Watermelons do best on old, rich soll, which is not too freshly manured, hence when making the hills, well-rotted manure should be used, and it is better to prepare them some time ahead before planting the seed. 

TOBACCO

When large enough and weather is settled (about June), set the plants out in highly manured or fertilized soil in 3½-foot rows, 3 feet between the plants. Constant care must be given, cultivating, suckering, worming, etc. Methods of curing differ according to the varlety and color; 1 ounce sows 50 square yards, sufficient to set 2 or 3 acres.




We will again have to offer for Spring, Missouri No. 8 Hybrid Corn put up in official Missouri Corn Growers bags, official Missouri Corn Growers tags attached, and grown in Jackson County, Missouri.

We have made several investigations on Missouri No. 8 in comparison with other hybrids and with open pollinated corn in several sections in Southwest Missouri and have yet to find a dissatisfied planter of Missouri No. 8 Hybrid and we have yet to find a grower who has any other hybrid corn that he thinks more of than the Missouri No. 8 and feel sure that this is the best corn for South Missouri and Northern Arkansas.

Missouri No. 8 over a period of 6 years in experiments conducted by the Missouri Station have shown increases over Reids Yellow Dent of 42% and increases over Midland Yellow Dent of 23% both of which are considered well adapted for use in this state.

- 1. RESISTS DROUTH, on account of a deeper and larger root system, it obtains moisture and plant food over a wider area.
- 2. RESISTS INSECTS AND DISEASES, on account of the extreme vigor of the plant, it is more resistant to insect damage and diseases.
- 3. THE STRONG ROOT SYSTEM, makes it stand well and is less likely to be damaged by wind.

TO MAKE A LAWN

Remember when making a lawn that it is to last for years, and be an ornament to the home, so give plenty of time and care to preparation before the seeds are sown. Several weeks before sowing dig the soil deeply, break up the lumps, apply our Premier Horticultural Peat Moss and a lawn fertilizer such as VIGORO and rake the top soil; at intervals of ten days or two weeks rake the surface to destroy the weeds, and before sowing have the surface as fine as a rake will make it. Sow half the seeds, then sow the other half at right angles to the first sowing-this gives an even distribution. After sowing rake slightly so as not to cover the seeds too deep—covering with a roller is better—small seeds cannot germ-inate if planted too deep, an eighth of an inch is about right. Do not put stable manure on your lawn, as it adds to the many weeds already in the soil, and if not well broken up the lumps of manure will smother your grass.

Start the lawn as early as possible to give the grass a chance to become well established before the spring growth of weeds.

Planting Instructions

Do not expose roots to sun or drying winds. Put the roots in cold water for a few hours just before planting. Have the holes dug large enough to allow several inches of good soil all around and below the roots. Use only good surface soil to fill in. Use several pailfuls of water to each Rose, not only to start it, but also to settle the soil firmly around the roots. The Rose should stand so deep that the union (bud) just above the root is just below the level surface of the ground.

Starting and Pruning. Bank up about 8 inches of soil, which is to keep the lower parts of the branches cool and moist until the Rose is started. At the same time cut back all branches to within 2 or 3 inches above the banked up soil. As soon as the new growth appears, take the soil away, leveling the ground.


