Each year it seems like so many new kinds of flowers are brought out, and we have chosen from American and Foreign Growers, what we believe will be the best for this locality, and we wish to call attention to a few of them.

There are several new Marigolds, and we believe the Gigantea, Sunset Giant, and Collarette Crown of Gold should prove pleasing, but the Harmony, as well as the Guinea Gold and Yellow Supreme should not be omitted in our recommendation.

The Dwarf Bachelor Button, Jubilee Gem, did prove very good last season, but the seed is quite scarce.

We have two new blue Daisies, Heteropappas and Machaeranthera, fall flowering.

In Pansies we have several new colors in the Swiss Giants, but for a large Pansy the Mapleleaved is the one. Of Violas, which is really small-flowering Pansies, we have added to our list, Purple Queen, Mauve Queen and Lord Nelson, but also wish to call attention to Arkwright Ruby, Mistrals Mourning and the Yellow. These Violas are quite satisfactory as they are very free bloomers and also hardy.

We have added a Verbena, Venus, to our list, which should be a very good clear pink with salmon shading.

In the Zinnias, we have the Star Dust, a yellow Fantasy.

Scabiosa, Rosette, is a new clear rose-pink, a color in between the rose and the scarlet.

Rudbeckia, Halo Mixture, is a combination of odd shapes and colors, mostly in the yellow and brown red, some single and some double.

Iceland Poppy, Amurensis, is a very large yellow variety, very long, strong stems and can be used for cuts.

Of Petunias, there are many new and good varieties. In the hardy Lupins we have added the Carmineus, red and carmine shades. A new Leptosyne, double yellow, is recommended from England.

It seems that the Ornamental Gourds are very popular for different kinds of decorations, so you will note we have more than 20 varieties of them.

For the one who likes Sweet Tomatoes, we will advise trying a few of the new German Sugar Tomatoes. They are said to contain as high as 13% sugar and can be eaten like cherries or plums.

Our list of Gladioli contains many varieties we have not had before. They are grown in Oregon.

Sow the seeds thinly, in rows, in the early spring, and dig up and plant in permanent bed the following early spring. Set the plants not closer than 15 in. apart in trenches with the tip of the plant 6 to 8 in. below the surface of the ground, spreading the roots out evenly in all directions.

BEANS—YELLOW PODDED BUSH

Sow the beans in rows leaving at least a 15 in. space between the rows, and either drop the seeds separately 2 or 3 in. apart, or drop 3 or 4 seeds in hills about 18 in. apart.

For early Cauliflower, the seed should be started very early in the spring, so the plants can be strong and hardened and ready to set out in April. For late use the seed can be planted in the middle of May and the plants set out the latter half of June. We recommend to treat the bed with Semesan or Formaldehyde Dust before seeding, as the small plants are apt to damp off.

CELERY

For early celery the seed can be planted in early March, under glass, and the plants set out when no more heavy frost is expected. For late celery seed can be sown outside in May and have strong plants ready by the middle of June. The best soil for celery is well cultivated and well powdered peat soil. The plants can be planted 6 to 9 inches apart in single rows about 2 feet or more apart, or can be planted in double rows 6 to 9 inches apart and 2-3 feet between each double row. Bleaching should be started at least 2 weeks before harvest, and can be done with a wide board, special paper, or the soil can be hilled up around the plants. An ounce of seed should produce from 5,000 to 10,000 plants.

One method to grow early Tomatoes is to plant strong, healthy plants of a good early variety, about 1½ feet apart, in rows about 3 feet apart, then, at the same time set along side each plant a fairly heavy stake. A Tonkin cane, 5 ft. long and ½ to ¾ inch thick is good. As the plant grows, the main or center stem should be tied loosely with Raffia to the stake and all side-shoots or suckers trimmed off. When 5 or 6 flower clusters are set, the top of the plant should also be taken off, but one leaf must be left over the top flower. That way there will not be so many Tomatoes on the plants, as when letting it grow its own way, but the tomatoes will mature much earlier and the fruit will be perfect. If more than 5 or 6 clusters are wanted from a plant, the two bottom side branches can be left growing and tied on the stake, and stopped when 3 clusters are set. Varieties are listed as to their earliness, the earliest first.

Wilt Resisting Asters

One of the troubles Growers have had in late years with Asters, has been the Fusarium Wilt disease, but there has been developed several strains which are immune to that. This is the cause of the stems rotting and is a disease from the soil. It turns the stems black. Starts at the ground and works up through the plant. This must not be confused with the "yellow," which is said to be transported by an insect, and from which there does not seem, as yet, to be any other prevention than to keep the insects away.

The culture of Petunias are very easy for the small-flowered or cheaper varieties, as these can be sown both inside and outside with a fair expectation of good results. For the large-flowered or better varieties it is more difficult to get them started. For May blooming, they should be sown in a fairly warm place in January or February, and the seeds just sprinkled on the surface of very fine sifted soil and kept moist. As soon as large enough to move, they can be transplanted and later put in pots. The seeds that produce the double flowered plants, usually are weaker than the single flowered, and in transplanting the double varieties, care should be taken with the weakest and poorest looking seedlings, as they usually produce the best double flowers.

SUGGESTIONS FOR MAKING A LAWN

In making a new lawn, the soil should be spaded very thoroughly and if any Quack-grass is present, all the roots should be picked out. The surface must be made level at the same time. After leveling, the soil should be either tramped down or rolled with a heavy roller to get the foundation firm. Seed should be broad-cast very evenly at the rate of 1 lb. of good clean seed to about 200 square feet. The seed should then be either covered with a thin layer of soil or chopped down and the soil rolled again and watered. For repairing an old lawn we recommend to scratch the sod thoroughly and deep with a rake so the dead grass can be cleared off and the surface of the soil rough, then sprinkle the seed. Now go over the lawn again with the back or smooth side of the rake to cover up as much seed as possible. Another method will be to sprinkle seed on the old lawn and then cover with at least 1/2-inch of finely pulverized peat moss. Can offer such Peat Moss in truck loads at a very reasonable price. Once in a while the lawn, especially an old one, should be given an application of some good plant food containing Nitrogen.
