#### DELIVERY OF SEEDS

All vegetable and flower seeds in this price list except Peas, Beans, Sweet Corn and Spinach will be sent prepaid by parcel post, express or freight at our option.

Peas, Beans, Sweet Corn and Spinach will not be sent prepaid unless they are included in any one order to the value of \$20.00 or more.

The above offer to pay transportation does not apply to Field and Grass seed, Potatoes, Onion Sets, Fertilizers, etc. Articles other than seeds listed in this catalogue are sent at **purchaser's expense** except where they are quoted "**Transportation paid.**"

Seeds ordered sent by express will be so sent at the purchaser's expense.

#### About Ordering, Shipping, Etc.

Orders may be sent at any time and goods will be shipped at the time specified on the order.

Freight shipments are now handled by the railroads much more promptly than formerly and we advise having all heavy shipments (100 lbs. or more) sent in that way.

When ordering seeds shipped by freight or express please be sure to give the name of your nearest freight railroad station or express office if it is different from your postoffice address.

25% of the value of the order must accompany all orders for goods shipped C. O. D. *Plants will not be sent C. O. D.* 

#### Terms and Discounts

Our regular terms are cash with order. When cash is sent with order we allow a discount of 5% on vegetable and flower seeds and plants, small fruits and accessories.

Field and Grass Seeds are strictly net cash with order at prices quoted.

To gardeners of established credit and those who furnish us with satisfactory references we allow the following time payments except on field and grass seeds, which are strictly cash with order.

Bills for seeds, plants, etc., shipped after January 1st are due and payable net August 1st.

Bills for goods shipped after August 1st are due **net** December 1st.

#### Conditions of Sale

No seeds are sold by us that we do not know are of good vitality and will grow under normal conditions. They are all tested and the per cent that germinates is marked on the package or label.

We assume responsibility of the seeds, plants and bulbs we sell reaching the purchaser in good condition. However, in common with all responsible seedsmen, all our seeds, plants and bulbs are sold on the distinct understanding and with the agreement by the purchaser that we will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may accrue by reason of the failure of the seeds, plants or bulbs to grow or to be of the variety or quality offered. We will not accept or fill orders under any other conditions.







Sowing in this way takes 1 oz. of seed for about 700 feet of row. To sow for transplanting use 4 ozs. to plant 1 acre or 1 oz. to plant 3500 feet of row in the

# Larkspur

The finest Larkspur for outdoor cutting is probably produced by sowing seed outdoors the middle of August. However, sowings may, in some cases, be made as late as October. Plants will usually withstand the winter in this latitude without any mulch. If a mulch is used, it should be coarse so as not to mat down on the plants. Very early spring sowing is also satisfactory. Besides being one of the best outdoor cut-flowers, Larkspur is grown extensively in the greenhouse. The Giant Imperial, or base branching types, are preferred for cut-ting. All of our Larkspur, with the exception of Rosamond, are of this type.







# **Zinnias**

Zinnias are very rapidly becoming a more and more popular florists' flower. They thrive in hot weather, growing so easily from seed sown outdoors about June 1st. The "Cut-and-Come Again," "Fantasy" and "Pompon" Zinnias are even better cut-flowers if grown in a cloth house. The flowers are larger and the stems longer.

Zinnias for May and June cutting may be grown in a warm greenhouse by sowing in February

and March. Seed sown in August will make a late fall cutting in the greenhouse.

The most extensive use for Zinnias is in growing plants in "flats" for spring sales. Sow seed in early April. The Giant Flowered are the most popular and there is an increasing demand for separate colors. Pompon Zinnias are next in popularity.

REMEMBER—When sowing Zinnia seed wait until the soil is warm. The seed will surely decay in cold wet soil.




Photo shows size and shape of the Hotent.
