Culture. In the extreme South, Tulips should not be planted until November or December, when the weather is more uniformly cool. Reuter's Bulbs are warehoused in cold storage to insure best results. Plant 5 to 6 inches deep, 6 inches apart. Use bonemeal as a fertilizer, two to three handfuls to a square yard, thoroughly mixed with the soil.




