Culture. - Any good garden soil will grow Gladiolus well, provided they are planted in a sunny location. Bulbs should be planted 4 inches deep and at least 6 inches apart; frequent cultivation with a hoe or weeder, around the base of the plant, to prevent the soil from becoming hard and dry, is advisable. Where desired for garden decoration or exhibition, we advise plants being staked after attaining the height of I foot. (We offer light green dyed bamboo canes, which are excellent for this purpose.) Water copiously, a.2d as the flower-buds begin to form, apply liquid manure for the best results.

Informal Decorative Dahlias (I.D.). Fully double flowers, floral rays generally long, twisted, or pointed and usually irregular in arran gement.
