Cultivation of Bearded Irises

Irises are not difficult to grow and usually will survive the most adverse conditions but they, like any living plant, will also respond to good treatment as well. The old theory of planting an iris and leaving it for Mother Nature to rear is all wrong. She needs some assistance. Plant them where they will get plenty of sunshine and good drainage. The rhizomes should not be planted deep, but should be placed just below the level of the surface of the soil. The roots should be spread out and the soil pressed firmly around them. They are not particular as to soil. Wood ashes may be used freely and a little lime as a top dressing. Bonemeal is a very satisfactory fertilizer. No fresh manure should be placed about them, but well rotted manure may be used around them in small quantities, if well mixed with the soil and not too close to the rhizome. Give them shallow cultivation, and do not use any mulch around them until the ground freezes and then only on the very tender varieties or plants that have recently been planted and not well established. Excelsior is very satisfactory for this purpose.

Fall Blooming Irises

Fall blooming irises are becoming very popular. These irises not only bloom in the spring, but flower the second time in the late summer or fall. They do better in the South where the frost comes late. In the North they require special attention in order to secure fall blooms. For the best results it is advisable to plant in rich non-acid soil, in full sunlight, in as protected a location as possible, so that they can be brought to flower as early as possible in the spring. They should be watered frequently during the summer months and also cultivated so that the plants will not become dormant, but will continue to grow and develop increased buds. They are well worth the effort to grow them well.

AUTUMN KING (H. Sass 1924) A large lavender blue bicolor of good form. Dependable twice-bloomer. 30 in.
