How to Lay Out a Grove Planting

First, mark out your rows the desired distance apart, not less than 8 feet. Then, with the plow, run a furrow as deep as possible, throwing the dirt both ways. Next, lay the seedlings in the trench with the tops resting on one side. Then, with one horse run the plow along the opposite side to throw the dirt back on the roots. Next, straighten the trees and tramp the dirt firmly around the roots. Chinese Elms are the most rapid growing of all, and if left unpruned, they make a dense windbreak. Set Willows not more than 3 feet apart in the row. Ash, Elm and Maple are best set at least 8 feet.

Black Locust, Carolina Poplar and the Willows are good to plant in ditches to prevent soil washing. Order quickly as our stocks of Black Locust are not large and, on account of the many erosion projects, are in big demand.

Catalpa and Osage Orange make fine wood and fence posts. Plant them about 3 feet apart and then when they get up to fence post size, cut out every other tree.





SEEDLING EVERGREEN TREES

Freshly Dug-Perfectly Packed-For Windbreaks and Hedges

I offer you a complete list of selected, freshly dug Evergreen Seedlings (S) and Transplants (T). The Seedlings should be planted in the garden or in beds for the first two years and cared for the same as you would take care of Cabbage plants. Cultivate very shallow. Give them shade the first year. Shades can be made from laths with a space of about 1½ inches between each lath. Place the laths north and south. Transplants with reasonable conditions and care; can be planted in their permanent location. Shade them by placing a shingle on the south side, a few inches away from the plant to give protection during the hotter parts of the day.

So you see that small Transplants (T) are cheaper in the long run than Seedlings (S) and we recommend these transplanted evergreens. However, all are thrifty, vigorous, well rooted, and in fine shape for shipping early in the season. Mulch these smaller evergreens the first season, early in the fall, using well rotted straw or leaves around the base of the tree.

Evergreens for Windbreaks

We advise 8 feet apart in a single row, 10 feet apart in two rows, 14 feet apart in three rows. The ideal windbreak is a four or five row windbreak, planted 14 feet apart in the row and the rows 20 feet apart. Every other row should have the trees planted even with the open spaces of the previous row, in other words, zig-zag.



FRAGRANT LILIES OF THE VALLEY. Exquisitely perfumed and bloom early in April, with bell-shaped white flowers. Plant in a cool, moist shady location and enjoy their delicate wax-like flowers and fragrance. Big clumps.

RED RUSSIAN or FIRE LILY. Reddish-orange with 6 to 30 flowers in clusters on a stem. Early June, Plant 8 inches deep.

REGAL. America's most popular Lily. Exquisite pearly white flowers, tinged pink on the outside and gold on the inside. Delightfully fragrant, perfumed. Blooms in June or July. Plant 8 inches deep.

SPECIOSUM RUBRUM. A rich carmine color with a white background, heavy spotted crimson. Flowers August and September. Plant 10 inches deep.

Water Lilies are easy to grow. Just piant them in a pool, in a tub or half barrel. Sink the tub in the ground, place a few rocks and hardy flowering pcrennials around the edge, and you have a miniature rock garden.

HOW TO PLANT. Hardy varieties live from year to year but will not stand freezing. Plant Lilies in a wooden pail using two-thirds rich black dirt and one-third Bone Meal, thoroughly mixed. Place the tuber in the soil until only the crown from which leaf starts is showing. Put sand or gravel over the top of the dirt and then sink your pail in the pool. Water should cover the crown to a depth of at least 8 inches.

WINTER CARE. In winter store the plants in a cool basennent away from the heat but do not allow them to freeze. Keep them wet down so the roots will not dry out. Renew the soil each year, and fertilize as recommended above.







As usual I raised a nice lot of stock beets for my white leghorns again this year. You can't beat them for green feed to bring up egg production. Store them near the barn, digging a shallow trench which is lined with straw and throwing in the beets, covering them with straw and then more soil or cornstalks to keep out the frost. This way you can keep them as long as you want to, and of course, you will not put them in the pit until just before the freezing weather comes on. comes on.

Sow the seed in rich soil in May or June in rows 20 inches to two feet apart, thinning the plants from six to eight inches apart in the row, and don't harvest until heavy frost. Sow 8 to 10 pounds of seed to the acre.
