



THE RARE PINK CALLA

(Richardia Rehmannii)

This charming and rare member of the Calla family is unlike ali others In color, size and appearance. We believe it will become one of the most sought after pot plants for the conservatory, sun porch and window garden. In California and Southern states it is quite at home in semi-shaded spots in the garden. The flowers of this lovely miniature Calla are a warm shade of carmine rose in color and about 2 inches in diameter. The plants reach a height of 1½ feet. The bulbs are of rounded form and smaller than the common Calla; they bloom readily in the open ground and in pots.

CULTURE. The new Pink Calla is a very attractive pot plant, blooming or 3 bulbs in a 6-inch pot, using rich sandy loam and covering the bulbs one inch with soil. A bright room where they receive plenty of light without much direct sunlight is best. Do not water much until growth is well started after that water regularly. Liquid fertilizer may be used after 2 or 3 leaves are formed. The temperature should not go below 50 degrees for good continuous growth. For garden use they may be set out in a shaded or partly shaded place after the weather warms up in spring. Plant them 3 inches deep and 8 to 10 inches apart. Water frequently in dry weather.





# FOR THE ROCK GARDEN

I t WAS considered that rock gardening could be practiced only on large grounds; in later days, however, the small rock gar-den has become increasingly popular both in England and America. One reason for this popularity is the opportunity it affords to grow a great variety of plants—peren-nials. bulbs, annuals and even small shrubs— in a small space and, with a few of each, to create a beautiful picture.

For the small rock garden, either the rocky slope coming down in broken terraces to a bordering path, or the ravine are recom-mended. In the latter, the path runs through the garden, both sides sloping irregularly up-ward. These rising sides being further em-phasized by a background planting of tall perennials and shrubs. Where uneven or sloping ground exists, this should be chosen. If the garden is level, excavation may be made for a roughly outlined pool and the soil used to build up a few gentle slopes. Or the pool may be dispensed with and a sunken path take its place, as above stated.

Rock plants in general and particularly al-pines, like porous gritty soil and a cool root run. On level ground especially, it is neces-sary to place drainage beneath the garden soil and in heavy soils a layer 18 inches thick is not too much. Old bricks, mortar, gravel or rock, use whatever is at hand. Above this place a foot of sandy loam with some stone chips or gravel mixed in. La sleizer the anche the ta simulate a pat

In placing the rocks, try to simulate a nat-ural out-cropping. Place them on their broadest side and sink them well into the ground.

Most important in placing the stones is to make them slope inward so that falling water will be carried down to the roots of the plants. Arrange little bays and promon-tories and sweeping curves rather than straight lines.

Exposure is not very important as success may be gained facing in any direction pro-viding the proper subjects are used. Facing west or south use more sun loving plants, facing east or north, rather the real alpines.

# SEEDS of SHRUBS and TREES

The collection of shrubs and trees described on this page contains only varieties of recog-nized ornamental value for garden or street planting, which can be successfully grown from seed.

It must be remembered, however, that hard wooded perennials germinate and develop more slowly than most herbaceous plants; but, if cared for over the required period, they are no harder to grow than annual flowers or vegetable plants.

Sow tree seeds at the latter part of winter or in spring, preferably in seed boxes of light, well-drained soil; covering the seed about its own depth or a little deeper. Press the soil firm with the hand after sowing and keep boxes in a lath house, frame, or some sheltered place, watering regularly and carefully. When seedlings are large enough to handle, pot or transplant to other boxes and grow on until large enough to set out in the open. Acadia and other hard seeds should be soaked in hot water for 12 hours before planting. Germination of certain varieties is slow and irregular, therefore seed boxes must be given good care over a protracted period as seedlings often continue to appear for several weeks and in some cases several months. and in some cases several months.







CULTURE. Muskmelons must not under ordinary gardening conditions be planted until all danger of frost is past. This is usually March, and planting may continue-until July 15th. Warm ground is essential to the germination of the seed, for if planted too early in the Spring it will rot. Soil should be in proper planting condition. First, it must be thoroughly soaked or irrigated. Second, when moisture has thoroughly pene-trated and the soil is in workable condition, spade or plow the ground and see that it is thoroughly pulverized. Third, prepare furrows 6 to 8 inches in depth and 5 to 7 feet apart according to space you can spare. Fourth, plant the seed in the furrows about 6 feet apart, covering the seed not more than 1 inch deep and as the plant grows, gradually fill up the furrow with soil until level with the surface. Do not irrigate close to the plant as it will cause domning off und it

Do not irrigate close to the plant as it will cause damping off and other diseases. The roots of the plant being as long as the vine, close up irrigation is not necessary, and in cultivating see that these roots are not disturbed as it would ruin the plant. Practice frequent shal-low cultivation. Plant 8 seeds to the hill and when thoroughly estab-lished pull out all but three. One and one-half pounds of seed is used to an acre.



CULTURE. Many different methods of planting onions are in practice but the one most plactical for the general market grower is the fol-

lowing: Planting in this section usually starts in September for spring onions and November to March for later crops. Sow onion seed with a seed drill in rows 24 inches apart, using on this basis 3 pounds of seed per acre. The land must be thoroughly plowed, disked, and harrowed when necessary. It is impossible to prepare your land too carefully in growing the onion as it responds readily and in order to get maximum yields, thorough preparations must be made.

As soon as the plants appear, hand weeding must start both in and between the rows. From this point on the plants must have a steady even growth as a check, whether from disease or drought, will cause them to go to seed extensively. When the onions are ready for harvesting the tops will be well ripened down. If, however, the tops are still green we sug-gest running a light roller or plank over the field to press them down. In ten days after this operation the onions should be pulled and left in the field one deep to dry. When thoroughly dried the tops can be removed. However, we do not recommend this until ready to ship to market.





Excessive moisture will rot the seed, so do not irrigate after seed is planted until the plants are well out of the ground. Cultivate after each irrigation. Usual planting is a rate of 60 pounds per acre. One pound will plant a row of 150 feet.

1. Do not pick fruits too young. Leave them until fully matured.

2. Before cooking, do not skin or cut the fruits. They must be cooked as whole.

Do not cook the fruits too long as this will soften the stringy texture of the contents. Price 15c

### HINTS ON ROSE GROWING

PREPARATION OF SOIL To obtain best results, the important part is soil preparation. Spade 18 inches deep and have the soil well pulverized and enriched to about one-fifth of its bulk with well-rotted barnyard manure.

**PLANTING** Plant the roses at once, but if impossible, place them in a shady place, cover the roots with soil, and water thoroughly. Place plants in an upright position, working the soil around roots a little at a time, treading firmly with the foot. Leave a shallow depression and fill with water as soon as planted and again after water has seeped away.

WATERING AND CULTIVATION During the growing season roses require a liberal supply of water and should be cultivated regularly through the summer months. A thorough irrigation every week, soaking the soil to a depth of 18 inches or 2 feet, is usually sufficient. Be sure, however, that the water penetrates to the required depth, do not "sprinkle" and think you are watering.

MULCHING In order to avoid the frequent cultivation necessary during the summer months, many rose growers resort to mulching. We recommend for this purpose a layer about 2 inches thick of GERMAIN'S PHAT MULL. This material is finely shredded and of a neutral brown color. It has a certain food value, keeps down weeds, and through slow fermentation promotes a beneficial acid condition in the soil. PRUNING The aim in pruning should be to eliminate all undesirable growth and to so reduce the remaining branches that a well-balanced, thrifty plant will result when renewed growth begins.

Cut away entirely all weak growth and all branches on which the bark shows signs of disease (cracks, discolorations, etc.). Then prune back the remaining strong and healthy branches about ½ or even ½ their original height, according to the type or variety. In pruning use a sharp pair of shears or a keenedged knife and make a clean, slightly sloping cut just above a good strong eye. Choose one pointing outward from the center; this will help to build an open, well-rounded bush.

CUTTING OF FLOWERS Do not be afraid to cut the flowers from your plants, as this will do them no harm. A good rule to follow when picking the blooms is to cut the flowering stem back to within 2 or 3 leaves from where it branches out of the main stem.



On receipt of shipment unpack immediately, and if not planted at once place the roots of the trees in a trench, cover with soil, and water thoroughly, so as to settle the dirt about the roots.

dirt about the roots. It is of great importance to dig holes deep and large to admit all the roots in their natural position. Any injured roots should be cut off with a sharp knife. Fili the hole with the surface soil, so that the tree, after the earth has settled, will stand about as deep as it did in the nursery, a line which can usually be noted by a difference in color. Settle the soil well around the roots by filling the hole with water. Never let man-ure come in contact with the roots, but it can be used as a top dressing.
