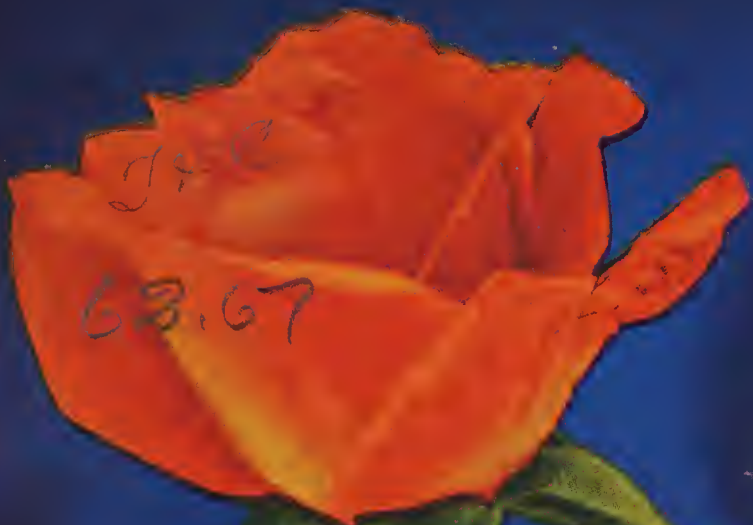

- ANGELE**—Very large white bud with a greenish tint, opening to a majestic, perfumed bloom of pure white.
- ANTOINE RIVOIRE**—A wonderful rose of large, full Camelia-shaped flowers. Color rosy-flesh, on a yellow ground, shaded with carmine.
- BESSIE BROWN**—Color is a creamy-white with a beautiful shade of pale, tender flesh, resembling gloss silk.
- BRIARCLIFF**—Bud beautifully formed, long, solid but not too pointed, opening into one of the finest blooms that could be imagined. Very double and a brilliant rose pink.
- CRUSADER**—Rich velvety crimson of bright hue and of massive form, this rose is one of the very finest of the reds.
- DAME EDITH HELEN**—The color is a brilliant yet soft clear pink. Full blooms delightfully sweet scented.
- DIXIE (Salmon Pink, Radiance)**—Large cupped, deliciously fragrant flowers are produced freely. A beautiful salmon pink.
- DUCHESS OF WELLINGTON**—Yellow. Extra long-pointed buds of golden orange open to large, loose flowers of saffron with the delicious fragrance of the old Tea Roses.

- EUGENE E. MARLITT**—Rich bright carmine with scarlet tones and deliciously tea-scented.
- FRANCIS SCOTT KEY**—The color is a rich, glowing scarlet, with darker shadings, becoming darker as the flower ages.

HOLLYWOOD—The buds are large and well shaped and have excellent keeping qualities. One of the finest recent pink creations.

JOANNA HILL—An ideal American rose that makes an instant appeal by its charming combination of colors. The color is a clear yellow deepening at the center to a rich golden orange.

JONKHEER J. L. MOCK (Gorgeous Giant Pink)—The flowers are enormous, magnificently formed, deep and double, exquisitely fragrant; color bright, rich pink, faced with carmine.

KILLARNEY—Deep brilliant sparkling pink flowers makes this one of the most beautiful and popular roses ever produced.

LA CHAMPAGNE—Color, bright chamois, shading to yellow with apricot center and peach-blossom reflex and yellow base.

LADY HILLINGDON—Exquisite, long pointed buds of deep apricot-yellow come on long strong stems, opening up full and double.

LADY PLYMOUTH—The color is a pearly, delicate but deep ivory-cream, faintly flushed, giving it a most piquant finish that is difficult to describe.

McGREY'S SCARLET—A new red Rose. They are brilliant scarlet, orangy yellow at base of petals, the upper portions of same being lightly touched with crimson.

MME. BUTTERFLY—A perfect harmony of bright pink, apricot and gold. Buds are medium size, perfect for corsages.

MME. JENNY GUILLEMOT—Buds long and pointed, deep saffron-yellow, opening canary with dark golden shadings.

MRS. AARON WARD—The colors, ranges from coppery-orange in the bud, changing to a golden orange, and when the flower is fully open it is a lovely shade of pinkish fawn.

MRS. CHARLES BELL—It may be described as a shell-pink Radiance and is a sport of that well known rose.

MRS. E. P. THOM—Rich lemon-yellow throughout; the strong plant a mass of golden bloom all summer long.

MUSKETEER—Bright, velvety crimson buds of wonderful size and length. A grand garden rose as it is a vigorous grower with clean handsome foliage.

NEW COLUMBIA—The fragrance is even sweeter than that found in American Beauty. Color a deep silvery-pink. Remarkably strong grower and great novelty.

PRESIDENT HERBERT HOOVER—The outstanding novelty rose just introduced. Large flowers of a very charming combination of cerise-pink, flame, scarlet and yellow with broad thick petals; very fragrant.

Rose Descriptions—continued

REV. F. PAGE-ROBERTS—Copper-red buds of great length, opening to golden-yellow blooms stained outside with red, fully double and very large.

RHEA REID—The color is vivid scarlet crimson, gorgeous in appearance.

ROSELANDIA—Color is a golden orange suffused with a lustrous glow of apricot in the heart, frequently tinted red on the reverse of the outer petals.

SUNBURST—Reddish-bronze foliage. The color is a superb orange copper or golden orange, with a deep orange center.

TALISMAN—A novel production and perhaps the highest colored of all roses. Rich shadings and blendings of pure scarlet and gold.

TEMPLAR—A comparatively new rose, of bright velvety crimson. The flowers are quite free with petals of wonderful depth and substance.

WELLESLEY—The color is a beautiful shade of pink, the outside of the petals being bright and clear, with a silvery reverse.

WHITE RADIANCE—Dainty ivory-white warmed with a faint blush tint. Large, full petaled flowers are produced in great profusion on stiff, erect stems the entire season and well into the fall.

These are highly valued because of their exquisite dainty coloring and delicious tea fragrance, together with their remarkable free blooming qualities, flowering profusely as they do from June to November. They are less hardy than the Hybrid Teas and need careful protection in cold climates.

ALEXANDER HILL GRAY—Color is a deep lemon-yellow which intensifies as the blooms develop; flowers large, of great substance and perfect formation; it has a high-pointed center from which the petals gracefully reflex. We recommend it highly.

BLUMENSCHMIDT—Pure citron yellow, outer petals edged tender rose. Very full, double flowers; remarkably vigorous grower.

CLOTILDE SOUPERT—Color a French white, deepening to a rosy blush in the center. Its greatest value lies in its compact, vigorous habit and wonderful profusion of bloom.

ETOILE de LYON—Flowers are very large and double; buds are long and pointed. Color, beautiful chrome yellow, deepening at the center to pure golden yellow. Unusually rugged grower, proving hardy in quite severe climates.

HELEN GOOD (Beauty Cochet)—Delicate yellow, suffused with pink, each petal edged deeper; very chaste and beautiful. Remarkably free flowering, particularly in late fall.

MARIE GUILLOT—This beautiful Tea Rose continues in popular favor, and still maintains its position as one of the best white Roses of its class; flowers of an unusual style, entirely double to the center; very sweet scented.

SOUVENIR de PIERRE NOTTING—The bloom is very large, perfectly full, elegant form; has a beautiful long bud; the colors are very bright, distinct and clear and have no unpleasant tones—orange-yellow, bordered in carmine-rose.



ROSA ROULETTI

Rapidly gaining popularity as a Miniature Rock Garden Rose and an Edging Plant in front of Rose Beds—Very dwarf and perpetual bloomer. Found originally in the mountains of Switzerland. The tiny bud is a deep rose color opening into a clear pink. Said to be the tiniest rose in the world. Hardy. Strong one year plants, 25c; Two year plants, 50c.

HARDY POLYANTHA or Baby Roses

Flowers are miniature in size, but are produced in the greatest profusion. Small, dainty foliage of dark, lustrous green.

ELLEN POULSEN—Brilliant pink in color—outstanding in its color and fragrance of its flowers.

ETOILE LUISANTE, OR BABY HERRIOT—Its color is shrimp-pink with intense coppery-yellow suffusion, the base of the petals golden-yellow which intensifies and lightens up its high colors. Plant is of free growth and floriferous.

GLORIA MUNDI (Poly.)—Neat full well formed flowers of the most brilliant scarlet orange color. A wonderful addition to list of polyanthas. No other color like it. Bound to prove very popular. One year plants, 25c each; Two year plants, 50c each.
