
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SASS IRISES-1937

The Superiority of Sass Irises has been thoroughly demonstrated by numerous awards to them culminating in the Dykes Medal for 1932 to Mr. H. P. Sass' Rameses.

The points of superiority that distinguish Sass Irises are, first of all, color. Other distinguishing qualities are complete hardiness, vigor of growth, freedom of bloom and texture. Grown under the rigorous conditions of Nebraska's hot sun and drying winds, an iris must be of the firmest texture to withstand them. Many fine Irises which are lacking in substance cannot be grown under Nebraska conditions. A Sass Iris will always stand up under any weather conditions.

The Sass Brothers are the leading breeders of intermediate irises and have developed this early blooming class into a range of color, size and quality of bloom that givals the tall bearded class. They have also worked extensively and have developed qualities of Dwarf Irises of the highest quality and have now in process of development a series of Fall Blooming Irises.

Iris grow easier and multiply faster than any other perennial. Plant them in a sunny location that has good drainage. The bulb or rhizome should be planted just under the surface, not too deep. The roots should be spread out and the soil packed around them.

The best time to plant iris is in July and August, although they can be transplanted at any time of the year when the ground is not frozen.

NEW TYPE OF IRISES

These are hybrids between the Oncocyclus hybrids and Dwarf Bearded hybrids. The following are offered:

STORMY DAWN (Jacob Sass, 1933)—S, pallid soft blue violet, darker at base. F, pale nerapaline blue with brown stripes on the haft, forming a blotch at the end of the beard. Two large flowers on 10-inch stems......\$1.50

MIDWEST GEM (78-33) (H. P. Sass, 1937)—Large, light buff pink, flowers with S. domed and falls flaring. Stems branching from center. 36 inches tall......\$20.00

OSSAR (24-34) (H. P. Sass, 1937)—This is a glowing, blackish red self. Not very tall, 32 inches, but low branching. There are many buds and often 3 flowers open of a stem. Flowers are of medium size of good shape and substance ______\$10.00

BLACKMOOR (Jacob Sass, 1932)—One of the finest dark blue purples. Almost black when newly opened, lightening to blackish violet of uniform coloring. A free bloomer of great size. (Honorable Mention, 1931)......75c

BLUE HILL (H. P. Sass, 1931)—The bluest of the clear blue toned irises of a slightly deeper tone than Sensation and larger with perfect branching stems. A great addition to the blue toned iris. (Honorable Mention, 1932)

BUTO (H.P. Sass, 1926)—A rich dark purple bicolor with velvety nearly black falls of great size and a great bloomer. Makes a fine mass. 30 inches...........25c

CHURCHMOUSE (H. P. Sass, 1929)—A new color break greatly admired—brown iris, self Hays brown of Ridgeway. Medium sized flower on 36-inch stems.......25c

CLARA NOYES (H. P. Sass, 1931) — A gorgeous blend of orange yellow, and red of Talisman rose coloring. (Honorable Mention, 1931; Award of Merit, 1932)...\$1.00

CRYSTAL DEAUTY (J. Sass, 1935)—A large flowcred self of pure white coloring on 40-inch well branched stalk ______\$6.00

CYRUS (H. P. Sass, 1931)—Medium sized flowers of fine form and substance on 34-inch stems. Empire yellow with a much deeper splash at the end of beard, giving a glowing effect. Intermediate. (H. M. 1933).......25c

DORE (32-50) (J. Sass, 1935)—S, baryta yellow darkening to Empire yellow at claw. F, white with light yellow sheen. Haft heavily veined Empire yellow. Deep yellow beard. A yellow stripe extends along the edge of the falls. Large flower on 37-inch well branched stalks _______\$7.50

DOXA (H. P. Sass, 1928)—A most popular and well rated intermediate of great size and novel coloring. S light Chalcedony yellow. F olive buff with tint at center. Heavy substance. 20 inches. (Honorable Mention, 1932) ______25c

GOLDEN ZOW (H. P. Sass)—Large flowered chronic yellow intermediate. Rather long flowers on trustems ______\$1.5,

GOLDEN HELMET (Jacob Sass, 1933)—S Ochraceous tawny at the edge, yellow ochre at the midrib and buckthorn brown at the claw. F Morocco red overlaid oxblood red, bronze haft striped Morocca red, prominent orange beard. Height 35 inches. Stem low branching. A striking brilliant variegatta that shines in any iris planting ______\$10.00

KING JUBA (H. P. Sass, 1931)—A clear colored large flowered variegata. the brilliant contrast between the yellow standards and wide solid deep velvety red falls, making this a striking and much admired iris. Very large flowers on 36 to 40-inch stems. (Honorable Mention, 1932) _______35c

KING KARL (Jacob Sass, 1925)—Beautifully ruffled light pinkish cinnamon standards. F cream sanded in an all-over pattern of liseran purple with a yellow beard. The bloom takes on beautiful rosy tones as it ages. 27 inches. (Award of Merit, Wisley Trials, 1931)......25c

MIDGARD (H. P. Sass, 1926)—The best known and most popular pink and yellow blend, always in demand. An iris of exquisite coloring and has firm, heavy substance. Both standards and falls yellow with a flush of clear pink. A strong grower and free bloomer. 30 inches _____25c

ORIANA (H. P. Sass, 1933)—A pure white of fine form and substance, of good size, with a finely balanced stem 32 inches tall. This is much superior to the older whites ______\$3.00

OWAISSA (Jacob Sass, 1934)—Dwarf bearded. Medium blue self pumila hybrid. Small flowers on 4 to 8inch stems ______25:

SOUND MONEY (J. Sass, 1934)—A fine yellow Pumila hybrid that also blooms in the fall, 10-12-inch stems...50c

THE BLACK DOUGLAS (J. Sass, 1934)—S, dark violet. F, blackish violet. Blue beard tipped yellow. A fine dark colored iris. Branching stem 36 inches tall.....\$5.00

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ULTRA (H. P. Sass)—The general color effect is blue. S Ultramarine violet. A very reliable intermediate fall bloomer
