cowpeas, as they make so much larger growth and so much heavier amount of foliage. The proportion of nitrogen contained in the vines is about the same as cow-peas, but as the yield is so much greater, the total amounts of nitrogen and humus added to the soil are correspondingly larger. A crop of three tons will add as much nitrogen to the soil as will a ton of cotton-seed meal, while the amount of humus will be three times as great.

Jerusalem Artichoke

Fine for fattening hogs. They grow just like Irish potatoes. Every hog raiser should grow Artichokes; the hogs will harvest them without cost. Plant in 4-foot rows any time in March or April, dropping the cut pieces 18 inches apart in the row. They will produce 200 to 300 bushels to the acre. It requires 3 bushels to plant one acre.

Chufas

An excellent hog-feeding crop, fine for light soils. Plant in rows, one peck to the acre, in April or May.

Shell and Soup Beans

These are grown to use as dried beans during the winter. Plant in June and July using 15 to 20 pounds to the acre. Plant in 4-foot rows and eultivate well. All of the following varieties grow in a semi-bush form. One pound drills 150 to 200 fect of row. Be sure to inoculate this crop.

NAVY BEANS. The snowy whiteness and uniform size of a good true stock gives them preference over ordinary stock and puts the grower in a position to command a better price. Well selected stock also gives a better yield than the common run of Navy Beans. Do not make the mistake of planting too early for if planted too early the beans after harvesting will probably be buggy. The last of June or in July plant in rows 3 feet apart, dropping two or three beans a foot apart in the rows. Cultivate early, but not while the dew is on the foliage, nor after they begin to blossom, and do not cultivate deeply after they are three or four inches high. 15 lbs. will plant an acre.

It is recommended for fodder, of which it yields immense crops, frequently two cuttings a season, and stooling out thicker after cutting. It may be grown with soy beans and cowpeas as recommended for Early Amber Cane and the quantity to plant an acre is the same.

RED TOP or SUMAC. Grown extensively in Middle Tennessee. Succeeds well in this section. Very sweet and one of the best for hay.

Yellow Milo Maize

A wonderfully drought-resistant, non-saccharine sorghum that makes a thick succulent growth of nutritious milk-producing forage. For fodder and ensilage, cut when in the dough stage; at this stage it has a feeding value practically equal to corn. Any good corn land will bring Milo Maize either for green feed, dry fodder or for the grain. It grows on all soils from sandy to heavy clay loam. Plant in 3½-foot rows after the ground is thoroughly warm, and give it the same cultivation you would corn. Six to eight pounds will plant an acre.

White Kaffir Corn

Kaffir Corn yields heavy crops. It adapts itself to a wide variety of soils; a long dry spell may stop its growth, but it starts again with the first rain. The grain as well as the plant makes fine feed for stock, hogs, poultry and pigeons. With Cowpeas, sow broadcoast one peck of Kaffir Corn to a bushel of peas; sown alone, 3 pecks to a bushel an acre broadcast; in drills 6 to 8 pounds an acre in 3½-foot rows. Plant from after the ground is thoroughly warm till early in June.

SAGRAIN

Grows on land you can't plant to other crops; thrives in low places that usually drown out. Produces from 8 to 20 tons silage, or if left to ripen will produce from 50 to 75 bushels grain (about double corn yield), and 4 to 8 tons cured hay; has heads like Kaffir. Usually weighs about 7 ounces and the average ear corn weighs 8 ounces. In feeding value has 90% value corn; can be fed to hogs, chickens, cattle and work stock. Plant as early in the spring as frost will allow. Will then be ready to harvest when the crops are laid by, usually along about August 1. Splendid in combination with Biloxi Soy Beans.

Plant in $3\frac{1}{2}$ -foot rows. Cultivate a couple of times and thin out, leaving a stalk every 8 inches apart. Use a common sorghum or pea plate. We do not recommend broadcast planting. Can be best harvested with corn binder, shocked like oats until cured. Six to eight pounds will seed an acre, planted in 3 to $3\frac{1}{2}$ -foot rows. From each seed planted you get from 6 to 10 heads of grain as it stools out and should be left very thin in drill.

SORGHUM

CULTURE. Plant when the ground becomes thoroughly warm, say two weeks after corn planting, on a rich, well drained clay loam, in rows 3½ to 4 feet apart, and cultivate as you would corn. After the flowering stage is passed, but not earlier, it may be pastured or cut for fodder. Sorghum may be grown with cowpeas and soy beans either in rows or broadcast.

This is truly a marvelous summer cover crop, a yield of 40,000 pounds of green material per acre is not uncommon. The humus produced by such a yield is of tremendous value. More important still, Crotalaria is a legume adding, when turned under, the equivalent of 800 pounds of Nitrate of Soda per acre (3-year test Florida Experiment Station showed 885 pounds average).

Crotalaria has succeeded all over the South, and as far north as Indiana. It is not a host to injurious insects and diseases. It will reseed itself under favorable conditions, but is not a pest and can easily be eradicated. Splendid soil builder in orchards, etc. Fine with corn planted in same rows when corn is planted, or in corn and other farm crops at last cultivation. It will just about double crop yields following it. It is not offered as a feed crop, or hay crop, though a nearby farmer tells us his mules ate it readily. But it is really too valuable as a fertilizer to feed. It will reclaim worn-out hillsides, gullies, etc.

Thoroughly plow, disc and harrow the soil. Sow after danger of frost is past, when moisture is present, 10 to 15 lbs. per acre broadcast or 5 lbs. drilled in 3 foot rows, using scarified seed only as with Sericea. Firm the soil immediately after planting to conserve the moisture, cultivate once or twice when planted in rows.

Louisiana (Baton Rouge) Experiment Station for 1929 to 1933 reports 5 year average yield of 22 tons green manure per acre and 169 lbs. nitrogen, equivalent to 1000 lbs. 16% Nitrate Soda.

Dwarf Essex Rape

This splendid crop has at last come into its own—larger and larger acreage being planted every year. The reason—it is a most excellent pasture and green forage crop for cattle, hogs, sheep and stock. It is high in feeding value, producing an abundant flow of milk in milch cows (feed rape to milch cows after milking, not before, to avoid slight cabbage flavor to milk).

Experiments show that Rape is a more efficient fattener and more economical feed for hogs than Alfalfa, Clover or Blue Grass. It will stand more cold weather and last longer in the fall than any of the grasses. One acre of Rape will pasture 8 to 10 sheep, other animals in proportion. Turn stock in when plants are 8 inches high. To avoid possibility of bloating, accustom stock to Rape gradually, pasturing after dew is off. Feed dairy cattle and sheep a full feed of grain for the first week or two before pasturing Rape, and provide salt at all times.

Rape can be cut and fed green. Cut about 4 inches above ground, first time when plants are a foot high, just enough for a day's feed at a time. When you expect to cut and feed green, Rape should be planted in rows and cultivated 2 to 4 times.

Rape will grow 1½ to 3 feet tall—grows very rapidly—ready to use in 8 weeks. Prefers a rich mellow soil, will do well on most fairly good soils except sand or stiff clays, needs plenty of moisture to start. Plow deeply, disk well and harrow thoroughly. Can be sown with spring grain or in combination with clover. Sow in drills 4 to 6 pounds—broadcast 10 to 15 pounds per acre, about 1 inch deep. Sow from August through April.

Winter Rye

Sow from Aug. 25th until middle of November. **ABRUZZI RYE.** A distinct variety, far better than any other, in that it grows very much faster and stools much heavier, which means doubling the amount of grazing on an acre. You can start grazing earlier after sowing and keep it up longer. Three pecks to one bushel abruzzi plants an acre against 5 to 6 pecks of other Rye—this makes Abruzzi cost less to plant, yet you get more in return.

Winter Sand or Hairy Vetch





For the Delta Planter who wants extra staple length it is the safest bet of all, makes a good crop every year, with weevils and with unfavorable cotton weather. It is an easy cotton to pick and a big yielder every year (bale per acre on 1,000 acres this year) bringing a big premium over short cotton prices. As high as 17 cents in October, 1933, and lots of it 14 to 15 cents when short cottons were 8 to 10 cents a pound. Think what extra profit to the grower!

Type, semi-dwarf, light foliage: big boll, 60 to 65 per pound; lint 32% to 34%, 1 3/16 to 1¼ inches full. Maturity, the earliest of all staples of equal length. Storm

resistance good.

Missdel No. 4

Type, dwarf and very hardy, and just about the earliest cotton grown. This variety on heavy black land will get off quicker than any other cotton. and because it has such a small stalk that the sun can get into, it matures "right now"

The boll is not so large as No. 3, about 70 to 75 to the pound, storm resistance is good, its lint percentage on Delta land runs 34 to 36 (better than thirds itself). And on hill land it has run 36% to 39%, think of it! Length of staple on Delta soil 1% to 1 3/16 inches and in hill land 1 inch to 1 3/32 inches. The picking qualities have been much improved over Delfos 6102 from which it was developed. The originator of the famous Delfos cottons, speaking at the Station 2 years ago, said Missdel No. 4 was the greatest cotton he had seen.

Missdel No. 4 has made more cotton per acre on large acreage than any other cotton known of the same length.

Stoneville No. 1

This has proven an ideal cotton on both sides of the river. Very early maturing, extra large bolls, 55 to 65 to pound. Easy to pick, but good storm resistance, lint percentage 33% to 36%, staple 1 1/16 to 1½ inches. Wonderful crops of this cotton have been reported everywhere. You can see from description above why it is so popular. Further, the stalk is not large, but very dwarfy and stocky, and a very prolific yielder.

Stoneville No. 5

Stoneville No. 5 is one of the newest Stoneville strains that are available in quantities and is one of the most popular cottons for thin lands that has been produced. It is very productive, the picking qualities are good, has a high lint turn-out, running from 38% to 41% on hill land; 36% to 38% on valley land. It is a storm proof cotton and produces a good strong staple on very poor lands from 1 to 13/2 inches; boll size 70 to 80 per lb., plants rather vigorous and spreading. spreading.

Wilds No. 5

Wilds cotton was originated five or six years ago by Coker Pedigreed Seed Farms, in South Carolina, and they have been working on it year after year, bringing up the desired characteristics each year, so that now they say of Wilds No. 5, "Our longest and best staple cotton."

Wilds 5 pulls 1¼ to 1 5/16 inch staple and sold in the fall of 1934 as high as 20c per pound. Has extra large bolls, 58 to 60 to the pound; 33.7% lint turn-out. Early maturity, quick fruiting, more open than Wilds 4, picking quality good. A prolific yielding cotton, very desirable on Delta soils.

Delfos No. 531

This cotton is an extremely early maturing variety, quite similar to Missdel No. 4. Both are developments from the original Delfos 6102. It is one of the most prolific bearers ever developed, and one of the most successful cottons under boll weevil conditions. Foliage is light, plant is medium, vigorous and spreading. Rowden 40

The originator claims from 45% to 51% lint
