





Many people think that seeds cannot be planted any other time than in April and May. This is far from true. The wide-awake gardener begins sowing as early in the spring as possible and sows succession crops throughout the summer and until late in the fall. Succession crops are most important, since they provide fresh vegetables for fall and winter use. A cellar full of stored vegetables is a good investment. Grow all the vegetables your garden can produce. Eat them fresh, evaporate them, can them, store them, and be independent of high food prices.

#### **ASPARAGUS**

1/4 Lb. 30c Pkt. 15c

CULTURE—Asparagus, which is one of our earliest spring vegetables, is also one of the most widely appreciated and extensively cultivated. Can be grown in any soil which is not too wet. Seed should be sown in March or April, in rows 14 inches apart, and lightly covered with a layer of soil ½ to ¾ inches deep. When the seed is up they should be thinned out.

WASHINGTON. A vigorous growing and very productive variety which has been bred to resist the disease known as "Asparagus Rust." The shoots are thick and heavy. They are long and straight, with closely folded tips. The color is rich dark green, tinted darker at the tips.

PALMETTO. Of very large size, even and regular in growth and appearance. A very early sort immensely productive and of the best quality.

#### BRUSSELS SPROUTS

One of the most delicious garden vegetables. Plant in 3-foot rows, 1½ to 2 feet apart. One ounce will produce about 200 plants. Cultivate same as cabbage. Autumn grown sprouts, drilled in May and transplanted in July, generally do the best, as the plants are quite hardy and the buds mellow under frost.

#### BROCCOLI

ITALIAN GREEN SPROUTING. A distinct variety for the home garden. Plant forms a central head, fairly compact cluster of flower buds resembling cauliflower except that it is green in color. #### GREEN PODDED BUSH BEANS

5 Lbs. 25c

CULTURE—Beans are sensitive to both cold and wet, so do not plant till the ground is warm. To have a continuous supply plant every two weeks from the time the ground gets warm till the middle of August; further south they may be planted even later. Make the rows 2 and 3 feet apart, drop the beans 3 inches apart and cover 1½ to 2 inches deep. Give frequent but shallow cultivation up to blooming time, not afterward, and never when the plants are wet. Plant in a light loamy soil that warms up quickly. One pound plants 60 feet; 100 pounds will plant an acre.

# BEETS FOR THE TABLE

10c

CULTURE—Beets are sown where crop is to grow, in open ground, as soon as spring frosts are over, 1-inch deep in drills 12 to 15 inches apart, for convenience in hoeing; and young plants are thinned out, with a greater or less space between them, usually about 4 inches, according to size of variety grown. The thinnings from crop make excellent greens. They thrive in well enriched, moist soil, with plenty of sunshine. Growth will be greatly stimulated with a slight application of Nitrate of Soda.

EARLY WONDER. Roots uniform, nearly globe shaped, with small top, skin dark red, flesh deep blood red. Popular with market gardeners for early or late planting.

DETROIT DARK RED. One of the very best sorts for home or market garden and for canning purposes. Roots uniformly smooth, of medium size, and globe shaped; skin dark red, flesh solid vermilion red.

EARLY BLOOD TURNIP, IM-PROVED. The old standard table beet; roots nearly round or slightly flattened, bright red, zoned and of good quality. Not so early as Detroit, and with a larger, coarser top.

CROSBY'S EGYPTIAN. Splendid home and market garden sort.
Tops medium in size; collar small.
Root flattened globe-shaped, with small tap root; very dark purplishred. Flesh deep purplish-red zoned with a lighter shade; crisp and tender.

EDMAND'S BLOOD TURNIP. A second early sort, with short tops; roots nearly round, dark red; flesh purplish red with little zoning; a good keeper.
SWISS CHARD, LUCULLUS. An improved type of Chard. Of more upright growth than the Silver variety; leaves yellowish-green, fairly crumpled, mid-rib and veins white; stalks thick, broad and flat and as large as rhubarb.

# MANGEL WURZEL and SUGAR BEETS

Sugar Beets and Mangels are of great value for stock feeding, because of the improved health and condition of the animals, increased flow and quality of milk, and because of the saving in fodder. The yield is enormous, and the cost of growing is trifling. Grow a patch of them for winter feed. They are also excellent for poultry.

LONG RED MAMMOTH (Norbiton Glant). Attains enormous size; producing thirty to fifty tons to the acre. Root nearly cylindrical in shape, light red, growing well above ground; flesh white and rose colored.

GOLDEN TANKARD. Roots large, nearly cylindrical in shape, narrowing abruptly at both ends; skin deep orange-yellow; flesh zoned yellow and white; sweet and productive.

VILMORIN'S IMPROVED SUGAR. An improvement on the White French Sugar; used extensively for making beet sugar.

BEETS ALL WINTER

Late sown Beets may readily be kept for winter use, if packed in a slightly moist soil or sand in a cool cellar. We recommend Detroit Dark Red for this purpose.

#### CARROTS

CULTURE—Plant seed one-half inch deep in loose, well prepared soll, in rows 16 Inches apart. Thin 2 to 4 inches in row. Plant from early spring to mid-June.

DANVER'S HALF LONG. 75 Days. The best known second early, half-long sort; roots 6 to 8 inches long, tapering to a blunt point; flesh deep orange, tender and good quality.

CHANTENAY HALF LONG (The Model). 72 Days. Excellent medium early half-long stump rooted variety; roots about 6 inches long, very thick, smooth and of a deep orange-red color.

IMPROVED LONG ORANGE. 88 Days. An excellent intermediate season, standard sort; roots 12 inches long, about 3 inches broad at the crown, tapering regularly to a point; deep orange color.

OXHEART, OR GUERANDE. 72 Days. Mature roots 4½ to 5 inches long, very stout and thick, ending in an abrupt small tap root; small top and easily harvested: color light bright orange.



#### CAULIFLOWER

FINE DANISH GROWN STOCK

(1 oz. of seed will produce 3,000 plants) Pkt., 25c; Oz., 75c

CULTURE—The Cauliflower requires cool, molst weather for its development; it will not head in hot weather. Sow in hotbed very early during January or February. Transplant into deep, rich, moist, well worked soil as soon as frost ceases, one foot apart in rows two feet apart. Cultivate very frequently. They should be kept growing rapidly. When the flower begins to form draw the leaves over and pin or tie them together to protect the heads from the sun. For autumn use sow in June.

EARLY SNOWBALL. The best variety for general use. Of dwarf habit, and produces fine, large, white heads in a very short time. Always tender and sweet.

DANISH DRY WEATHER. A new strain developed in Denmark to stand hot, dry weather. It matures later than the Snowball, producing large, solid, pure white heads of excellent quality.

# CHINESE CELERY or CABBAGE

Pe Tsai-Chihli

CULTURE—About 65 days. Sow last half of July or first of August for best results in this section. When matured this plant resembles cos letture more than cabbage. Used in salads or may be cooked like cabbage or asparagus. Plants should be banked as they grow, or the leaves tied up over the center to produce celery-like form.

CHINESE CABBAGE (Wong Bok). 80 days. The heads of this variety are shorter and broader than Pe Tsai, the incurving leaves producing a tighter, more compact head.

#### COLLARDS

Pkt., 5c; 1/4 lb., 30c.

Plant two to three feet high, forming a cluster of tender leaves at the top of its rather long

### CABBAGE

Oz. 1/4 lb. Pkt. 10c 20c 50c

CULTURE—One ounce will produce about 2,000 plants; 10,890 plants will plant an acre of early cabbage; and 7,260 plants for an acre of late. Three ounces of seed will plant an acre of early and five ounces an acre of late cabbage. For early cabbage, sow seed in hotbeds in January or February. Transplant as early as possible to the open ground about two feet apart each way. For late cabbage, sow seed in the open ground in May and transplant about July 1 in rows 2½ feet each way.

GOLDEN ACRE. 66 Days. The earliest of the round headed cabbages, maturing with Jersey Wakefield. Plant small, dwarf and compact; heads of medium size, round as a ball, hard, solid and very uniform.

COPENHAGEN MARKET. 70 Days. Very fine, nearly as early as Jersey Wakefield; stem short, heads large, round and solid, with few outer leaves of an upright growth.

ALL SEASONS. 85 Days. Heads large, round and very deep; can be planted for early or late crop; a splendid keeper; in season a late second early, coming in with Early Flat Dutch; a favorite with kraut manufacturers.

EARLY JERSEY WAKEFIELD. 65 Days. The most widely known and popular extra early variety; heads are broad cone shaped and very solid. Our stock is very dwarf, compact and extremely early.

CHARLESTON LARGE WAKEFIELD. 75 Days. About one week later than Early Jersey Wakefield, but the conical heads are fully one-half larger.

LATE FLAT DUTCH. 95 Days. A justly popular and esteemed variety; extensively cultivated for market and family use. Heads large, round, flattened and very firm; has a medium stem and is very hardy.

EARLY FLAT DUTCH. 70 Days. Earlier and heads somewhat smaller than Late Flat Dutch; a good short stemmed second early.

RED ROCK. 110 Days. The largest and surest heading red cabbage; more deeply colored at the heart than Red Dutch; medium to long stem.

#### CELERY

Pkt., 10c

CULTURE—Sow in beds in February or March and keep them well watered. Transplant to moist, mucky soil; 6 inches apart In 12-inch rows. Earth up two or three times. Cover with straw from severe weather, with boards on top; 1 ounce of seed produces 2,000 plants.

GOLDEN SELF BLANCHING DWARF. 118 Days. This sort is without doubt the finest early celery in cultivation. Plants compact and stocky, with yellow-ish-green foliage; stalks perfectly solid, of a fine, nutty flavor attains a good size; branches a handsome golden yellow color.

GOLDEN PLUME or WONDERFUL. 112 Days. Resembles Golden Self Blanching in appearance, crispness and fine nutty flavor, though somewhat earlier, larger and of ranker growth. Blanches quickly with a full heart and rich, golden-yellow color. Apparently more disease resistant than other yellow celeries. A very desirable sort.

IMPROVED WHITE PLUME. 112 Days. A very early, handsome variety; leaves light, bright green; easily blanched a beautiful silvery-white color. A popular sort for first early market.

GIANT PASCAL. 135 Days. A compact, vigorous, productive variety and one of the best for winter use; leaves upright, short and dark green; stalks short, thick and very broad; blanches a beautiful yellowish-white.

#### **CUCUMBERS**

Pkt. Oz. 1/4 lb. 30c 5c

Do not plant until soil becomes thoroughly warm. Cover seed ½-inch, plant in hills 3 feet apart, rows 5 feet, 6 to 8 seeds, thin to 3 or 4. 1 oz. will plant about 100 hills. 2 lbs. to acre. SNOW'S PERFECTED PICKLE. 52 Days. The most symmetrical, best formed and productive pickling sort; early, small, square ended and deep green. LONG GREEN, IMPROVED. 70 Days. A standard late, well-known table sort; 12 to 14 inches long, slender, more or less warted, tapering towards the stem end; color dark green, flesh white and firm. WHITE SPINE, IMPROVED EARLY (Arlington). 65 Days. One of the very earliest and best known of the White Spines; a short square ended, rather three-cornered type; very productive; fine for slicing or pickles; medium green color.

EARLY FORTUNE. 65 Days. The finest type of White Spine yet produced. Early, very productive and disease-resistant; fruits nine inches long, slightly tapering; flesh white, very firm and crisp, with very few seeds; color rich, dark green, which does not fade when shipped a long distance.

EARLY FRAME or SHORT GREEN. 56 Days. Vigorous and productive; medium in size and earliness; good for pickling and slicing; fruit light green and is inclined to be three-cornered rather than round.

WHITE WONDER. 60 Days. Fruit, produced in clusters, is symmetrical, short, blocky and rounded at both ends; color ivory-white from time of forming until maturity.

GHERKIN. 50 Days. Grown exclusively for pickles; fruit very small, oval and covered with spines; color light green.
LONGFELLOW. 72 Days. Particularly valuable for shipping. Fruits handsome; extremely dark green over entire surface, retain the color remarkably long after picking; white spined. 12 to 14 inches long; 2½ to 2¾ inches thick. Straight, well filled at ends; very few seeds.
STRAIGHT 8. Fruits symmetrical, cylindrical, about 8x1½ inches, well rounded at the ends. Color deep green. Ideal for shipping and home use.

## CELERIAC or Turnip-Rooted Celery

CULTURE—Sow the latter part of April, covering seeds 1/4 of an inch. Thin out to about 1 inch apart in the row and transplant into rows 11/2 feet apart and 6 inches apart in the row.

Uses—Served as a salad with French dressing, or served hot with cream sauce.

Roots are turnip-shaped, very smooth, tender and marrow-like. Pkt., 5c; oz., 25c.

#### SWEET CORN

Pkt. 1 lb. 5 lbs. 25c

CULTURE—1/2-lb. will plant 100 hills. Sweet Corn varies greatly in hardiness, earliness, size and sweetness. The early sorts grow only 3 to 5 feet high and may be planted when the trees are starting out in leaf, in rows 3 feet apart, making the hills about 1 ft. apart. The later and sweeter varieties are more tender and should not be planted until the trees are in full leaf or the seed will rot in the ground. Plant garden corn in rows 3 feet apart, making the hills 18 inches apart in the rows.

STOWELL'S EVERGREEN. 105 Days. The standard and best sweet corn. Ears 8 to 9 inches long, 16 to 18 rowed, with a very deep, sweet grain.

NARROW GRAIN HYBRID. 90 Days. Same season as Narrow Grain Evergreen. Much more prolific in poor years. Pkt., 10c; 1/2 lb., 25c; lb., 45c.

COUNTRY GENTLEMAN (Shoe Peg). 93 Days. An especially fine quality corn. Ears 7 to 8 inches long, cob small, white and densely covered with long, slender, white grains, without row formation.

COUNTRY GENTLEMAN HYBRID. 90 Days. Same season as Country Gentleman but better yielder in poor years. Pkt., 15c; 1/2 lb., 25c; lb., 45c.

GOLDEN COUNTRY GENTLEMAN. 90 Days. By crossing Country Gentleman and Golden Bantam, this late variety was produced, with the flavor of Bantam and the size and kernel of Country Gentleman. An excellent late yellow. Pkt., 10c; 1/2 lb., 20c; lb., 35c.

GOLDEN BANTAM. 85 Days. Early, golden yellow and of the finest quality. Ears 8 rowed and 6 to 7 inches long.

ADAM'S EARLY. 90 Days. Not a sugar corn, but largely grown for early use; hardy, standing early planting and the thick, hard husks preventing entrance of the corn worms. Ears 7 to 8 inches long, 12-rowed.

GOLDEN SUNSHINE. 80 Days. Of the Golden Bantam type but a week to 10 days earlier. Ears 12-rowed, kernels broad, yellow and sweet.

HOWLING MOB. The leading white, second early. Productive and of extra fine quality. Ears 9 to 10 inches long with 14 rows.

TRUCKER'S FAVORITE. Best roasting ear; not a true Sugar Corn. Stalks about 8 ft. tall, ears are of medium length and thickness, average 7 to 8 inches, with 12 or 14 rows. Kernels are white. Long, tight husks protect the ear from worms and the corn is very tender when in the roasting ear stage.

GOLDEN CROSS. Here is a fine new variety that is an improvement in every way over the ordinary Golden Bantam. A week later than Golden Bantam; grows 4½ to 5 feet tall. Ears are larger and longer, and have 10 to 14 or 16 rows of tender, rich, full-flavored yellow kernels, somewhat lighter than regular Bantam. Produces almost twice the yield of Golden Bantam and in every way is a wonderful new Sweet Corn. Pkt., 15c; 1 lb., 40c.

#### CHIVES



LARGE ROOTED or COFFEE. Sow in drills. Roots used in adulterating coffee when dried, roasted and ground. Pkt., 10c; oz., 15c.

#### **ENDIVE**

CULTURE—Sow in August in shallow drills, twelve to fifteen inches apart, and thin to one foot in drills. When fully grown tie over the outer leaves of a few plants every week or ten days to blanch.

# **CRESS**

CURLED or PEPPER GRASS. Very hardy, fast growing annual which produces a good supply of attractive, finely curled dark green foliage for garnishing and of a pleasant pungent flavor.

WATER CRESS. 50 Days. Will only thrive well when the roots are submerged in water; grows best along banks of small running streams.



#### GARLIC

FOR SEED. Thrives best in light, well-enriched soil. Bulbs should be planted in the fall 6 to 8 inches apart. Cultivate and store the same as onions. Much valued for flavoring soups, stews, etc. Fine bulbs. 1/4 lb., 15c; lb., 50c.

#### KALE or BORECOLE



CULTURE—Plant requires continuous warm weather for best results. The seed germinates slowly and should be started in a hotbed. # REGARDING NUMBER OF DAYS TO MATURITY

The number of days required by any particular variety to produce garden stuff ready for table use varies from year to year and depends upon growing and seasonal conditions. In our description of most varieties we are giving the average number of days from seed to edible stage. Time given for broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, pepper and tomato is days from setting plants to marketing fruits. Figures are based on growing conditions here and are meant only for convenience in comparing earliness of varieties.

#### MUSTARD



#### TOBACCO

CULTURE—A very clean plece of land is best for tobacco. It is customary to burn a piece of land in the woods for plant beds. This destroys grass, weeds and insects, adds fertility through the action of the wood ashes, and leaves the ground in good order. The seeds are sown about February and protected by plant-bed cloth to keep off tobacco flies. When large enough and weather is settled (about June), set the plants out in highly manured or fertilized soil in 3½-foot rows, 3 feet between the plants. Constant care must be given, cultivating, suckering, worming, etc. Methods of curing differ according to the varlety and color; 1 ounce sows 50 square yards, sufficient to set 2 or 3 acres.



# **OUR SUPERIOR MIXED LAWN GRASS**

TO MAKE A LAWN

Remember when making a lawn that it is to last for years, and be an ornament to the home, so give plenty of time and care to preparation before the seeds are sown. Several weeks before sowing dig the soil deeply, break up the lumps, apply our Premier Horticultural Peat Moss and a lawn fertilizer such as VIGORO and rake the top soil; at intervals of ten days or two weeks rake the surface to destroy the weeds, and before sowing have the surface as fine as a rake will make it. Sow half the seeds, then sow the other half at right angles to the first sowing—this gives an even distribution. After sowing rake slightly so as not to cover the seeds too deep—covering with a roller is better—small seeds cannot germinate if planted too deep, an eighth of an inch is about right. Do not put stable manure on your lawn, as it adds to the many weeds already in the soil, and if not well broken up the lumps of manure will smother young grass.

Start the lawn as early as possible to give the grass a chance to become well established before the spring growth of weeds.





several pailfuls of water to each Rose, not only to start it, but also to settle the soil firmly around the roots. The Rose should stand so deep that the union (bud) just above the root is just below the level surface of the ground.

Starting and Pruning. Bank up about 8 inches of soil, which is to keep the lower parts of the branches cool and moist until the Rose is started. At the same time cut back all branches to within 2 or 3 inches above the banked up soil. As soon as the new growth appears, take the soil away, leveling the ground.







# Hardy Garden Lilies

#### Beautiful and Permanent

Lilies are becoming Increasingly popular and may be grown successfully by any gardener. They bring charm to the garden quite different from that of any other flower. You may have cool whites, rich yellows and dazzling scarlets. Lilies may be had in bloom from early summer until fall by proper selection.

Plant Lilies informally in clumps or large masses. Place the bulbs 4 to 8 inches deep (depending upon variety and size of bulbs), with a handful of sand around each one. 




DIAGRAM SHOWING DEPTH TO PLANT OUTDOORS.


