However, a small percentage of roots do not have eyes, and to save you the time and trouble of returning them for replacement, we add extra roots (some time of other varieties) at time of shipping your order to offset any roots that may fail to sprout. When roots arrive, we strongly advise placing them in a pan of moist earth until the eyes sprout, then transplant to the garden. (If growth is showing this is not necessary). Full cultural directions are furnished with each shipment.

GUARANTEE

We guarantee all stock to be true to name to the extent of replacement the next season. If unable to do so, we will refund the money. If any of our stock is not satisfactory, we will make an exchange or refund your money if stock is returned to us within thirty days after shipment is made.

NON-WARRANTY

We do not guarantee anything beyond our control, such as wintering, growth of stock, or size of blooms, etc., as we are unable to control cultivation, fertilization, weather conditions, etc. We reserve the right to change the prices without notice and will adhere to the principle of first come, first served.

PLANTING AND CULTIVATING DAHLIAS

A sunny, open location—soil matters little. Spade well and deeply. When soil has become warm, plant the tuber horizontally, six inches deep with eye or sprout up; 3x4 feet if soil is rich; 2x3 feet if soil is poor. Never sprinkle your Dahlias; soak the soil thoroughly every 7 to 10 days, during very dry weather or when the flowers are in bloom. Keep soil stired. When the plant is two feet high drive a stake about six inches from plant to tie it to, as it grows with "rag" or soft twine. If you want bushy plants, cut tops out. If you want extra large blooms, remove all but the main flower bloom on each branch. Cut your blooms late in afternoon or early morning. Singe them by holding ends of stems over a flame or putting them in steaming hot water, then putting in cold water. If plant lice, curly leaf or thrip appear on your plants, spray with (Black Leaf 40) if your plant leaves turn white in the fall, dust with powdered sulphur in the early mornings.

We will make up collections of highly satisfactory varieties, for the amount you wish to spend. We guarantee that the value will be at least one-third greater than the amount you pay.

DAHLIA — GREEN PLANTS

If you feel that some of the new varieties are too expensive, buy plants at half price of roots. Plants can be furnished from April 1st. to July 1st. All Dahlia plants we ship are from base cuttings. They are hardened into strong stocky plants, and shipped in specially constructed containers, securely packed, and guaranteed to reach you in good growing condition in any part of the United States. On receipt of green plants, remove all wrappings carefully. Plant immediately in well prepared soil as deep as possible, so that should an insect cut it off it will come again from below. Press the soil as firmly as possible and shade from hot sun (with light cloth, old sacks, etc.) during the heat of day for several days. Soak the soil well before planting. Plants should be sent by special delivery. Add 25c for this service.

AZALEAS (Pot Grown).

Azaleas are without a doubt one of the most beautiful flowering plants we have in the South.
