## Rhubarb

## One ounce will produce about 750 plants.

Rhubarb succeeds best in deep, rich loam. It is propagated by seed, or by division of the roots-the latter being the usual method. Sow the seeds in drills 18 inches apart, and thin out the plants to 9 inches apart in the drills. When the plants are one year old transplant into beds, setting the plants 5 feet apart each way. Do not cut until the second year and give a liberal dressing of manure every fall.
