## Discounts

On bills for Flower Seeds, Vegetable Seeds, and Bulbs, a diseount of 2 per cent for payment 10 days from date of bill may be deducted; 5 per cent cash diseount is allowed on all orders of Flower Seeds and 3 per cent cash discount on all orders of Vegetable Seeds and Bulbs when remittanee accompanies the order, unless on items specially quoted or priced. Cash discount above does not apply to dealers' orders, unless so stated in quotations or otherwise. All other goods are strietly net, as are also bills for goods supplied under speeial quotations unless otherwise agreed upon.

## Conditions of Sales

All contracts, sales, and acknowledgments of orders are contingent upon crop failure, our ability to import and make deliveries in conformity with the "Plant Quarantine Act," partial deliveries by growers or manufacturers, strikes, or other unavoidable causes beyond our control, clerical errors included; also unsatisfactory credit standing. All quotations are subject to market changes and goods being unsold on receipt of order.

## Forwarding Service

We pay postage on all orders for Vegetable and Flower Seeds provided the order ealls for packets, ounees, quarter pounds, or pounds (beans, corn, peas and grass seeds, bulbs, plants and sundries are not included). If these are wanted by mail, remit for postage the amount named in eonnection with the item to the first and second zones; for other zones add additional postage. AII postage is charged on dealers' orders regardless of items ordered.

## Parcel Post Rates

On Seeds, Bulbs, Plants or Roots not exceeding eight (8) ounces in weight, the postage charge is 1 c . for each two (2) ounees or fraetion thereof; on sundries or other merchandisc not exeeeding eight (8) ounees in weight, the postage eharge is $11 / 2$ c. for eaeh two (2) ounees or fraetion thereof. Seeds, Bulbs, Plants, Roots, Sundries, etc., weighing over eight (8) ounees, are sent at zone rates.

If Speeial Delivery is wanted, an additional 15 c . is required on packages weighing up to two (2) pounds- 25 e . on packages weighing more than two (2) pounds and up to ten (10) pounds-35c. on packages weighing more than ten (10) pounds, which also ineludes speeial handling and transportation as first-elass mail.

If remittanee aeeompanies order, a suffieient amount should be ineluded to eover the extra eharges-if ordered to be sent by either of the methods as stated above.

We do not make shipments of Plants or Cold-Storage Bulbs C. O. D., and shipments of goods C. O. D. outside of our automobile delivery limits ean only be made that way provided a partial remittanee is sent with the order to guarantee that the goods will be accepted on arrival.

## Important Notice

All shipments of plants, perishable stoek, and cold-storage bulbs are made at buyer's risk only.

If sueh shipments arrive in bad eondition, aeeept them and receipt for them aecordingly, and make claim for your loss on the transportation eompany. We, of eourse, will hold ourselves ready to assist you in any possible way. It has been found that claims can be eolleeted more readily by the person receiving the goods than by the shipper.

Our eustom to guarantee the actual arrival of goods (except at points where there is no Freight or Express agent) will still be eontinued, and claims for loss or non-arrival of merchandise not perishable will, as in the past, be eared for by us, so you run no risk of having to make elaims for lost goods.

## SUGGESTIONS IN CONNECTION WITH THE GROWING OF HARDY LILIES UNDER GLASS

Hardy Lilies should be grown cool and given 16 to 18 weeks from time of planting to bring them into bloom, so the best results can be obtained; in fact, if you can give them longer to come into flower it is better. Where they are forced with plenty of heat, the result is that you get good foliage with not so many early blooms. We refer particularly to Magnificum, Melpomene, Rubrum, and Album.
