\section*{Suggestions for Spring Planting of Roses}

The soil should be thoroughly cultivated and a liberal supply of rotted manure added. In planting, dig a hole sufficiently large to accommodate the roots when spread out on the bottom of the hole. In filling in the soil, shake the plant lightly in order that the soil may mix between the roots. Fill in the soil and firm it in order that the plant may be solid. Be sure to see that the lower parts of the lower branches are below the surface of the soil. Do not plant in a mound, the surfoce should be level. Cut back the branches to within 4 to 6 inches of the surface of the ground. With this treatment the best results may be obtained.
